Ordinance No. 38.—Relating to City Licenses. The People of the City of Walla Walla, do ordain as follows, to wit:

Sec. 1. No person, association of persons, firm or company, shall keep, sell, or engage in, or prosecute any either of the occupations or trades mentioned in this Ordinance, within the limits of the City of Walla Walla, without having first obtained a license therefor, under the hand of the City Clerk.

Sec. 2. All licenses required under this Ordinance, shall be paid in advance; and no license shall issue for less time than three months, except as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. The following sums shall respectively be paid for licenses, to wit: Each day Auctioneer, per quarter, \$20.00.

Sec. 4. Any person whose business it is to keep horses or mules for hire, or who shall receive horses or mules to feed by the month, day or week, under this ordinance, shall be deemed a livery stable keeper, under this ordinance.

Sec. 5. If any person shall engage in any business herein named, without first obtaining a license therefor, it shall be the duty of the City Marshal, on information thereof by the City Clerk, to enter complaint against such person, who shall on conviction thereof by the Recorder, be fined in a sum of double the amount of the license required for such business.

Sec. 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance to be in force from and after its passage.
