A REPRESENTATIVE MAN. Return of General T. R. Tannatt from the East—His views as expressed to a "Statesman" Representative—Capitalists Through-out the County Looking Toward Washington Territory—Henry Villard Will Visit Walla Walla.

Gen. T. R. Tannatt, General Agent and Manager of the Oregon Improvement Company, arrived here from a hurried business trip last night, and this morning a Statesman representative waited upon the gentleman in his office, corner Main and Fourth streets. General Tannatt is decidedly a representative man of Eastern Washington, and no individual could so well place our vast resources before eastern capitalists as he.

Upon his arrival in New York and Boston he was immediately waited upon by the principal stock holders of the Improvement Company, all of whom were enthusiastic in relation to the outlook and placed an unlimited credit at Mr. Tannatt's disposal for investment. His prediction is that in less than two years we will see not only a magnificent hotel erected here, but extensive foundries, woolen mills, and other manufacturing industries, too numerous to mention.

The gentleman informs us that in his conversation with Mr. Villard, both in New York and Portland, the latter entertained the best of feeling for this locality and evinced a disposition to materially assist in pushing forward enterprises of every description. In conclusion Gen. Tannatt said that it was Mr. Villard's intention to visit Walla Walla and that he would be here the early part of next week.

Henry Villard Talks. Mr. Villard addressed a large gathering at the Alpha Opera House in Tacoma last Friday, and during his remarks said that as to the construction of elevators he had formed a system, but so used were our farmers to sowing grain that the system was to be modified, and while they were being educated to its use, facilities for shipping grain would be at once supplied.

Should be Repealed. Numerous complaints have come to us of late in relation to the dilapidated condition in which the bridge over Mill creek, on the Walla Walla and Walla road, is in. This structure was washed away last December, and up to this writing nothing has been done toward putting it in repair.

THE MAGNATE TALKS. Henry Villard's Answer to the Business Men of Seattle. Difficulties Under Which the Northern Pacific is Laboring—When the Road Will Be Finished—Will Be Into Seattle in His Private Car Next September—A Straight-forward Statement.

Two hundred business men were present at a meeting in Seattle last Saturday, on which occasion Mr. Henry Villard answered three important questions put to him by the chairman of the meeting. During his remarks the railroad magnate said that on this coast alone during the past three years, there have been expended through the channels of his different corporations no less than \$35,000,000 of money.

First—When will the N. P. R. R. be completed to Puget Sound? Second—Why has not the Cascade division of the Northern Pacific Railroad been built or its construction ever begun? Third—If the people of Seattle will raise \$150,000 for the purpose of building a standard gauge railroad on the Cedar river valley, and connect the Green River coal deposits with Seattle, and also to connect with the Cascade division of the Northern Pacific Railroad, will you by the agency of any of your companies agree to build at once such a road?

As suggested, says Mr. Villard, I will answer all three questions fairly and freely. If my answer should fail to cover any one point Judge Burke made, I hope he will remind me of that fact, so that I may make up for the omission. I believe the first question was why the construction of the Cascade division had not progressed. I say progressed, because the Cascade division was commenced some years ago. That is, the coal branch of the Northern Pacific main line across the Territory from the Columbia river to Puget Sound was assumed to be the terminus of the line.

Mr. Thoben, who has been in charge of the engineering department of the Northern Pacific, is here, and he will confirm what I say in stating that the surveys and searches for practicable routes that have been carried on for many years were only brought to a final conclusion late last fall, when it was altogether too late to think of commencing work. Then at no time, no matter what may have been said in the papers, nor in any meeting, have any public men to the contrary, the work of preparation, that is, of surveying and locating a line, was not advanced sufficiently until last October to begin work.

The scene is appalling in Beauregard. The town is literally a mass of ruins. It is with difficulty that one can ride through, so thickly are the trees strewn across the road. Timbers are scattered for miles around. Even out in the country three miles of dwellings were swept away.

THE CYCLONE IN CLAY COUNTY. Two cyclones passed over Clay county Sunday, spreading death and destruction in their path. Near Hohenlinden 30 persons are reported killed. A deed was found in the country that had been blown 50 miles.

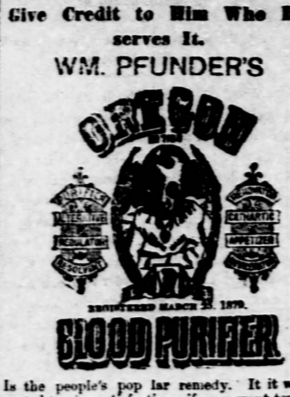

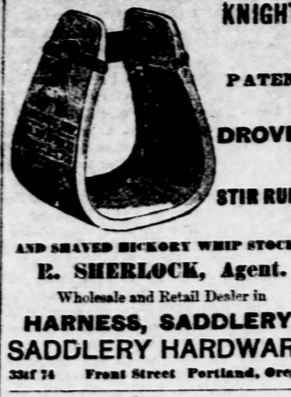
