THE UMATILLA INDIAN RESERVATION

The Poetry of Oology and Labor. [BY OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.] There was a time, not far distant, when men thought they had found in the United States the sovereignty of labor.

What is the state of things to-day? Noting as I have done even on this reservation against the white men employed on the railroad, now in course of construction through it, the intelligence which pervades them, much reason for congratulation still remains.

President Arthur has pronounced the death sentence of the republican party and cast a pall over the Pacific coast by his veto of the anti-Chinese bill. It cost oceans of blood and billions of dollars to suppress slavery in the South, yet strange to say here in the great Pacific west a republican government pampers, connives and winks at the worst form of slavery in the shape of the wretched coolies, who are slaves of the "six companies," and whose relatives in China are held in bondage unless they fulfill their flesh and blood contract of sinking down white labor to their own barbarian level.

Most we sink to the level of Chinese slaves? Must the stone roll down the hill again? After having mounted so near the top? Is it not probable that the light which the founders of this republic set up as a beacon for the political regeneration of mankind one hundred years ago will be rekindled to lead the way to the regeneration of labor? The cry of "The Chinese must go," is the first murmur of that contest which is inevitable.

Labor has met war, its will never, its deadly collapse; labor has met debt, the price of that war, sucking out the life blood after the wounds of battle have been staunching; and labor has met capital, which, like one of those good described in the Arabian tales, rises portentously to its full strength and stature out of the smoke of war and the shadow of debt.
