BIG SHOWING.—The coal deposits of Vancouver Island were estimated four years ago to contain 3,000,000 tons, and the estimate has since been raised to 6,000,000 tons, some enthusiasts more than double this enormous figure. The coal of the island is also what is better, of a most excellent quality.

LET THERE BE LIGHT.—Chas. M. Patterson, Esq., has returned from California where he went on business connected with the enterprise of lighting up this city with gas. If ever there was a town needing lighting with gas this is the one and it is most sincerely to be hoped that our business men and citizens generally will do everything in their power to assist in so desirable an advantage.

BACKWARD.—Letters from Ohio, Indiana and Kansas dated April 10th received yesterday by a gentleman here, state that no ploughing for corn had yet been done in either State. It is the most backward spring ever known. Prospects for any crops whatever are very discouraging. In Kansas where corn is usually planted by the 10th, ploughing had just begun and winter wheat had been badly injured by frost and desiccating winds.

VILLAGE.—Since the sale of the old Oregon Steam Navigation Company to Mr. Villard and his associates, they have spent, in Oregon, \$5 or more for every twenty-cent piece they have earned in the State; and are now putting forth all their energies to meet the Union Pacific Railroad Company at Baker City next spring, thus giving Oregon and Washington an outlet to the Atlantic side direct by rail. Mr. Villard will probably visit Oregon sometime in June next.

CHINESE VEGETABLES.—The editor of the Baker City Revue has been investigating Chinese gardens and after a description of the how and whereabout, shakes his gray hair and reflects as follows: "We admit that nature's laboratory is a great chemist, and that it can convert these vile fertilizers into objects very pleasant to the sight and taste of man; but we think it will be a long time ere a moneyed vegetable vender will sell us any more onions, lettuce, etc., no matter how nice they may look, nor how strong they may be craved by our palate. Others can do as they please. We have done buying Chinese vegetables."

REPEITION OF BISHOP PADDOCK.—After disposing of the usual business at their regular annual meeting, the members of Trinity Church took action with reference to the coming of the new bishop to Seattle. Messrs. Bagley, McLaughlin, Slorah, Jennings and Brooks were chosen a committee to provide for the bishop's family after their arrival. The newly elected vestrymen were voted a committee of reception, and Messrs. Slorah, Burnett and Prosch were appointed a committee to charter a steamer with which to proceed to Tacoma, on the arrival of the train containing him, and convey the bishop to Seattle. The steamer will leave for Tacoma at about noon and return about seven o'clock. It is not definitely known on what day the bishop will come, but it is hoped his arrival will not be later than Thursday.

Speaks Well for Walla Walla.—Mr. O. Brechtel recently received several large barrels of hard direct from California, which with what he has in his cellar, amounts to seven tons. Our readers need not be told that this is one of the best hog countries on the continent and yet here is nearly two thousand dollars sent out of the country for one single article which we brag upon as a staple product. The cost in California for this article is 11 cents per pound and freight has to be added to the price before it reaches here. It is possible that our farmers are too rich and proud to engage in such a profitable industry as hog raising. We are sure that if less attention were paid to wheat and more to other branches of industry there would be less mortgages recorded.

ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday, says the Dayton News, Mr. Wilder Turner, of Weston, and Mr. Ashby were coming down the hill on the other side of Mereng with two mules attached to the hind end of the wagon. The mules became fractious and in an effort to unloose themselves they threw the wagon around in such a way as to make the situation dangerous to the occupants of the wagon and in order to save themselves they jumped from the vehicle and in so doing Mr. Turner was so caught as to cause a compound fracture of his right leg about half way between the knee and ankle. With such force was he thrown that it caused the bones of his leg to protrude about two inches through the skin and boot leg. The injured man was brought to town and placed under the care of Dr. Van Dusen, who states there is yet some doubt whether he will be able to save the injured member.

FROM THE DALLES TO WALLA WALLA.—Trains are now running regularly through from the Dalles to Walla Walla on schedule time. The up bound train leaves the Dalles at 6:30 A. M., and arrives at Walla Walla at 5:30 noon. Returning, the train leaves Walla Walla at 5:30 P. M., and reaches the Dalles at 4:30 in time to connect with the boat. As yet, no route agents take charge of the mails on the trains, the baggage masters having been sworn in to look after them for the present. Two additional agents will be appointed as soon as the department establishes the regular route, which will be in the course of a few weeks. Capt. B. B. Tuttle, of the railway service, returned yesterday evening accompanied the mails from which point he accompanied the mails on the first through train from the Dalles. He has succeeded in making all necessary arrangements about distributing the mails at the various stations along the line.

Teach him the baleful influence of fire-water, and the grandeur of your Yankee inventions, send him, yesterday we saw the dawn of civilization creeping over the denizens of the forest; for we saw a Klondiker nursing a papoose with one of the latest patent fangled, rubber-tipped, back-action nursing bottles. One of the finest marks of primitive life east aside.

SALTING CARBAGES.—A correspondent considers salt necessary to the development of the cabbage, especially in places far from the coast. He finds them more crisp, of better flavor, and to keep better when salt is used than without. He used it as follows: A few days after setting out the plants and when they are damp, either after a rain or when the dew is on, I take a small dish of fine salt and walk among the rows, sprinkling a little pinch of salt on the center leaves of each plant; when the center leaves begin to form the head I apply the salt again, scattering it over the leaves; after that I lose them over occasionally, and if I find any plants that do not appear well or appear diseased, I sprinkle the salt over freely; this will save all such plants. A quart of salt is sufficient for 500 plants in a season, although more can be used with safety.

FRUIT.—The fruit crop this year bids fair to be enormous; already the trees are bowed down with the super-abundant quantity hanging to the branches and many citizens say they will have to take them off for fear of breaking the trees down. The cherry trees are particularly well loaded, so much so in fact that there is hardly room for a leaf. It is to be hoped that some one will at once take measures to erect a drying and canning factory and save for human consumption the superfluous fruit. In all former years the fruit has rotted on the ground and yet the next season our merchants have been forced to import their stock of dried and canned fruits all the way from California. Let this year be the year in which we commence in the business of saving the fruit.
