Pursuant to call, the delegates from the different precincts met at the Court House, on Wednesday, May 1st, at 1 P. M. Mr. W. H. Newell called the Convention to order, when on motion, D. M. Jesse was elected temporary Chairman, and J. M. Vasyckie, Secretary.
