To-day, we scatter flowers over the graves of our soldier dead. We do it because we wish to honor the dead. There is a grave sense in the bosoms of all conscientious women and men in our Republic, of indebtedness to the dead who died for liberty and country.

The little mounds we have this day covered with flowers mean the nation's dead. Temples and monuments, bronze and marble statues the painted canvases, all there sink into insignificance beside this little mound.

But these memorial ceremonies are not alone for us. They should, and will teach the younger nation valuable lessons. It is only natural that some of us should remember how teeth were set hard and lips grew white, when a father or a brother or a son, was mustered out amid the raging battle, yet a great error is committed if to-day either in speech or parade, or other action there is any partisan, joy or obligation.

Decoration Day ought to be become mutual and the point of sentiment reached. So long as bigotry and sectionalism refused to decorate the graves of all in common, there was prejudice to appeal to and defend, or to assail and overthrow.

PALOUSE AND SPOKANE.

Three Hundred and Fifty Miles on a Back-Board.

EDITOR STATESMAN:—In compliance with your request, I will give a brief account of a journey, lately made from your city, that took in all the region East of Walla Walla to Lewiston, and north of Snake river to the N. P. railroad. Three hundred and fifty miles on a back-board, in the balmy month of May, through a country that has as many attractions as are found north and south of Snake river, is a stroke of travel that comes with peculiar relish to one who has summered and wintered for years in Portland.

The result of meeting and conversing with many who have made homes and become citizens in the eastern part of the grand territory of Washington, is, that they almost unanimously pronounce the Upper Country the paradise of the poor man. The remark is often made: "This is the best poor man's country in the world."

In company with your townsman, W. J. Dyer, I left Walla Walla on Friday, May 19th. We drove to Dayton, through green and waving wheat fields, and everywhere saw teams ahead turning over the sod for sowing next fall.

Over the hills and farther and farther away, we passed to Pomeroy, the metropolis of the Pataha region, also patronized by farmers from the Deadman country, Alpowai and Assotin. If Pomeroy holds its position as the trade center for all this region, it must become one of the most important towns in the upper country.

The grandest view we had in all the journey was from Alpowai ridge, which seemed to overlook a world of broken surfaces, made up of ridges clothed with bunch-grass and destitute of forests.

We reached Lewiston at night and called on your brother and gathered information at the U. S. Land office. The next day we crossed the Clearwater and went up the mighty hill towards Moscow. Climbing the hill we looked back over a

wide-spread landscape, saw across Snake river to the east, that homes were making on the grassy bunches, and green farms lay beside the river or on the lower terraces; further away we could trace the Assotin country.

Back of Lewiston we could see farms making, and understand that much land there invited settlement. Down where the river swept in curves, we could see the Clearwater bottom transformed in a few places to green wheat fields, looking beautiful in contrast with the desolate surroundings.

Presto, change! we at last pitched foot on the highest rim of the tremendous canyon, and find the green fields of the Palouse country before us! It is astonishing to know that on the highest plane, over 2000 feet above the Clearwater, we suddenly open on an earthly paradise and so it is.

To describe one section of the Palouse region, is to describe all. Sometimes the surface is more broken than others, and about Moscow and Farmington it is more level than the average, but the Palouse country is a broad, rolling prairie, as a general fact, diversified by the spurs of the Couer d'Alone mountains, that run west, and terminate in gentle hills that divide the streams.

Driving from Spokane Falls to Cheney, we then turned south and skirted to the west the settled portions of the Palouse lands, so getting a good idea of the region that lies 40 by 100 miles in extent, and possesses as many advantages for settlement as man can desire.
