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Weekly Statesman. SATURDAY, June 5, 1875. FIFTEEN'S HALL, Monday evening, July 13th, when it is expected there will be a very large attendance from both town and country.

THE LECTURE.—We must confess that we feel ashamed for our people when we entered the lecture room, Saturday night last, and found such a beggarly attendance. Even the front seats were not filled, and the rear of the room presented the appearance of a deserted hall. This in face of the fact that the lecturer had remained here nearly a week in order to afford our citizens an opportunity to hear him, and full notice had been given of both time and place. The class aspiring to the position of "leading citizens," and who pride themselves upon their wealth and assumed respectability, were notable for their absence. The trouble is, that many of those who ought to be representative men and women, are ignorant and uneducated, and hence they have no taste for an intellectual entertainment such as was presented them by Calvin B. McDonald. Had it been a "one horse opera," or a "nigger show," they would have been out in full force, but it being a purely historical and learned discourse, for that it had no attractions. Fortunately we have in our midst a few persons—a very few—of culture and refinement, and these were out and enjoyed an intellectual repast. The subject of the lecture, as previously announced, was the "Massacre of Glenocoe," and to say that it was able and instructive is faint praise. We had read Macaulay's version of that dreary episode in Scotch history, and had been charmed by the eloquence and beauty of diction employed by that polished historian when describing the bloody scenes that attended the massacre. In the matter of word painting Macaulay is always exhaustive, but we have no hesitation in saying that in beauty of diction and power of description, Calvin B. McDonald is far in advance of the great historian. A finer piece of composition we have never heard read, and as the lecturer turned over page after page we imagined that we were listening to the rippling of mountain stream or the murmur of molten silver. Softly and sweetly the sentences were turned, and over an hour slipped away with the audience insensible to the passage of time. At its close, the feeling was that it was too short, and we believe those who were present would gladly have remained for hours listening to the wondrously rounded sentences. We understand that Mr. McDonald will revisit Walla Walla at an early day, when it is not unlikely he will repeat his lecture to a larger but not more appreciative audience.

Railroad War in Oregon. The following is substantially the state of the railroad war in Oregon: Friday afternoon, May 25, a meeting of the stockholders of the Oregon Central Railroad, was held in the company's office, which has resulted in the proclamation of war. Joseph Gaston, Secretary, called the meeting to order, read a certified list of the stockholders, and stated that the President, Ben Holladay, was absent, and that there was therefore no person designated by law to preside. It was necessary for the stockholders present to choose some person for President of the meeting. He moved that S. Coffin act as President, which, being seconded, W. L. Halsey, as Vice-President of the company claiming the right and duty to preside, demanded the reading of certain sections of the company's by-laws, which was done. He and Mr. Gaston disputed the point. When the question was put it was voted that General Coffin should preside. Mr. Halsey orally protested, and J. N. Dolph, who appeared as his attorney, filed a written protest. Mr. Halsey asked if the names of Milton S. Latham and William Norris were not on the list of stockholders, and was answered in the negative.
