It will Not Terminate at Burnt River, But Will Push Through to the Coast. CHICAGO, May 26.—The Times says it is announced that an agreement had been entered into between the Union Pacific and the Northern Pacific railways, under which territory west of the Snake river in Oregon, Washington and Northern Idaho should be regarded as belonging to the Northern Pacific, or the Villard combination, and all east of the Snake river should belong to the Union Pacific, or the Gould combination.

THE WHEAT ZONE—PERFECTION ONLY IN THE NORTH.

In a recent issue of the News, a very enterprising paper published at Carrington, North Dakota, we find the following, which is so applicable to Washington Territory, as having so many physical and geographical features in common with Dakota, that we are tempted to reprint the article:

Perhaps the best negative definition of the "wheat zone" would be to exclude every province, territory or state whose aggregate produce is less than the demand of the resident population. It has been estimated upon elaborate data that the breadstuffs raised in the six New England states would not feed their population more than thirty days; that the product of New York would suffice for only three weeks; while a similar ratio probably exists in Pennsylvania, Virginia, and perhaps Ohio. The northern districts of Indiana, Illinois, and Iowa would probably be adequate to the wants of the people; but with crops not exceeding eleven bushels to the acre (and less rather than more), these states and some others to the westward are likely to be soon included in the maize zone of the continent.

Michigan, Wisconsin, and Iowa have some chance of holding their own with regard to this distinctive and leading staple for some time to come.

But with the mutations of climate and industry that inevitably transpire, the great source of the supply of breadstuffs of the future on this continent for the people of two worlds must be Dakota, and especially its northern section, which is more nearly within the great wheat area than the southern half of the territory.

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The bones of Charles J. Guiteau, the assassin of President Garfield, after having been in the Army Medical museum since July 3, last, have at length, it is stated, lost their identity as his bones. The day following the execution, which took place on the 30th of June, Guiteau's body was interred under the floor of the east wing of the jail. On the night of July 31 it was reinterred by the anatomist of the museum, Dr. E. F. Schaffhart, and taken to the museum. Here the bones were prepared for articulation, and being in fine order for such purpose, it was supposed that some day or other Guiteau's skeleton would be placed in a glass case in the museum, properly labeled. It was known by a number of the clerks and other employees of the museum that the bones were there, but only a few persons have been permitted to see them. It has been deemed inadvisable, however, to place the skeleton on exhibition as that of Guiteau, for, like the carnival vertebrae of the assassin of Lincoln, Wilkes Booth, it would have attracted a large crowd. Recently Dr. C. H. Crane, the surgeon general, took the bones into his personal possession and he had made a disposal of them of which every other person is ignorant. General Crane will doubtless keep the secret to himself. It is thought the bones are yet in the building, as an entire skeleton, or that they, with other bones, form exhibits there.

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"British gold" has been a soothing salve for protectionist speakers and writers for years. Judge Kelley even realized figures last winter in speaking of it. He said American legislation and opinion had borne the strain of \$1,000,000 spent in this country by English agents of the Golden Club. David A. Wells, in the Protection Review, holds the statement up to ridicule by showing that the entire income of the Golden Club is but \$40,000 a year, with a surplus on hand of \$15,000, and that the latter fund is employed only in publishing free trade pamphlets. Free trade must be a much more profitable institution than its defenders argue, if it can create a \$1,000,000 bribe out of \$50,000.

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That big Indian, Sitting Bull, was interviewed the other day at Standing Rock by a reporter of the Pioneer Press. In returning to his old home, the Sioux champion allges an unexpected cause of complaint against the white people. "You do not respect your President," he exclaimed; "you do not respect God nor his Son, for you killed the S. M. when he came here." The only parallel to this that we can remember is in the case of the Chinaman in San Francisco who attacked a Jew with unrelenting fury, nearly slaying him, because, as he told the court, the Jew "killed Mexican man Jones."

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
