WAR IN THE EAST.

Montenegro and Turkey. OSTER, June 8.—A Turkish column going to Gorko was met by Serbs and driven back to Mankova, where it was encamped at the latest information.

Officials Removed. CONSTANTINOPLE, June 8.—The financial committee in the Chamber of Deputies will recommend that five million Turkish pounds demanded by the ministers, be raised by means of a forced loan, secured by the security of public functionaries and by doubling the present land tax.

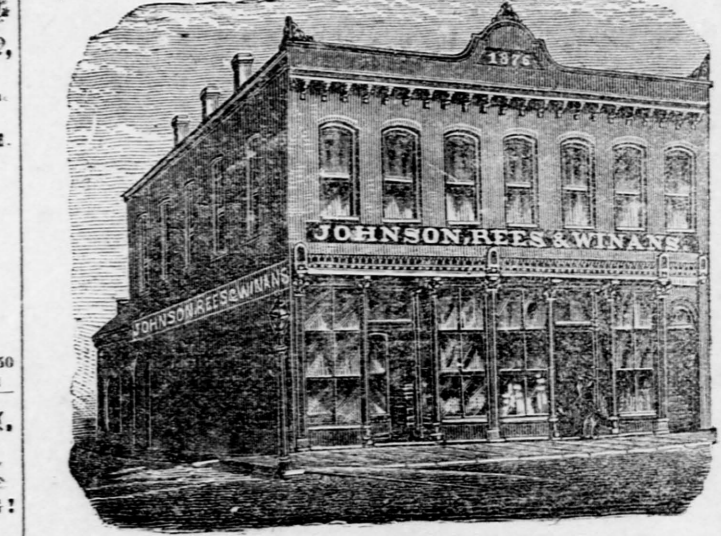
