THE ANONYMOUS LETTER.—Recently, two citizens of Walla Walla have been made the recipients of anonymous letters. While these letters would not, perhaps, eliminate the writer, were he detected, they have the tinge of that which we call blackmail, and are written with some such intention, and to say the least, have caused no little annoyance to those receiving them. Men, or women, who write anonymous letters, are morally and physically arrant cowards. To contentedly meet to face an enemy, they cringe and shrink behind an alias of some kind in order to lead a blow to the peace of a fellow man—sometimes to set about an infamous scandal about a woman. People should remember that an anonymous letter is not a thing for a moment to be afraid of. If the wretch who writes it is treated with contempt, if he is in this way defied to do his worst, and assured that he will receive no concessions of any sort, he will soon cease to write. If life is threatened in such letters, the recipient ought to be particularly at his ease. Men and women who murder, do not write beforehand to state their homicidal intentions. Whoever receives such missives should either take no notice of them, or give the writer to understand that the matter is in the hands of a detective, and that the answer will come from that gentleman.

PALOUSE FAIRPLAY ASSOCIATION.—The Palouse Baptist Association, separated from the Mt. Pleasant Association last year, met at Colfax for its first anniversary Thursday, July 6th, at 10 o'clock, and elected A. D. McMichael, of Spangle, moderator, D. W. O. Burt, of Spokane, treasurer, and Miss L. L. West, of Colfax Academy, clerk. The Association of seven churches set about last year, has gained four churches and about one hundred members for its first annual meeting. Growth was reported on every hand by the letters, though the great advance in numbers is at Moscow, where seven have been baptized and the pastor is requested to give his whole time to the one charge. Churches have been organized at Spokane, Cheney, Lone Pine, Pullman and Pipe City during the year. The Colfax Academy has received free use of a building for an indefinite period. The Spokane church, having raised nearly \$1000, will commence building August 1st. The Moscow church has received the management of a library of 450 volumes, and are looking for other advances. The verbal reports from the churches were very hopeful. The moderator appointed committees on order of business, reports and minutes, home of religion, etc. By order of the body a committee was appointed to confer with a similar committee from the Mt. Pleasant Association concerning a joint work in missions.

D. J. PIERCE. In PARK.—Lieut. Samuel C. Robertson, of the First Cavalry, writing from Paris to an old fellow-campaigner now connected with the STATESMAN, says that he finds the gay French capital somewhat different from Walla Walla, Lewiston, or even Portland, but the force of habit and human discontent with present surroundings are so strong within that he pines even there for a pair of army boots, a miner's coat and another campaign through the Salmon River mountains. He further says that he expected to return to his regiment in August, but was detailed for the French army maneuvers, which will keep him until September. He left the Ecole de Cavalerie on the 1st of June, and will visit the national schools of war of Prussia and England, and will also take in St. Cyr. We are glad to learn that the gallant young gentleman is laying in a stock of knowledge pertaining to the profession that will avail him much in years to come. He also sends a bundle of papers—L'Illustration, Le Vie Parisien, Gauguain's Messenger, the London Graphic, Punch, etc., all of which will be religiously read. Tomorrow being Sunday, we expect to have the first two papers read completely through between reveille and taps, having borrowed an Anglo-French dictionary for the occasion.

NOT GOING TO IRELAND.—We have had two or three whacks at the Sheriff Hatton episode of late, and before our ink becomes dry, some up-down country party trots out a new item relative to the matter, and we have to shape our own to make it tally. We are personally acquainted with Sheriff Hatton—not Hatton—as the Oregonian has it, and do not believe he is a party to all this affair in business. The latest phase of the problem was: "Sheriff Mike Hatton, of Spokane county, W. T., accompanied by F. C. Montgomery, arrived in Portland yesterday with an insane patient for Stelcocon. A recent item stated that Hatton had resigned the office of sheriff to go to Ireland in answer to the requirements of the will of a deceased uncle, who left the fortune Mike the sum of \$15,000. LOSS OF FIRE STEAMER.—By a private letter from the Dulles, received by this morning's mail, we learn that the train from Bonnevile to the Dulles, by which the steamer and hose carts for this city were shipped, struck a fallen rock, near Moister, and three or four cars were thrown from the track and pitched into the Columbia, steamer, hose carts and all. The water at this point is said to be fully 60 feet deep, and it is probable that the apparatus will be a total loss. We also learn that the railway company were bringing the steamer and hose carts free of charge. But this fact is of no account as affecting the loss, since the contract of the city with the Sibley company sets for the terms which may be briefly stated as follows: "For one steamer and two hose carts, the city to pay \$1,000; the sum of \$1,000 to be paid on the delivery here and acceptance by the city of such engine and hose carts." As the company do not in this case deliver the steamer and hose carts here in Walla Walla, and as the railway company has delivered the same to the Columbia river, the adjustment of the loss will fall to these two parties, and Walla Walla will not only not be liable in any way, but experience a saving of \$150 per month, for the present.

THE DENVER EXPOSITION.—Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Nevada and California are all sending specimens to the Denver (Colorado) Exposition, but so far as we have heard, none going from Washington Territory. In the northeastern portion of this Territory magnificent blocks of galena can be readily secured for display at this fair, and from many places in the Pend d'Oreille and Colville regions, handsome specimens of quartz rock could be obtained. At this exposition there will be visitors from all parts of the world, the newspapers will give detailed reports of the showing, and the whole will serve to widely advertise all the localities represented. Washington Territory should share in the display made by the Pacific coast.

Coffin, of Garrison creek, is happy to be in the possession of a promising son and heir. Dr. Boyd reports all doing well. On Garrison creek this morning there was an emigrant party of about 60 people. It is said that the road to Kilton is lined with emigrant teams. Strangers will be allowed to stand on the corners of the streets to-day. The reservation in favor of local politicians only holding until last evening at six o'clock. The little four-year-old daughter of Mr. Samuel Edwards, living just outside the city, afflicted with diphtheria, died last evening. The funeral takes place to-day. He thinks there will be no trouble about getting all the beef cattle needed, within a few weeks. The general condition of the cattle is good. The election at Dayton yesterday was a quiet affair. The following officers were elected: Mayor, D. R. Kimball; Councilmen, L. E. Church, L. E. Harris, J. B. Morris, J. N. Thompson, John Biting, J. M. Goleand, J. K. Richardson, Marshall, A. S. McCauley. The following is the death rate at Seattle for the last fiscal year: Of the deaths, 10 were the result of zymotic diseases, 29 of constitutional, 13 of violence and 9 still-born and unknown; 62 were males and 29 females.
