## What the Breed Does

Herewith are given the results gaine by several members of the Kansas and Iowa Wool-growers Association. They are worth the attention of all interested in the production of wool. Upon one farm 50 acres of sorghum cane-one-half ut and the other half left standingupported 2,000 sheep during the winte n good condition. One breeder stated that his stock of full-blood merinos averaged twelve pounds of unwashed wool per head, and that he could make a pound of nutton from them as easily as from any other breed. From another source it was learned that a flock of 177 pure merinos also averaged twelve pounds of wool, and that 64 sheep had been fed on two pounds of hay per day for twelve days, and 56 bounds of corn. The Cotswolds have been known to weigh as high as 400 pounds, but the merinos was the hardiest. The latter were in favor with buyers for the reason that the pelts pull from two to three pounds more wool than the cross-breeds or common sheep. # The Condition of the Crops.

But one week remains of the first summer month, and although there has been much alarm on account of cold and wet weather since the middle of April, it must be admitted that the crop prospects are now very fine. The wheat crop is rapidly maturing and a great harvest seems almost assured. In the couthwest nuch grain has been cut and the greater part of the winter wheat will be gathered during the next three weeks. The spring wheat will be somewhat later, and must take more risk of injury by drought. The largest wheat crop in the history of the country was in 1880, which amounted to 480,000,000 bushels. It is believed that a harvest of 400,000,000 bushels may be confidently expected this year, and if the grain now in good condition matures well, the yield may be as great as in 1880. The season has been peculiarly favorable for oats and barley, which require cool weather and a damp soil. Corn is backward, but very large corn crops have fre & CAVANAGH quently followed very late springs. Severe drought and late frosts are the chief peril of this important crop. The year 1889 gave us nearly 2,000,000,-000 bushels of corn, while 1881 gave less than half as much. 




