FROM BITTER ROOT .- Mr. Shockley gives us the following from Bitter Root and the country east:

There are five grist mills in course of erection in the Bitter Root valley, all of which will be completed this fall.
The crops in the valley did not promise an abundant yield. The fall wheat had been winter-killed. The spring wheat was most promising.

Flour, supplied from Salt Lake, was selling in the valley at \$20 per hundred.

Five steamboats, from St. Louis, had arrived at Fort Benton, up to the middle of June, and five or six more were daily ex-

June, and five or six more were daily expected.

A general stampede of miners had taken place to the Big. Blackfoot river, where report said very rich gold mines had been discovered. Nothing definite was known about the mines when Mr. Shockley left.

The mines discovered adjacent to the Bitter Root valley, which were discovered last spring, are paying well. The diggings are "spotted," however, and the paying claims, so far as discovered, appear to be pretty generally taken up. The richest diggings are on the head of the Little Blackfoot and in Last Chance Gulch, just beyond the divide of the Rocky mountains. The former mines extend along the river for about six miles, and the richest claims pay from \$100 to \$200 per day. Two men on Last Chance Gulch bought a claim recently for which they paid \$11,000 and they took the amount out of the claim in six days.

About, five hundred men—including those who went from the Cœur d'Alenc—have gone from this side into that country this season.

Sovereions.—The business men of this place have, by common consent, ceased to take English sovereigns at five dellars. Instead of taking them at more than their actual value, they have now fallers a few centre below it and take them at \$4,75. This step has been rendered necessary from the fact that speculators have flooded the country with sovereigns to such an extent that for a long time they have constituted the major portion of the "floos" in circulation, and they will not pass for more than their actual value of this coin, and as there is a chance now for "speculators" to make nine cents on each piece by buying them if p and shipping them below, we may hope to see them all cleared from the country soon and their places occupied by U. S. fives.

How Bodies are Embalmed.

How Bodies are Embalmed.

By embalming, people generally are apt to imagine that the modern process consists of saturating, filling and surrounding the dead body with spice, gums and other indestructible and preservative substances, as its understood to have been the process practiced by the ancients. Such, however, is not the case. The modern process is about as follows: The blood is drawn off through the jugular vein. An incision is then made upon the inside of the thigh, through which a chemical liquid is injected by mechanical means. This permentes all the veins and arteries, taking the place before occupied by the blood, and a short time renders the body as hard as stone and as rigid as a statue. A portion of the sealp is removed and the brain scooped out. The chest is opened and the heart, lungs and viscera are abstracted. When the process is completed, the body is reduced to a were empty shell, having only the outward semblance of the departed individual. How long a body thus prepared will remain unchanged we cannot say. The process has only been employed for a few years—since the war commenced, we believe—so that time enough has not clapsed to test the indestructibility of bodies thus prepared.
