THE BUFFALO.

In going down the Yellowstone and across the vast region lying between Glendive and Mandan, says the Helena, Mont., Independent, one is struck with the evident scarcity of game. This famous region, where two or three years ago herds of buffalo, antelope and deer were to be seen on every side is now, to all appearances, stripped of its game. For the entire distance from Livingston to Mandan I only saw two or three small bands of antelope and not a sign of a deer or buffalo. The fact is the slaughter of buffalos and deer has been immense for the past two years and particularly the former. It is estimated that during the last winter there have been 1000 hunters engaged in the business of slaughtering buffalo along the line of the Northern Pacific, between Mandan and Livingston. An eagle eyed hunter got aboard of the train at Glendive, and he gave me the following details as to the modus operandi in slaughtering herds of buffalo: In the first place, the hunter uses the Sharpe rifle, 40-90 calibre. With this he can kill at 1000 yards. When he sees a herd of buffalo he usually slips up to within convenient range, from 300 to 500 yards, and always selects a cow for his first victim. He does this for the reason that the cow is followed by both her yearlings and two-year old calves, and they usually stand by her to the last. But under no circumstances will the experienced hunter kill the buffalo outright. If he does, the herd will stampede at once. The policy is to wound fatally, but so that the animal will dash around in a circle before falling. This it always does when mortally wounded, and after a few moments lies down. The remainder of the herd are not alarmed at this, but continue to gaze or look on, fixed spectators of the tragedy being enacted. After his first shot the hunter pauses until quiet is restored, and again fires at another cow with similar results. He always aims to put his ball just behind the fore-shoulder which will cause death in five minutes at the furthest. When cows have all been slain he turns his attention to the calves, and lastly to the bulls. The experienced hunter generally bags the entire herd, unless he is so unfortunate as to drop his gun immediately, when the survivors stampede at once. The buffalo does not seem to be afraid of a gun. He has decided more courage than discretion. It is only when the crack is followed by an immediate fall that he realizes its deadly nature and takes the alarm. The policy of killing the cows first and then the calves has resulted almost in the extinction of the female buffalo. Herds of melancholy bulls can still occasionally be seen, sometimes in bands of twenty or thirty, and often without a single cow. The few remaining cows now have the pick of lovers, and always choose from the young bloods of the herd.

The buffalo bull, after he passes his fourth year, loses his attractiveness to the opposite sex, and the aversion seems to be mutual. Gathering about him his bachelor friends of equal age, he sullenly retires into the wilderness and forever avoids the female members of the herd, who mate with younger and more uxorious masculines. As I have said, the bulls are about all that are now left of the buffalo. They are largely cow hunters, and the fact that their hides are less valuable than those of the cows, while at the same time they are far more difficult to kill. The hide of the bull is only worth to the hunter from \$1.50 to \$2, while that of the cow brings \$1.25, and that of the year-old calf is worth from \$1.00 to \$1.50. But of late there has sprang up quite a demand throughout the East for the head of the buffalo bull. The well-preserved head of an aged bull, decked out with glass eyes, and horns intact, will readily sell for \$25 in the Eastern market. Consequently the buffalo hunter, to the detriment of a destructive war on the bull tribe, and these venerable relics of a bygone era will also pass swiftly away.

THE KILLING OF CAREY.

Further Particulars of O'Donnell's Rash Deed—The Mayor Condemns.

CAPE TOWN, Aug. 1.—O'Donnell was examined before a Port Elizabeth magistrate to-day on a charge of murder of James Carey, the informer. According to the evidence given, Carey and O'Donnell had been drinking in the second cabin just before the murder. When the steamer was about half way between Sable Bay and Algoa Bay O'Donnell suddenly shot Carey in the neck with a revolver. Carey staggered away. O'Donnell followed and shot him twice in the back. Carey died in twenty minutes. O'Donnell says that he was in California diggings and lost largely in silver mines. He was unaware of Carey's identity until he saw it stated in the papers who Power was. He then determined to kill him. O'Donnell was accompanied by Mrs. Carey. She deposed at the examination that after the murder she asked O'Donnell "did you shoot my husband?" and he replied "yes, I was sent to do it."

Unauthenticated rumors are current that O'Donnell is a relative of Joe Brady, one of the Phoenix park murderers hanged recently, and the vigilantes are cognizant of the alibi of Peter Carey. A fund is being collected in London to be used in defending O'Donnell.

A BRAVE GANG.

Two Men With One Pistol Succeed in Stealing Up a Stage Coach With Six Men on Board—W. F. & Co.'s Treasure Box Captured, Besides Money and Jewelry.

From Mr. J. A. Tennell, a resident of Union, Oregon, we learn the following particulars of the overland stage robbery which occurred yesterday, 17 miles southeast of Pendleton, and four miles from what is called New Station, in the Blue Mountains. Mr. Tennell, who was one of the passengers, states that the stage, on which there were six passengers, one of them being a lady, with Division Agent Barger as driver, was proceeding slowly up a short incline, when two masked men suddenly presented themselves in front of the horses, covered the driver, and ordered him to halt, at the same time commanding him to throw down the Walls, Fargo & Co. treasure box. These orders were promptly complied with, and the driver covered while the other coolly proceeded to "go through" the "brave passengers." From a Mr. Burrell, traveling for a Milwaukee beer firm, the robbers got a \$250 gold watch and about \$300 in coin. Aside from this the haul was light, aggregating all possibly \$735 in coin and two or three watches. The road agents returned \$5 to one of the victims, as a reward for his honesty in yielding up promptly.

Mr. Tennell states that if he had been possessed of a revolver, he could have shot both of the men. It was the weakest piece of business he ever saw, and as he states, he has been "held up" on the road several times, he ought to be a good judge. It looks queer to us when we think that six stalwart men will allow themselves to be coolly robbed by two road agents, with one pistol covering the victim's party. After cleaning the stage out to suit themselves, the highwaymen peremptorily commanded the stage to "move on," which order was complied with at once. Upon arriving at Pendleton, the alarm was given and a sheriff's posse at once started in pursuit. The loss to Walls, Fargo & Co. cannot be ascertained until the report of forwarding agents come in. Mail sacks which were in the boot were not disturbed.

Mayor Tannatt Interviewed by a "Statesman Reporter and the General Treasury Officer as to the Position—Why he will not Sign the Warrants.

There is some little growing on the street to-day by parties who had claims allowed against the city at the last regular meeting of the Council, they being unable to get their money from the fact that Mayor Tannatt refused to sign the warrants. This morning a STATESMAN reporter called upon his Honor, and asked that gentleman if such was the case. "Yes," said Mr. Tannatt, "I declined to sign those warrants, and notified the clerk to that effect."

"On what grounds did you decline to sign the same," was asked. "Those warrants," said the general, "originated from the Finance Committee of the old Council, and were ordered paid by that Council, Mayor McLaughlin presiding. The Finance Committee of the present Council have not acted upon those bills, and the present Council is the only one from which I can derive any authority to make a warrant upon the City Treasury, and I am so advised by good legal authority."

"How do you propose that these drafts should have been paid?" asked the reporter. "The warrants," said Mr. Tannatt, "should either have been signed by the executive officer of the old Council, or laid upon the table for action by the new Council. Unhappily these are the just bills against the city, of which the Improvement company carry the largest claim. They are not expenditures of the new Council; they have not been audited by a new Finance Committee, and cannot be made to appear on expenditures of the present city government. The proper course is to refer the bills to the Finance Committee of the present Council; being approved by them it is my duty to sign the warrants, it being understood by the Finance Committee that it is not a debt incurred by the present Council. The tabulated statement officially published prior to the last meeting of the old Council virtually represented that the city was about \$1000 in debt. The report of Finance Committee submitted to old Council showed a different state of affairs and a discrepancy, to which Councilman Fletcher objected."
