Money Market. San Francisco Local Tender rates. New York Gold Quotations.

THE VETTER DIVORCE CASE was called for trial before Judge Kennedy, of the District Court, yesterday. Up to this writing but one witness has been examined, and thus far no material fact not already known, has been disclosed.

DISTRICT CLERK.—Judge Kennedy has signified his intention to retain R. P. Reynolds in the position of District Clerk. In our intercourse with Mr. P. we have found him gentlemanly, and accommodating, and baring his black republicanism, we regard him as a clever fellow.

FRESH CIDER.—The printing office is indebted to Mr. John Hancock for a plentiful supply of fresh cider, manufactured by him at his orchard, some ten miles below town. This cider appears to have "body," and with age promises to be an excellent article. Mr. H. has provided himself with the very best machinery for the manufacture of cider, and will convert green fruit into a delightful beverage at a very small cost to the fruit grower.

THE WHEAT MARKET.—It is too early in the season to fix a standard of value for the new wheat coming into market. For the present the millers decline to make contracts, and farmers are shy about entering into engagements. A mill owner on the Upper Touchet has bought small lots at 75 cents, which may be regarded as the ruling rate. Holders, however, are sanguine that wheat will bring \$1 before the close of the season, and prefer to hold for an advance.

LEUT. JOHN PULLMAN, a Walla Walla youth, graduated with the highest honors of his class at West Point, arrived here a day or two since on a visit to his old friends and relatives. Lieut. P. has a three months' leave of absence, at the expiration of which he will join his regiment, the 8th Cavalry, now on duty in Arizona. Our young friend was appointed to West Point on the recommendation of Geo. E. Cole, and his career in the Academy was eminently creditable to the Territory from which he hailed.

HON. J. R. KENNEDY, the newly appointed Judge for the First Judicial District, arrived at Walla Walla in the early part of the week, and at once entered upon discharge of his official duties. Judge Kennedy is extremely radical in politics, but being a courteous, genial gentleman, and withal a thorough trained lawyer, we feel quite sure that he will fill his high office to the satisfaction of the people of the District. A stranger in our midst, we bespeak for him what we know he will receive—a courteous reception.

AT HOME.—Our friend, and everybody's friend, Charles Russell, has returned from his hurried trip to the Atlantic States. Mr. R. returned by way of the overland railroad, having come through from Omaha in six days. He speaks in high terms of the railroad; says that it is better than the best of the Eastern roads, and that traveling by rail is a pleasure. He also has a good word for Halley's stage line, which he says is complete in all its appointments and run with special regard to the comfort and convenience of passengers.

A CAUSE.—Our radical friends held a caucus at the Internal Revenue office, on Tuesday afternoon, for the purpose of passing upon the claims of Col. Cook and Dr. Cox, rival aspirants for the Governorship of the Territory. The caucus seemed to have been got up under the auspices of Gov. Ballard, of Idaho, and Dr. Bailey, of Oregon. The attendance was quite large and embraced leading radicals from all parts of the valley, the majority of whom were in the interest of Dr. Cox. Col. Cook's friends, however, were too smart to be caught in the trap set for them, and so after a couple of hours spent in a vain endeavor to harmonize conflicting interests, the caucus adjourned without having accomplished anything. We give our radical friends the benefit of this notice free of charge, and by way of conclusion suggest that although Gov. Ballard and Dr. Bailey are very clever gentlemen, we yet think it is best to trust them to middle in the local politics of Washington Territory.

THE MINING TRADE.—There is not a day passes that does not witness the departure of one or more trains for the mines. As a rule these trains are mainly loaded with flour and provisions, the product of this valley, thus bringing to us a constant stream of treasure very little of which is sent abroad to pay for importations. A community that sells more than it buys is on the high road to prosperity, and thus being the condition of Walla Walla Valley, we are assured of a prosperous future. As indicating the business for the week ending with this date, we give a list of the trains fitted out by I. T. Reese, and Jordan & Co., houses largely engaged in the mining trade: E. T. Cable, 32 packs, for Granite Creek, Oregon; John Harvey, 30 packs, for Montana; C. H. Davis, 35 packs, for Burnt River, Oregon; James Smith, 30 packs, for Kootenai; Hank & Yank, 60 packs, Helena, M. T.; Raffel Cararra, 40 packs, Montana; H. L. Smith, 30 packs, Blackfoot; John Welch, 35 packs, Blackfoot. These trains were all loaded with flour, whiskey, and assorted stocks of general merchandise. In addition to the above, Mr. Reese also shipped 20,000 lbs of flour to Idaho by teams. He also made a shipment of one thousand barrels of flour to a Dalles operator. This is a summary of the operations of but two establishments. Other business houses have done a fair trade with the mines, as also for home consumption, the whole of which, when footed up, shows a business activity that places Walla Walla at the head of commercial centres in the Northern country.

MAMMOTH WAGON.—Mr. P. M. Lynch has recently turned out at his shop in this city, a mammoth wagon, which is a curiosity in its way and well merits a description. It is built after the style of the "prairie schooner," familiar to all old Californians. Height of wheels, 6 1/2 feet; tires, 1 1/2 inches thick; bed 18 feet long and 5 feet high; capacity 10,000 pounds, exclusive of feed for animals, or a total capacity of 11,500 pounds. This wagon is built of the best Eastern timber, is heavily ironed throughout, and for the purpose of transportation is unequaled by any wagon in the country. This wagon was built at the cost of \$750, which is less than inferior wagons can be laid down for from below. Persons requiring substantial freight wagons should examine this specimen of Mr. Lynch's handiwork.
