WARREN'S CAMP.

EASTERN NEWS.—Late dispatches state that the jury in the Surratt case failed to agree; they stood 9 for conviction and 3 for acquittal. The President has notified Secretary Stanton that his resignation will be accepted; the latter refuses to resign and most likely will be suspended from the duties of his office...

THE METEOR.—Montana papers of August 3d, had full accounts of the meteor of the 21st ult. They all agree in describing it as a most brilliant exhibition of heavenly fireworks. Victoria papers also speak of it in the same general terms, and say that "its brilliancy was unequalled by any previous meteoric display in that latitude..."

THE SOUTH PASS MINE.—From gentlemen and private letters from Utah, we learn that the Indians have gotten the best of the miners in the Wind River Mountains, and have driven them out. It is generally understood that there were not over 150 or 200 men in the mines, and the Indians killing two or three of them, the rest packed up and are returning to Salt Lake. The places are reported to prospect well, and one quartz ledge discovered was very rich. The mining region is situated near South Pass. Of its extent we are uninformed, but experienced miners are pleased with the appearance of the country and believe it abounds in the precious metals.—Montana Post.

THE FIRST OF THE SEASON.—On Friday evening and Saturday morning, three emigrant wagons arrived in Virginia from the States, being the only ones that have yet arrived. One belonged to some Iowa men, another to Rev. Chas. King, and the other to Mr. Wm. Lewis. The latter left St. Joe on the 21st of April, accompanied by O. D. King, and in traveling along they finally found themselves a portion of a train of 60 wagons, destined for Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and California. They were repeatedly attacked by Indians, but lost only one man. A large portion of the train stopped in Denver, fearing to attempt the trip to the localities they started for, and the balance journeyed on until they reached Fort Bridger, where they divided up. The immigration is light.—Montana Post.
