> FUNERAL OF A WHITE ELEPHANT. - A curious ceremony has recently taken place at Siam, on the occasion of the death of the Siam, on the occasion of the death of the eldest of the white clephants—one of the idols of the Siamese. He was born in 1770, and died in his temple at Bangkok. A whole people bow down before this famous Albino divinity; it is the emblem of the kindom of Siam. The most beauti ul presents are given to these animals, because, influenced by a belief in metempsychosis, the Indians believe, even at the present day, that so majestic an animal cannot but be animated by the spirit of a cond or emperor. Every white elephant animal cannot but be animated by the spirit of a god or emperor. Every white elephant possesses its own palace, gold dishes, and har-ness studded with precious stones. Several Mandarms are appointed to wait upon it, and they feed it with cakes and sugar-canes. The King of Siam is the only person before whom it bends its knee, and the monarch re-turns this salutation. Magnificent obsequies were prepared for the defunct idol. Some hundreds of buddhist priests officiated at the funeral ceremony. The three surviving white elephants, preceded by trumpeters, and followed by an numense concourse of people, accompanied the funeral car to the banks of the Menam, whither the King and the great dignitaries of the state had come to receive the remains. They were then transported to the other side of the river, and there buried. A procession of thirty vessels, decked with flags formed a part of this curious ceremony. All the floating houses, which are ranged in a double line, on the Menam, numbering 60,000, were ornamented with flags, of all colors, and other symbolic attributes.

After long reflection he came to the conclusion that the large trees acted as conductors of electricity, and the prived the undergrowth of an element necessary to their full development. In order to test his views he tried a series of experiments on various plants, but we need only refer to one, which, although not the most striking, will fully elucidate the principle he advances, the means he employed, and the results obtained. In April 1877, he took two tobacco plants, each weighing 3½ grammes, and having four leaves. They were both planted in boxes containing mold of identical quality, and placed side by side in a position fa-vorable to their growth. But one of them had placed over it a cage, consisting of four iron rods 1 metre 50 centimetres high, joined at the top and covered with wire gauze, which permitted the free cir-culation of air, light, and water, but completely protected the plant from the action of atmospheric electricity. They were left uninterfered with until the middle of August, when the results obtained were as follows: The plant in the open air had attained a hight of 3 feet 5 inches, while the other was only 2 feet 4 inches; the former weighed 273 grammes, and the



FRECKLES.-Physicians tell us freekles are constitutional, always present, for which there is no remedy; or accidental, appearing only in summer on persons who have a very delicate skin. The following are among the best remedies known, and none of them injurious to the complexion:
Into half a pint of milk squeeze the juice
of a lemon, add a tablespoonful of brandy,
boil, skim; add a tablespoonful of alum;
apply to the face night and morning. Or, into a pint of sour milk scrape half as much horse-radish, next day strain, and apply morning, noon and night. Or, put a teaspoonful of powdered borax into the juice of one lemon, put it into a glass juice of one lemon, put it into a grass bottle, and apply twice a day. Or, powdered alum, one ounce; lemon juice one ounce; rose-water, one pint; shake and dissolve; apply two or three times a day.

NEW PROCESS FOR DRYING FRUIT .-The Sacramento Bee notices a new process for drying fruit, which was accidentally The Sacramento Bee notices a new process for drying fruit, which was accidentally discovered. The superintendent of the Placerville foundry, having placed some apples in the cold air draft of the furnace, found that after a few hour's exposure to the current they were cured in a very superior manner. Further experiments led to the belief that this mode of drying will be found preferable to the hot air process, as it saves the expense of fuel, and the blast of cold air frees the fruit from moisture without the possibility of from moisture without the possibility of The result is said to be much more satisfactory than even that produced by drying, while the time required is much less and the work can be carried on without regard to weather.

EARTH DEPRESSION IN FRANCE.—A lit tle village in the neighborhood of Draguinan, France, has, says Nature, lately been the scene of a remarkable subsi dence, which has attracted the curious from all directions. An elliptical tract of ground, containing over 10,000 square feet, sank gradually one day, accompanied by loud noises, until it left an orifice of over 100 feet in depth, with water at the bottom. Numerous trees and vines disappeared completely in the depths of the new lake. A similar depression on a smal-lar scale occurred in the same vicinity a century ago, and both the phenomena are attributed to the action of subterranean




