IGNORED.—The Grand Jury in the case of Charles Umber, charged with grand larceny, ignored the bill, and the prisoner was discharged from custody.

WHITMAN SEMINARY.—It will be noticed that Rev. P. B. Chamberlain again takes charge of the Whitman Seminary. This will be good news for parents and others having children to educate, and we doubt not the Seminary will be doubly benefited.

GEORGE FAIRBANKS, a dramatic reader and actor of very considerable reputation, will arrive here in a day or two, when he will give a series of dramatic entertainments.

THE LITTLE SHYLOCKS are said to be greatly offended at our remarks in relation to the establishment of a legitimate banking institution in our midst. These fellows have grown rich off their three and five per cent. a month, and are indignant that anybody should come between them and their pious "fish."

DIFFICULT TASK.—On Thursday afternoon, the Clerk of the District Court undertook to read the report of the Grand Jury, but was unable to accomplish the task, the difficulty being in bringing his mouth into the proper position. Judge Kennedy finally came to his relief and succeeded in reading the paper.

"STILL THEY COME!"—Mr. A. Frank continues to receive daily shipments of goods, direct from San Francisco, which makes his stock one of the best ever brought to this market. Mr. F. has always dealt liberally with the packers and farmers, and in return they continue to patronize him.

THE MURDER CASE.—The continuation of the case of John Gholston, charged with murder, involves the confinement of the accused in the county jail for the next six months. The prisoner stands indicted for murder in the first degree, and under our statutes this is not a bailable offence.

More New Goods.—We notice that Johnson & Rees are now daily receiving new supplies of goods, and judging from the crowd that may be daily seen at their store, they are selling their goods almost as rapidly as they receive them.

To the Hon. Court of the First Judicial District of Washington Territory. The Grand Jury has been in continuous session since the first day of this October term to this time.

Amount Warrants outstanding May 1, 1869, \$9,376 08. Am't issued since May 1, to Oct. 1, 1869, \$3,035 37.

Total, \$12,411 45. Total cancelled since May 1, to Oct. 1, 1869, \$7,415 22. Outstanding Oct. 1, 1869, \$4,996 23.

THE HON. GRAND JURY, October Term, 1869. GENTLEMEN: The foregoing exhibits the amount of outstanding warrants October 1, 1869, without interest accrued, which, owing to the limited time at my command, I have not computed.

THE TOTAL TAX levied for the current year, for all purposes, amounts to the sum of \$4,241 10. I have set apart for the County Fund, and will be when collected, applicable to the payment of the same.

WE HAVE EXAMINED the books in the Treasury, and find them to correspond with the Treasurer's report, as follows: COUNTY TREASURER'S REPORT, Oct. 1, 1869.

TERMINAL FUND, \$1,123 20. COUNTY FUND, \$4,874 10. COUNTY FUND, \$11 47. CURRENT EXPENSE, \$197 16. ROAD FUND, \$1,248 53.

WE FIND the Auditor and Treasurer's books to be kept in an intelligible and proper manner, as far as we can judge from a cursory examination.

WE HAVE EXAMINED the County Jail, and find confined therein five persons, of which two are city prisoners, incarcerated for violations of city ordinances.

WE DEEM the jail insecure, and find, under the existing condition of our Territory, having no Penitentiary building within its limits, that the county jail is convicted of the highest crimes, and condemned to the Penitentiary, as well as for persons guilty of no crime under the law, only awaiting trial, and that all who may be confined therein, whether innocent individuals or felons of the darkest dye, are compelled to associate together there.

WE SUGGEST there should be a certain number of cells partitioned off from the others for Penitentiary convicts and desperate characters, which should be secured in the best possible manner, perhaps lined with boiler iron, and so arranged that those confined therein could have no access to the rest of the jail, or be permitted to have intercourse with those confined for minor offences or no offence at all, until such time that other and better provisions are made for this class of criminals.

WE SUGGEST the entire jail yard should be relieved with boards on the inside, to stop the many holes therein, and prevent communication from the outside. Respectfully submitted, D. S. BAKER, Foreman Grand Jury.

LATEST EASTERN NEWS. Dates to Sept. 30.

[COMPILED FROM THE HERALD.] NEW YORK NEWS.

New York, Sept. 29.—Stormy debates have occurred in the gold room. There was alternate remarkable depression and buoyancy. Failures, receiverships and injunctions form a group of events which made the day without an equal in the annals of Wall street.

New York, Sept. 30.—The Times says of the failure of Lockwood & Co., that Lockwood & Co. and all their colleagues have placed their entire personal property in the hands of J. Packer, to whom they made an assignment for the benefit of their creditors.

At the Fifth Avenue Hotel last night there was an excited crowd until midnight. The general feeling was that relief was at hand and men could again breathe freely. It was generally thought that the depression in stocks is due to the stringency of the money market produced by delay in effecting the clearances of gold and currency accounts on Broad street.

The Times says an application for an injunction against the gold room selling Smith, Gould & Martin under the rules, makes an extraordinary confession that forty million dollars of gold were bought and sold on account of the plaintiffs (Gould & Smith) in a single day.

Key West, Sept. 30.—Advices from Nassau state that five Cubans arrived there on the 22d from Quesada's camp. Gen. Quesada sent by them twenty thousand dollars for the purchase of arms. The attack on Los Altos was a victory for the Cubans.

Washington, Sept. 30.—The special Commissioner of Internal Revenue decides that wholesale apothecaries and druggists, doing business under a regular license, must cease to sell liquors in quantities less than half a pint a time, or pay the special tax required of liquor dealers.

Chicago, Sept. 30.—The Tribune's New York special says the financial skies are brightening somewhat, though they are far from clear. Smith, Gould, Martin & Co., is the only firm which was refused. There has been one cause for their failure to resume business which is, that the firm holds about six millions of gold and the gold board is short that amount.

The gold exchange bank appears in a dark situation and probably cannot survive, it being understood to have loaned heavily to Lockwood & Co. The feeling against Smith, Gould & Martin is very bitter for delaying the adjustment of their difficulties and the resumption of business mainly depends upon them.
