

Public Meeting.

A public meeting will be held at the Court House on Monday evening next, at 7 1/2 o'clock, for the purpose of taking action in relation to opening of the Mullan Road, and looking more particularly to securing from Congress an appropriation for this purpose.

District Court.—The October term of this Court commenced on Monday last. There are about sixty-five cases on the docket, civil and criminal, and more than half of the cases have been disposed of.

Boise City Correspondence.

BOISE CITY, I. T., Oct. 5th, 1866.

FRIEND NEWELL:—It would be hard to find a more generally fine climate for a farmer; perhaps a few lazy ones may think eight or ten inches of snow, for two months, too large a supply of that article, but it is beneficial and preferable to no snow at all; in this altitude where we must have some frost.

Grape vines bore a little this season, and do well. Small fruits, such as currants &c., produce so abundantly that there are more fruit than leaves. Apples thrive well, in fact Mr. Walling says that the difficulty is to start fruit and after that they do better than below.

The different prices for produce are as follows: Barley and oats, 5 cents; wheat 4 1/2 cts; corn, 5 cents; hay, \$25 delivered in town; potatoes, 2 cents; onions, 5 cents, and other things in proportion.

News from Alturas county furnishes the following: Mr. Green, Supt. of the Waddingham G. & S. M. Co., has returned from Salt Lake with supplies of money for repairs and to set the mill going.

Letter from La Grand.

LA GRAND, October 24, 1866.

ED. STATESMAN:—The people of Walla Walla are more or less interested in the resources, prospective and actual, of Eagle Creek, and a word from that corner will interest many of your readers.

The "La Grand Gold and Silver Mining Company" have their office in La Grand. They own nine mining claims, or 2700 feet on each of nine different ledges; five of which promises well, and three are rich, one, the "Gem Ledge" is very rich; five low, worked in an arastra, yielded \$113 per ton, and was only an average lot of quartz.

The "Humboldt Gold and Silver Mining Company" have their office in Gem City, and have 2700 feet on each of nine different ledges. They own in all, 24,300 feet of quartz. The company have done all their own work. All their ledges have been improved, and five of them made real estate.

The "Granite Mountain Company" have their office in Portland, and have 5,000 feet of quartz in all; they own in the 'Portland,' 'Oregon,' 'Nelson,' and 'S. Y. Cook' ledges. The company have a water wheel erected and in motion, (a turbine) that gives them 30 horse power; they have a furnace built but have not got in all their amalgamating pans yet.

I have not examined the copper interest much; I hear the 'Shriver Copper,' and the 'Eighty per cent,' mint 90 per cent, the 'Cheek-mate' and the 'Grand Daddy,' (three ledges) are spoken very highly of.

Report of Grand Jury.

To the Hon. District Court of the 1st Judicial District, W. T.—We, the Grand Jury, having completed our labors, beg leave to report as follows, to wit:

That we have found and submitted to the Court two indictments; one for Grand Larceny, one for selling liquor to the Indians; also that we have examined the County jail; we find five prisoners confined therein; W. Adams, confined for life; Thomas Davis for one year; Chas. Hanbert, confined for safe keeping upon a charge of grand larceny; C. Newland, in custody to await trial for selling liquor to Indians; also one Barrer, committed at the last term of District Court. We think the jail is tolerable safe; but we recommend that a fence be built from the corner of the jail at the foot of the stairs, east to the fence; also a fence from the south-west corner of the jail, west to the fence; said fence to be twelve feet high and substantially built, so that the jail yard can be kept free from tools, wood and clothes-lines.

We would recommend that public gambling be suspended, and that the Legislature pass an act (stringent) in relation thereto. We would further recommend that all classes of citizens uphold the laws of the country, and keep a strict observance of the same.

OREGON.—The Agriculturist, published at Salem, tells a story of a New York merchant inquiring "how far Oregon was from Chicago?" Oregonians who have traveled in the Eastern States report an ignorance scarce conceivable in relation to this part of the Pacific coast.

Walla Walla Agricultural Society.

THE first annual meeting of the Walla Walla Agricultural Society was held on the Fair grounds, Walla Walla County, W. T., October 5, 1866.

The President having called the meeting to order, proceeded to deliver his annual address, in a style perspicuous, lucid and fluent, reminding the Society of what had been done, pointing out what ought to be done, and showing, with the proper cooperation of the citizens, what will be accomplished in developing the resources of the country.

The President having concluded his address, Hon. J. E. Wyche was called on, who addressed the Society and audience in relation to agricultural affairs. The Judge's speech was to the point; he urged the farmers and stock raisers of the valley to put forth their united efforts to promote their own interest, which is identical with the interest of the whole country, and argued that they could not more effectually and wisely do so than by encouraging and patronizing Agricultural Fairs.

The next thing in order being the election of officers for the ensuing year, H. P. Isaacs, Thos. McCoy, and T. G. Lee were put in nomination for President. A vote being taken, resulted in the re-election of H. P. Isaacs, President. T. P. Denny and W. K. Stark were elected Vice Presidents.

Wm. Shelton, D. M. Jesse, and T. G. Lee were elected an Executive Committee. Thos. McCoy was elected Treasurer. J. H. Blewett was elected Secretary. There being no further business, on motion the Society adjourned.

HOP CULTURE.—We were pleased to notice on exhibition at the County Fair, specimens of hops grown in this valley. A small and apparently unimportant article, the specimen came very high being overlooked, and it is only by accident that it is mentioned in the list of premiums. It is unfortunate that so few persons are posted in regard to the cultivation of hops, and from want of knowledge fail to engage in a remunerating branch of industry.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

WALLA WALLA, Oct. 9, 1866.

Council met at the usual hour, present, Messrs. Stone, McKee, and Wineset; Mr. Stone in the chair. Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.

The Committee on Streets and Public Improvements, to whom had been referred the bill of A. McKay, contractor for grading Main street, asked further time to make report, which on motion was granted until next regular meeting.

On motion, the Clerk was instructed to notify Mr. John Moore, owner of lot No. 4, block No. 10, to have the same enclosed with a fence forthwith.

A petition numerous signed, asking Board to purchase ground and house on First street, property of A. S. Riner, was read and on motion laid on the table.

Several names appeared before the Council and complained that the contractors for grading Main street, had left the side streets in bad condition, by dropping and leaving there large quantities of stone, and asked that the same be removed.

On motion, the Clerk was instructed to notify the contractors that they are required to clean up the streets used by them in hauling gravel to Main street, without delay.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the election of Councilman, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Ryan. B. N. Sexton being placed in nomination, was elected by a unanimous vote on first ballot.

The Clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Sexton of his election. No further business appearing, on motion the Council adjourned.

Letter from Montana.

BOULDER VALLEY, MONTANA, Sept. 23d, 1866.

MR. EDITOR:—As our papers are full of glowing accounts in relation to new discoveries, feel confident that a few lines from your humble correspondent will not altogether escape the notice of your readers.

Green River discoveries and excitements are next in order, but the Indians in that section are very troublesome. One report, which has every mark of credibility, is in circulation that a party of seventy miners were attacked, 43 of them killed, and the remainder scattered in all directions. The existence of gold there is beyond a doubt, \$8 and \$9 diggings have been found and worked. But for the present Green River will be abandoned, as the winter is close at hand.

The Wind River excitement also prevails and is founded upon reliable information, as to its richness; but there to the industrious miner to hasten and cause a way to return and await for spring.

Saw River, between Benton and Helena, is famous for its richness, and the Blood Indians who inhabit that section of the country, offer little inducement to prospectors. Pipe Stone Park and Fort Lumbis excitements had all their turn, and I have every reason to believe that there will be more many obtained out of the above named diggings next year than there has been the present season.
