Wallula Correspondence.
Wallula, October 10, '68.
ED. STATESMAK:—We notice that several "homres" have been trying their skill in deciphering the cabalistic heading to the (now) celebrated "Drake's Plantation Bitters," but thus far all have failed, to give a true solution of these mysteries. Suppose you permit me to give to the public the true reading of the rubus, which stares us in the face at every turn in the streets or on the road

In the first place, I will begin at the beginning. The signet in the center, of a half moon, and a kind of shepherd rod and crook, is an after thought, and was not used until after it became an established fact that the Bitters would win. The moon and hook is a portion of their devices they don't care about having exposed, but as I don't write this like "Ringbolt," whose letter is spread out in the Portland Herald, as an advertisement, I will continue the whole expose. The signet should read thus:

"Having convinced the people that the most

"Having convinced the people that the moon is made of green cheese; whose component parts are 'Plantation Bitters;' we now stand ready with our hook, to take in the coin."

Reader "you have it before you," a true definition of the mysterious letters and figures that constantly stare you in the face, from bottle, placard, sides of houses and fences. Go into New York City, and during the day you will see wagons about thirty feet long, perfectly illuminated with "Plantation Bitters, 21, Park Row, New York." At night, the same moving panor rams of "Plantation Bitters" is lighted up in splendid shape. You cannot help noticing them, and in noticing, can't help but read.

I hope that I have succeded, in the language of P. H. Drake & Co.'s advertisement, in driving away * * * "the doubt's that foll cimmerant darkness o'er the fainting soul!" Currux.

ED. STATESMAN.—The past week has been quite a busy one on the beach. The following rains loaded and started for the Blackfoot conntry, viz. : Buckley's, Whitman's, Dan. Hays' Freres', McGowen's, Cronley's, and some we did to hold good, and teamsters and packers seem to

be in good spirits, with plenty of freight in sight.

We notice the commercial reporter for one of the portland papers, states that there is a large mount of freight stored at Umatilla awaiting transportation to the interior; that every wares house, sfore and shed is full to overflowing. This condition of things at that point is explained in two ways : one is, that new shinners from San Francisco to Montana, have been de-ceived as to the proper point to land their goods destined to the interior. Many parties (interested) insist, or have insisted, that Umatilla is the proper point to land goods for transportation to the Idaho and Montana mining regions, and many new shippers had supposed this to be the fact, and laboring under the impression that Umatilla was higher up the river than Wallula, shipped their goods to that point. But when the shippers came up they discovered their mis-take, and many of them reshipped their goods to Wallula. In fact two trains that left here hast week, were loaded exclusively with goods that had been detained at Umatilla through ignorance of position. Other parties, who had already incurred too much expense in hauling and ready incurred too much expense in nating and storage, to be willing to haul and reship their goods, have engaged pack trains here and packed out from Umatilla, passing through Wallula ens

Another reason for the "jam" of freight a Umatilla, is well known to every teamster and packer in this section of the country, is the inac-cessability and expense of going into Umatilla. A teamster can not go into Umatilla for a load without taking feed for his animals, or putting them into a corral at considerable expense. Packers are always compelled to corral their animals, hence it is that Umatilla has gained the name of "Corral town"

This state of things does not exist at Wallula. I don't think a pack train, for the whole of last season, has been corralled and fed at Wallula, (we have but one corral in the flace,) it is not we have out one corrain the place, it is necessary. Trains come into the town, camp around the warehouse, turn their animals out and let them run until their cargo is ready. The same with ox teamsters; good feed from a half mile to any distance around Wallula. Hence it is that packers and teamsters will freight for less from Wallula, than any other point on the Collumbia river, to Idaho and Montana Territories. Shippers have bad a good lesson taught them this season on freighting, next season they will avail themselves of it.

Many of the goods now stored at Umatilla will not go forward this season. Transportation is getting scarce, and the price of freighting is

running up every day.

We took a short visit to the country last week,

ee the improvements made in the farms on that Creek during the last two years—any amount of feed, and oceans of grain everywhere. If there are any persons in Walla Walla County destrous of obtaining good farming band, at government prices, we would advise them to turn their eves towards vacant spots on the Touchet river. cannot conceive why an acre of land should lay idle a season after having been assured that the soil is inexhaustable, and when worked this season, has produced ninety bushels of oats, eighty bushels of barley and sixty bushels of wheat to the acre! These may seem pretty large figures. but we can assure those who doubt it, that they can have a chance to bet a "piece," and win it

if they can.
We learn that the middle Touchet has produced principally oats and barley, this season, side her "flourey face," a short time ago, by brder," and that the Walla Walla Valley received the benefit of the "Wallammete" nose bleed, in Fort Boise. This little flour transaction not only effects the Oregon flour mills, but will leave a small gap in the receipts of the O. S. N. Co.— a government freighting contract. But so wa go from day to day we are gaining strength notwithstanding the kicks, cuffs and jeers of our interested friends (?) and neighbors. (?)

P. S .- We have just learned that the bodies of the two Chinamen that were drowned at Rock Island, have been found by Indian "Charley".

at Priest Rapids. "Charley" absorbed the gold
dust, but had a hard fight for it, and was shot at by his "tillacums" three times. It is supposed the Chinamen had about five hundred dollars, each, on their persons. C.

Pablic Meeting.

A public meeting will be held at the Court House, on Monday evening next, at 7½ o'clock, for the purpose of taking action in relation to opening of the Mullan Road, and looking more particularly to securing from Congress an appropriation for this purpose. The importance of this highway to our material interests has been so often discussed in these columns that really there is nothing new to be urged. All know that our prosperity depends upon recurring outlets for our surplus products, and certainly Montana must be one of our principal markets. The Boise country, even if it should regain its former prosperity, will draw its supplies of breadstuffs from Grand Ronde and Powder River vallies, thus measurably shutting off the demand from that quarter. The crop in Grand Ronde Valley this year alone is estimated at from six to eight hundred thousand bushels of wheat, and if a market offers this production can be doubled or trebled. It is proper that our true position should be understood, to the end that measures may be taken looking to the future. We know that as a community-we enjoy an unparalleled condition of prosperty, but whilst enjoying the present should not be indifferent to the future. Other communities are springing into exist. ence that must divide with us the trade on which we have heretofore prospered, and looking to this development it becomes us to seek new outlets, and thus be prepared for the changes that are soon to be upon us. A community to be permanently prosperous cannot afford to stand still, and it is in obedi ence to this law of progress that we should constantly endeavor to extend the area of country dependent upon us for supplies. The man or community that attempts to stand still is soon left high and dry, and it is on this principle that we urge that immediate and effective steps be taken to place us in communication with a district of country that for years to come will afford a market for our surplus products. A question of this kind interests alike the farmer, the merchant, and the mechanic, and hence we hope that the meeting of Monday night will be fully attended, and that measures will be taken that will show that our people whilst enjoying the present, are not altogether indifferent to the future.

FOTEND NEWELL :- It would be hard to find a more generally fine climate for a farmer; perhaps a few lazy ones may think eight or ten inches of snow, for two months, too large a supply of that article, but it is beneficial and preferable to no snow at all: in this altitude where we must have some frost. The leading crops here now are bar ley, oats, corn, vegetables of all kinds, including eggsplant and tomato, and of fruits; melons are most abundant and raise themselves. They produce so largely that everywhere bushels have been left to rot or thrown to the hogs. The thermometer is about as follows: 4th of July, 110°, and during the month, was at 2 P. M., generally 100° Fah.; September, averaged at 2 P. M., 84°, highest, on 13th, 95°; lowest on 22d, 64°; 21st, first frost, 25th killed tomato vines; 5 cloudy days 2 windy and 2 showery. August averaged, at 2 P. M., 94° Fah.; warmest was August 1st, 107; lowest, Aug. 31st, 68; 2 days cloudy, showery, 1 rain and 1 windy. Since Sept 2d, with one exception, this is the coolest day we have had at 2 P. M. Thermometer stood at 74°.

Grape vines bore a little this season. and do well. Small fruits, such as currants &c., produce so abundantly that there are more fruit than leaves. Apples thrive well, in fact Mr. Walling says that the difficulty is to start fruit and after that they do better than below.

The different prices for produce are as follows: Barley and oats, 5 cents; wheat 41 cts.; corn, 5 cents; hay, \$25 delivered in town; potatoes, 2 cents; onions, 5 cents, and other things in proportion. Sorghum is being raised in small quantities and appears to do well.

News from Alturas county furnishes the following: Mr. Green, Supt. of the Waddingham G. & S. M. Co., has returned from Salt Lake with supplies of money for repairs and to set the mill going. Letter from La Grand.

ED. STATESMAN: The people of Walla Walla are more or less interested in the reources, prospective and actual, of Eagle Creek, and a word from that corner will ins erest many of your readers. Eagle Creek district is properly a quartz district; the placer mines are not of much force. Outside of Carter's Mill in Hogem, there are but three living working quartz companies, viz. : "La Grand Gold and Silver Mining Company," "Granite Mountain Gold and Silver Mining Company," and the "Humboldt Gold and Silver Mining Company." These companies have all been formed within a year. To give you a correct idea of these companies and the quartz of the country, will give a statement of the actual con dition of each company :

The "La Grand Gold and Silver Minier Company" have their office in La Grand. They own nine mining claims, or 2700 feet n each of 'nine different ledges; five of which promises well, and three are rich, one, the "Gem Ledge" is very rich; five ton, worked in an arastra, yielded \$113 per ton, and was only an average lot of quartz. The company have out from 200 to 300 tons of good buartz. They have a five stamp mid which will be running in ten days when you will be duly informed of the result. Stock in this company sells readily at \$10 per share. The Directors have judiciously kept the company out of debt. Many of the ledges have been made feel estate.

The "Humboldt Gold and Silver Mining Company" have their office in Gem City, and have 2700 feet on each of nine different ledgcs. They own in all, 24,300 feet of quartz. The company have done all their own work. All their ledges have been improved, and five of them made real estate. They are also owners on the Gem ledge. HOP CULTURE. - We were pleased to notice of exhibition at the County Fair, specimens of hope grown in this valley. A small and apparently unimportant article, the specimen came very nigh being overlooked, and it is only by accident that it is mentioned in the list of premiums. It is unfortunate that so few persons are posted in regard to the cultivation of hops, and from want of knowledge fail to engage in a remunerating branch of industry. We have good authority for saying that no branch of agriculture pays better than hops. For brewers' use the hops grown on this coast have double the strength of the imported. A corres ordert of the S. F. Alta recently visited a hop vineyard on the American River, and his description we subjoin as containing much that may be made profitable

to our readers : "It covers twenty five acres, and was planted in February and March of this year. For yines "It covers twenty has acres, and was planted in February and Marcin of this year. The vines stand eight feet apart. It is well demonstrated that short poles and cross trailing on confuccing cords produce better crops than high poles. But look to your twine. New Process of Passenvino Fassi MEAT.—A new method of keeping meat fresh, called "Sloper's process," has just been in-vented in England and patented in South America. If it proves satisfactory it will entirely obviate the practice of transporting living animals and make a revolution in the meat business. The process is very simple, and depends on the destruction of oxygen in the control of the process is the process in the control of the process in th in the meat and surrounding atmosphere The bone is extracted from the meat, which The bone is extracted from the meat, which is then placed in tin cans, and the air is then exhausted by means of water forced in at the bottom, which is afterward allowed to redescend and run off, and the vacuum filled with a certain gas, the composition of which is a profound secret. The can is then soldered air tight and ready for transportation. This experiment has proved successful in England, and it is now proposed to make this use of the wild cattle of South America. If this method can be adopted in this country, the immense grazing plains of Texas will have a new value. Thousands of full grown cattlewere sold there before the war, at the low price of from \$15 to 20 per head, less than one quarter of their value in New England.
