A SALUTE.—The news of the great gains made by the democracy in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Iowa, was received at a late hour on Tuesday night, but notwithstanding the lateness of the hour the anvils were brought out and a salute fired in honor of the democratic victory.

DEDICATION.—The first church of the United Brethren in Christ, of Walla Walla City, will be dedicated to the Triune God, on Sunday, the 20th inst., at 11 o'clock, A. M. Bishop D. Shuck will officiate. There is a cordial invitation extended to all to attend. There will, also, be preaching at 3 and at 7 o'clock, P. A MAMMOTH APPLE.—Hon. N. Ford, Senator from Umatilla county presented us with an apple of gigantic proportions, which was grown on his farm, situated in this Valley, and just across the Oregon line. This monster weighs 46 ounces, and measures 16 1/2 inches in circumference. We believe this is the largest and heaviest apple on record, and certainly it indicates that fruit flourishes in this Valley. The apple, which is of the "Gloria Mundi" variety, will remain on exhibition at this office, where those who are curious in such matters are invited to call and examine the specimen.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A middle-aged woman named Mrs. Hallock, whose husband is in the mines, died suddenly on Sunday last. In the morning she was in her usual health, and attended worship at the Catholic Church. At dinner she ate heartily, and appeared to be in the best of spirits. At about two o'clock in the afternoon, she complained of dizziness in her head, and at six o'clock in the evening she was dead. Her death was caused by apoplexy, of which she had had a previous attack. Deceased leaves a daughter (Mrs. Kelling,) living at Walla Walla, and a husband, who is in the mines. In her case we have an other illustration of the great truth, that "in the midst of life we are in death."

PARMISCH FRUIT.—Mr. John Hancock, living on the Walla Walla, about ten miles below town, has left at our office specimens of the different varieties of apples and pears which took the premium. Of the apples that were particularly fine, we mention, the "Seek-no-further," "Golden Russett," "Yellow Bellflower," "Blue Pearmain," "Eroyus Spitzenberg," "Rambo," and "Tulpehooken." Of the pears there is a second growth of "Bartlett's," the fruit of which was well matured. Also the "Vicar of Wakefield," and one or two other varieties. In the line of apples and pears, the Willamette has heretofore been conceded to lead the world, but since the orchards in this Valley have come to bearing the palm must be conceded to Walla Walla fruit.

The M. E. Church building has been perambulating the streets for several days past, and at last has found a lodgment on Third street, two blocks east of Main street. This is the lot lately bought for the purpose of a parsonage, and is decidedly a more desirable location than that just vacated. The church building will front on Third street, and the parsonage, which is being refitted, is immediately in the rear. The church trustees require assistance to enable them to complete the improvements now in hand, and to any appeal they may make, we trust our citizens will respond liberally. The Catholics, the Congregationalists, and United Brethren have each of their creditable and commodious church edifices, and with the completion of the change being made in the M. E. Church building, Walla Walla will number four commodious places of worship. Churches and schoolhouses indicate the moral and material progress of a people, and tried by this standard, Walla Walla is eminently prosperous.

IRON ORE.—Mr. Wm. Phillips, of the Walla Walla Foundry, has just returned from a tour of observation in the "web-foot" country, and among the curiosities, brings with him specimens of iron ore, taken from the Oswego lead, and which is used by the Oswego Company in the manufacture of iron. The ore is remarkably rich in iron, and has been found to work to great advantage. The "pig" as turned out at the works are fit without further preparation to be used in the making of castings. The foundries in San Francisco already use this iron almost to the exclusion of Eastern iron, and find it to answer their purpose admirably. Those who are curious in such matters, are invited to call at this office and examine the ore. It may turn out that they know of similar rock in this section of country, with the nature of which they are unacquainted. Mr. P. also brought with him specimens of the limestone taken from Swan Island, which most persons would take for ordinary gray granite. This stone, on burning, is found to yield excellent lime, and is used at the Oswego Works in the manufacture of iron. As already stated, we shall retain these specimens subject to the inspection of those who are curious in such matters.

EASTERN NEWS.

Dates to October 11th.

COMPILED FROM THE DAILY OREGONIAN.

INAGURATION OF BROWLOW. Nashville, October 10.—Browlow was inaugurated Governor to-day. The inauguration speech was read by his private secretary.

MASSACHUSETTS POLITICS. Boston, October 10.—John Quincy Adams accepts the democratic nomination for Governor, and indorses the policy of the convention.

MISCELLANEOUS. Albany, October 10.—Sheridan and Sickles had a grand popular and military ovation to-day.

New York, October 10.—There was considerable excitement in the Stock Exchange to-day, owing to the discovery of counterfeit seven-thirties, of the issue of June, 1865. These notes are the best counterfeits of Government securities ever issued. It is believed the whole amount is not far from \$2,500,000, as some of the largest dealers in this city have been deceived. It is probable that dealers in other cities have been swindled. The counterfeits are of the second series of seven-thirties, dated June 14, 1865, of the dimensions of a thousand dollars.

LATE ELECTION RETURNS. Columbus, Ohio, October 10.—Hayes, Republican, is doubtless elected Governor by 1,000 or 2,000 majority. The Legislature is Democratic by a small majority.

Philadelphia, October 10.—The Republican Central Committee figures out a republican majority of 2,500 in the State of Pennsylvania.

Paris, October 10.—The competition between English and American safes, resulted in favor of the American.

Washington, October 11.—Admiral Farragut's account of his reception at Copenhagen is received. The Admiral dined with the King by invitation. Many courtesies were extended.

Troy, October 11.—Hon. David L. Seymour died to-day at Lancaster, Massachusetts.

New York, October 11.—Several bankers received packages of spurious 7 3/8's to-day from the West; and carried in small packages, no remittance exceeding 10,000. The first batch came from Leavenworth, September 17th. It is unknown to what extent the Government has received them. Several missionaries sailed for California on the Henry Chauncey to-day.

NEW YORK MARKETS. New York, October 11.—3 P. M.—Gold closed 143 1/2. Flour \$15 50; wheat \$3 25. Wool inactive and prices drooping; quotable at 18@30. California barley \$1 40.

SAN FRANCISCO DISPATCH. San Francisco, October 11.—A fire occurred shortly after ten o'clock last night in the old omnibus stable on Third street, between Howard and Folsom. It spread so rapidly that it was feared the whole block would be destroyed, but the fire was put out by the fire engine and personal risk, succeeded in getting the fire under after the stable and adjoining buildings had been destroyed. The stable was used by Dan McGlyone, street contractor. His horses were saved, but wagons, carts, harness, etc., to the value of several thousand dollars, were lost. The building was owned by Jos. O'Keif. Loss \$5,000. Other parties sustained losses amounting in the aggregate to \$10,000 more. People living in the vicinity of the fire moved their goods out of their houses for safety. The premises fairly swarmed with thieves and it is estimated that more goods were stolen than were destroyed by the fire.

GINGER SNAPS.—One pint of molasses one teaspoonful of saleratus, half a teaspoon of ginger, butter size of an egg, flour enough to make it roll very thin. Cut the cakes with a tin ring and bake quickly.

HOMINY WAFFLES.—To two teaspoonful of hot hominy add a spoonful of good butter; when cold, add one teaspoonful of wheat flour, a little salt, as much milk as will make it a stiff batter, and three eggs well beaten. Mix these well together, and bake in waffle irons.

LEMON CREAM.—Take a pint of thick cream and put it to the yolks of two eggs well beaten, four ounces of fine sugar, and the thin rind of a lemon; boil it up; then stir it till almost cold; put the juice of a lemon in a dish or bowl, and put the cream upon it, stirring it till quite cold.

LEMON HONEYCOMB.—Sweeten the juice of a lemon to taste, and pour it into the dish you serve it in; mix the white of an egg that is beaten with a pint of rich cream and a little sugar; whisk it, and as the froth rises put it on the lemon juice. Do it the day before you wish to use it.

CHARLES' PUDDING.—One quart of milk, one pint of bread crumbs, one cup of butter, one cup of sugar, four yolks of eggs. Boil milk, and mix well with bread crumbs, etc. Dish and bake, then take out and cover with a jelly; beat the whites of four eggs into a hard froth, with which cover the jelly. Bake again in a quick oven ten minutes.

WINE ROLL.—Soak a penny French roll in raisin wine till it will hold no more, put it in the dish, and pour round it a custard of cream, sugar, and lemon juice. Just before it is served sprinkle over it some nonpareil comferts, or stick a few blanched slits almonds into it. Sponge biscuits may be used instead of the roll, if preferred.

TEA CAKES.—Rub fine four ounces of butter into eight ounces of flour, mix eight ounces of currants and six ounces of fine Lisbon sugar, two yolks and one white of eggs, and a spoonful of brandy; roll the paste the thickness of an olive biscuit, and cut with a wine-glass. You may beat the other white and wash over them, and either dust sugar or not as preferred.

TRANSPLANTING TREES.—An exchange furnishes the following advice, which it recommends to those persons who have occasion to transplant trees: "In taking up a tree, it should be so marked so as to secure its setting out in the same position. Thus the north side may be marked with chalk before work is commenced. If the side which has been exposed to the north is turned toward the south, the heat of the sun is too great, and it dries up and loses its vitality.

EFFECT OF BAD SEED.—How slight a thing will sometimes have a serious effect. For instance, the farmer prepares a large field of corn, plants it with bad seed, as is so often done, and the labor is all for nothing. He has to plant over, and then he will get a late crop; the drought will affect it, and sometimes the frost. If a third planting is necessary, as is sometimes the case, the matter is still worse. With wheat and the other grains, the crop is generally a failure. Planted at the right time a re-sowing must be too late, and thus defeats the whole crop. Now, with a little care good seed may be had,—and then all this evil will be avoided. Is it not sheer carelessness? We cannot be too careful in getting ripe, sound, healthy seed.—Rural World.

TRANSPLANTING IN THE NIGHT.—A friend, in whose powers of observance we have confidence, informs us that the last Spring and Summer he made the following experiment: He transplanted tea cherry trees while in bloom, commencing at four o'clock in the afternoon, and transplanting one each hour, until one in the morning. Those transplanted during daylight shed their blossoms, producing little or no fruit, while those planted during the darker portions maintained their condition fully. He did the same with ten dwarf pear trees, after the fruit was one-third grown. Those transplanted during the day shed their fruit; those transplanted during the night perfected their crop, and showing no injury from having been removed. With each of these trees he removed some earth with the roots.—Working Farmer.

ARTLESS SIMPLICITY.—One of the sweetest incidents we have noticed for many a day, and which shows the effect of early training, assisted by a pure and undefiled imagination, has just fallen under our observation. It is thus related: "A lady visited New York city and saw on the side walk a ragged, cold and hungry little girl, gazing wistfully at some cakes in the shop window. She stopped, and taking the little one by the hand led her into the store. Though she was aware that bread might be better for the cold child than cake, yet desiring to gratify the shivering and forlorn one, she bought, and gave her the cake she wanted. She procured a shawl and other articles of comfort. The grateful little creature looked the benevolent lady full in the face, and with artless simplicity, said: "Are you God's wife?" Did the most eloquent speaker ever employ words to a better advantage?

FIRE-PROOF WASH FOR SHINGLES.—The following simple application will no doubt prove of great value. We quote from the Albany Knickerbocker:—"A wash composed of lime, salt, and fine sand, or wood ashes, put on in the ordinary way of whitewashing, renders the roof fiftyfold more safe against taking fire from falling cinders or otherwise, in cases of fire in the vicinity. It pays the expense a hundred fold in its preserving influence against the effect of the weather. The older and more weather-beaten the shingles, the more benefit derived. Such shingles generally become more or less warped, rough, and cracked; the application of the wash, by wetting the upper surface, restores them at once to their original or first form, thereby closing the space between the shingles; and the lime and sand, by filling up all the cracks and pores in the shingles itself, prevents it from warping for years, if not for ever."

Home, Farm and Garden.

An experienced breeder in sheep says that a number of sheep in any flock wearing bells, will keep away dogs.

A bee tamer at the Michigan State Fair, using some chemical compound, with his head and shoulders constantly covered with bees, harangued a crowd and created quite a sensation. Timid people gave him a wide berth.

One cow which will give twice as much milk and make twice as much butter as another, is worth more than twice as much money as a cow, because she will not eat twice as much food nor require twice as much care.

Two great lacks in agriculture, as it is ordinarily practiced, are information and carefulness. The most pressing and immediate deficiency is in the latter, the remedy of which cannot be too strongly enforced upon the attention of farmers and cultivators everywhere. Headfulness may take a sure step towards success; negligence walks slipshod to poverty.

Englishmen are never tired of bragging over their Siltion and Wiltshire cheese; there is nothing like it. Very likely, as hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of it comes into London every year from Westchester county, N. Y., and after being fraudulently labeled and stamped, it is all right for home consumption or export. John Bull can eat cheese, but it takes Americans to make it as it ought to be made.

We believe it is a settled fact in cow physiology, that where a heifer and a bull are both twins, the heifer will seldom, if ever, breed. They are called "free martins." But here is one that will give milk, if she does not breed: Mr. Edward Henshaw, of West Waterville, has a heifer which was a twin calf with a bull. He works her with her steer mate. She never had a calf, but she has given milk a year—gives now eight quarts per day. She is now three years old.—Maine Farmer.

A funny story comes to us that a learned agricultural society, which holds its meetings not a hundred miles from New York, recently discussed the question of how flax grew. However, one rash person denied that the seed of the growing plant remained under ground—all the rest of the crowd said it did. Nothing like proof. Seeing as believing, "Experiment does it," as Mr. Squere affirmed most justly. So a goblet was produced, some seed sent for, and with the aid of some dirt, a little glass garden fixed up. And the agriculturists adjourned. On reassembling some days after, lo! the little blades peeped forth, each bearing on its summit the source of its life, and the wise teachers of farming found to their surprise that growing flax carried its seed up with it and bore it at the top as proudly as any young bean that ever first saw the light of day. Some day we understand these same notables intend to debate the "Characteristics of Pumpkins and Squashes, and how to tell 'em from which, especially with reference to prize strawberries, how to separate grapes from thorns, and the influence of dairy produce upon American social life."—N. Y. Times.
