Regular Correspondence. WALKER'S PRAIRIE, Oct. 5, 1879. EDITOR STATESMAN:—As the editor of the leading newspaper in Washington territory I know that you are glad to hear of progress being made in even its most remote sections, and for this reason I believe you will read with pleasure your correspondent's account of what he has been able to notice in the way of incident and advancement while traveling the "old Mullan road" from Walla Walla as far as Walker's Prairie.

These pests have collected along the river, and it is to be hoped that like the locusts of old, they will disappear beneath the waters. At Snake river, twenty-three miles further on our way, we found Mr. Markley ready to cross over the ferry, and we found him an obliging and skillful pilot. The river was low and there were two rocks in the channel with just enough space between them to admit of our boat passing through. The next water is that of the Was-teck-ney springs, where Mr. Barrett, formerly of your city, has taken a homestead.

PLEASANT AND COMFORTABLE HOME. COSS' is the next ranch—nineteen miles from Barrett's. Mrs. C. is a good cook, and a kind and pleasant lady given to hospitality. From here to Comaskey's, on next land, it is twenty-five miles. Mr. C. is the best specimen of an old bachelor that we know of. He expects to be rich; the survey of the N.
