NEW JAILOR .- The late Grand Jury in the course of their investigations obtained shundant evidence to show that Martin, the keeper of the jail, was implicated in the release of Donohue. One of the witnesses examined, testified that on the night of the release Martin came down stairs in his stocking feet and closed the wir lows of the cells adjoining that in which Donohue was confined, with the covious intent of preventing the other prisoners from knowing what was going on. It was further in evidence that two fierce watch-dogs, trained for the pur pose of preventing escapes, were perfectly silent on the night of Donohue's release. It was also shown that Donohue had privileges and indulgences not shown to other prisoners, and that certain parties had free access to his (Donohue's) cell, at all hours day or night. The investigation went to show that the use of false keys and all that sort of thing was a mere blind, and that instead of cape, Donahue was permitted to leave his cell when it suited his convenience. THE PUBLIC SCHOOL, in charge of Prof. Moore, is in a flourishing condition. On visiting the school room a few days since, we learned that the average attendance is 98, about equally divided between boys and girls. The names of 110 scholars appear on the roll. Of the children in attendance, judging from appearance, a large majority are less than ten years of age. In the habit of frevisiting public schools for many years, we fail to recall a more healthy, rosy looking set of children, or that gave promise of such vigorous maturity. It is a subject for regret that under the existing law the school cannot be maintained on a free basis throughout the year. If the law was amen ded in this respect, we are quite sure that the citizens of the district would cheerfully ♥ote the tax necessary to maintain a permanent free school. The present law permits a special tax to be levied for the purpose of making permanent improvements, but no part of the fund thus acquired can be devoted a defect in the law, and one that should be remedied at the next session of the Legislature. It has been aptly said that it is cheaper to sustain schools than to build prisons, and accepting this maxim as correct, our cit izens will cheerfully vote any tax that may be necessary to secure to the rising generation the advantage, of a common school

Malla Malla Dowestic Market.

We have no particular change to notice in on domestic market. The principal movement has been in Flour, large quantities of which are being freighted to the Boise mines. In the Grain market we note a continued disposition on the part of farmers not to sell at ruling rates. part of farmers not to sell at ruing rates. The great majority of them are storing their crops with a view to holding for an advance. The failure of the crops in Europe, as also in the Atlantic States, cannot fail to produce a dema d for the surplus breadstuffs on the Pacific coast, and with this demand will fullow an advance in price. In San Francisco every vessel that can be chartered is being loaded with Flour for ship ment abroad, and in that way California is rap idly being drained of her surplus breadstuffs.

In view of all the facts, it is fair to conclude that Grain will soon advance in price and tha those who hold on to their crops will be gainers thereby.

Our merchants just now are busily engaged in receiving their full and winter stocks of mer-chandise, and judging from the extent of these stocks, the conclusion is irresistible that they expect an unusually brisk trade.
