The Oregon legislature adjourns on Friday. Mrs. V. D. Lambert is at home once more.

E. B. Hawley, who has just returned from Deadman, informs us that the country there is rapidly settling up, and the people are elated over their prospects for the future.

The building heretofore used as a bag factory by Mr. Sumnerlyke, is being remodelled and fitted up as a residence. President Anderson, of Whitman College, has taken a lease of it.

Missan Philip Ritz, Dr. Blakelock and Alfred Thomas are sending sample fruit to New York to be exhibited at the rooms of the Northern Pacific railway in that city.

Mr. Julius Baldwin will shortly proceed to Lewiston in order to look after his property interests there. He has such faith in the steady growth of this section that no inducement will tempt him to dispose of his town lots in this city.

The track of the U. & N. railway was laid into the Deer Lodge town-site and a train run thereon last Tuesday, Oct. 31, 1882.

The Republican county convention meeting, at Lewiston, on the 12th, nominated A. F. Parker for member of the Assembly of Idaho.

Mr. Parker, feeling that as a journalist, he can be of more service to the people, at his office than in the Assembly, declined the honor tendered him.

Council Proceedings.

The committee to whom was referred the matter of opening streets in Roberts Addition made the following report.

We have given this matter some attention and from our present information would report adverse to the prayer of the petitioners.

As to the question of acceptance of Gen. T. R. Tannatt's deed we recommend it be accepted and recorded, for as we now understand the matter, the opinion of the City Attorney is that those parcels of land marked by the original plat, and if there should be any doubt about this, the title as conveyed to the city by Gen. T. R. Tannatt is unequivocal.

Mr. Baumgartner in committee agreed to the report but was called out of town before the report was copied in ink.

The Finance Committee reported favorably on the petition of the City Clerk for an increase of salary.

The committee recommended that the salary of City Clerk at \$600 a year, payable monthly, of Treasurer at \$500 and Police Justice at \$500, payable quarterly, and that all fees now paid these officers be turned into the city treasury.

The Finance Committee advised upon the resolution to reduce the interest on city script to 8 per cent.

The committee on Ways and Means Dorrell and Fletcher, reported that no bond could be procured without great expense to the city and as the ordinance now stand...

The committee to whom was referred the matter of lighting the streets reported in favor of certain limits, and lights as follows:

On Rose street commencing at corner of Rose and Corville, and placed at alternate corners to 5th street.

On Main between Colville and Sixth, Two on Poplar at the corner of First and Second.

On Birch at the corner of First and Second. Also one in the alley between Main and Alder.

Mr. Dorrell moved that the committee on Ordinances be instructed to prepare an ordinance to prohibit cows or cattle from running at large within the city limits, at all during the twenty-four hours.

On the most important feature of the meeting last evening was Councilman Winans statement of the financial condition of the city, and the suggestions of the Finance committee.

It was shown that to-day the city debt is \$20,288 62, which is in excess of the charter limit.

The present monthly expense of the city government are \$918 03. These expenses must come out of the license fund, which, taking the last nine months as an estimate, will be about \$700 per month and about \$60 from fines.

Co.; Gen. Sprague, Gen. Supt. of the N. P. Co.; W. Fairweather; Paul Schulte, of the Land Dept.; J. M. Buckley, Asst. Manager N. P.; J. L. Hallett, Supt. of construction and D. D. McLean, Contractor.

A special train bearing the party came direct from the "Front," arrived here early this morning, proceeded to Dayton, and returned here about noon. Carriages were provided and in those the visitors took a look about in the city.

Good Sanitary Conditions.

While the Statesman has already presented several excellent reasons why an effort should be made to place Walls Walla in a thoroughly good sanitary condition, another presents it is patent to everybody that during the coming winter, there will be less opportunity for cleaning up garbage piles, and still their creation will be none the less great.

These heaps of filth added to those already in streets and alleys, will make a horrible condition of things for the early Spring, and before the ordinary work of cleaning in that season is begun, the poisonous gases will be lodged in the system of every man, woman and child in this city.

We should enter upon the winter season with as good a sanitary condition as it is possible to get. Appended are some important suggestions upon this matter of clean streets.

Any parent subjecting his child to such danger, would be strongly condemned by all, but an amon for my steel away the lowest flower from the family circle without a sign of remorse.

People and delicate children need sunshiny, good air and pure water, and we are sinning against the laws of nature when we neglect these three.

If a helpless child were to fall into the fire or water, every one near would try to rescue it. They would all see the danger.

Now if I can lead people to see the danger lurking around their own homes, how many brave persons will rush to the rescue? You all have greater dangers threatening your homes, than accidental death by fire or water.

The causes of sickness and death to which a refer may be made. Under the heading of nuisances, in the streets and vacant lots are slime, rotting boards, bones, etc., the seeds of death, and the hotbed of all infectious diseases.

Many diseases are directly caused by contaminated water, as instances; cholera, dysentery, and typhoid fever, are others as scarlet fever and diphtheria are rendered more fatal by impure air and water.

We, in New Tacoma, are waiting for the sewer, now being built, and expect that when it is made all will be done. It is so in San Francisco and other cities? By no means; you can see men constantly scraping up and removing rubbish of all kinds.

A little of that work here, and let me suggest your city council to order a general clean up. The city should bear the expense of removing rubbish from the streets and under sidewalks, and property-holders be compelled under heavy penalty to thoroughly clean their premises.

I am aware that an ordinance to prohibit carts to carry refuse to a dump, is in existence in the law, but it is never used.

Ed. J. Cooper has been appointed mail carrier on the Northern Pacific. We knew much of Ed. when he was business manager for F. R. Moore & Co., at Camp Spokane, and the appointment is a worthy bestowal.

S. Oppenheimer, of Oppenheimer Brothers, dealers in general merchandise at Colville, was widely and favorably known throughout this country.

Some of the family of Mr. Martin, living at the corner of Main and Sixth streets, made a narrow escape from the bullet fired by the Texas Puma, last week.

As practical men, Messrs. Frank Paine and Miles C. Moore, who have recently examined the Northern Pacific track east of Spokane Falls, assert that it is as perfect as can well be, and if there is any superior to Mr. Fairweather as a Supt. they would like to meet him.

The discovery of a rotary or any other kind of steam engine that would overcome the dead points, has long occupied and taxed the mental powers of mechanists and master mechanics, but it seems to have been left for Henry Thiabault of Walla Walla, to solve the difficult problem, and bring to light a rotary engine that meets the wants of machinists where economy of fuel, frictions lessened and simplicity of construction, is secured, all combined in one and the same piece of machinery.

On the 7th of September, 1882, Henry Thiabault was granted a patent on his newly improved motive power. The drawings exhibited to the writer, show the full principles of construction of this new motor, and display the possession of no inconsiderable amount of genius, on the part of the inventor.

It is claimed for this new rotary engine, that there is economy of space occupied, economy of metal used in building, simplicity and economy in construction, no brass or costly metal required, other than cast iron; the shafts and bolts alone are of wrought iron, no skill is required in putting it together.

It is claimed, too, that it furnishes greater power from a given quantity of steam; it is less complicated than any other form of steam engine, is not liable to get out of order, all the expansion of the steam utilized, economical use of steam and a consequent saving of fuel. There being few working parts there is comparatively little resistance, there is no reciprocating motion, it has a steady motion, has but little jar, and at that account is easily kept in place, it saves packing, metal packing used exclusively, and has no dead points. Hias is the great desideratum attained that during the last fifty years the brains of engineers has been so much puzzled over.

In this engine there are two exhausts to every revolution. The rock valve and eccentric, common to all engines, are used in its construction. It is further claimed that a large engine will run as well as a small one and that it can be applied to all purposes for which steam is used; that engines of this make can be made and equipped complete for one-half the price of the old style engine.

The writer concludes that if one-half is true that is claimed for it, that it will create a revolution in the manufacture of steam engines.

It is the purpose of the inventor, as soon as practicable, to demonstrate its utility, and introduce it into general use. It is without doubt just the power required to propel printing presses, for pumping water, grinding chop for ranchers, driving threshers, and indeed any kind of machinery where economy is an important consideration.

N. P. LAND GRANTS.—It has been decided by the courts that legislative and judicial action is required to forfeit any railroad land grants, and the Secretary of the Interior, whatever may be his policy, with reference to throwing open government lands for settlement has no authority to forfeit lapsed grants to railroads. It is said, therefore, that there need be no fear that the secretary of the interior will interfere with the lapsed grant to the Northern Pacific company.

Nothing can be done with reference to these grants by the department until congressional action, which is now pending, has been taken. At the last session of Congress the Judiciary committee of the House declared all the grants to the southern railroad companies who had failed to comply with the terms of their contract, forfeited. But the majority of the committee, in view of the purpose of the Northern Pacific company to complete their road, are opposed to forfeiting the grant.
