TOWN AND COUNTRY.

Items of Personal and General Interest Gathered Through the Week.

A movable steam saw mill is the latest attraction on our streets, and the wheel of justice stands still in consequence.

Under its new proprietor the Walla Walla Hotel gives great satisfaction to the frequenters.

The railroad grade, through Powder river and Grand Ronde Valley, is about completed.

The Hansford House, Walla Walla, has changed hands. Prescott Ross is now proprietor.

Two fine blooded bird dogs arrived last night by N. P. express from Chicago, sent to Lieut. McDonald.

Walla Walla is having quite a boom, five buildings are going up and the place is becoming quite a town.

D. J. Crowley and J. C. Leasat to-morrow row on a week's duck hunt at the mouth of the Walla Walla river.

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The friends of A. H. Reynolds Esq., who recently celebrated his 70th birthday, have presented him with photographs of himself as a boy, a young man, and as an infant of 1843. And a remarkably well developed infant it is.

H. E. Holmes, representative from this Territory to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of O. I. Fellows, will arrive here on Thursday. A grand reception will be tendered him on his arrival by his brother O. I. Fellows.

J. P. Mullin, who resides near Whitburg, drove to town this morning 100 head of fine cowboys, which he will sell to Chris Egan. It is said they are the finest he has ever seen in the city, and averaged 242 pounds weight per head.

O'Donnell & Johnson are making a large quantity of tanks for the use of the military. When completed it will hold 1,200 gallons of water. It is to be used for supplying the top story of the building with water and will be filled by a water pump.

One of our exchanges that has the appearance of having been printed upon a hay press with axle grease for ink, advertises to do "great job work." It is high time the appearance of their sheets was improved, if the public are to believe in their ability to do "great job work."

ATTEMPTED STRIKE.

The Blind Goddess Defeated, and Judge Lynch Intervened on the Subject.

The justice's court for this precinct was occupied yesterday in the hearing of charges preferred against George P. Howell by Mr. John Vineyard. The latter lives about eight miles west of town, having moved there recently from Missouri.

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The Bear d'Alene Mines.

The Dayton Chronicle publishes the following from the newly discovered mines:

"W. J. Hamilton, George Eady and Lake Woolford, responsible citizens of the place, have just returned from the new placer mines on Pritchard creek, a branch of the Cour d'Alene river, about twenty-five miles southeast of Fort Cour d'Alene, and report about 300 or 400 miners on the ground.

The diggings now being worked are entirely on the bed of the creek. A great deal of jumping is being done on claims located by power of attorney, as all miners know it to be contrary to any mining law to locate by such means.

Small Brothers are there looking up a site for a saw mill, which will be built as soon as possible, and will prove a bonanza to the owners.

Provisions are high and scarce. Flour is \$25 per barrel, bacon is 30 cents and sugar 40 cents per pound.

The claims which have been opened are being worked by sluice boxes, while prospecting is being done by pan. The weather is very stormy, the snow on the trail being ten inches deep at the present time, and it has been raining considerably of late.

There are different opinions regarding the working of the mines. Many think they can be worked all winter, while others say they cannot be worked after freezing.

Some very rich glens and graphite ore has been found, which assayed between \$300 and \$400 per ton in gold and silver, and about 72 per cent lead. The whole country abounds with both decomposed and solid quartz.

Some gold has been found that shows the effects of fire, as it still remains black. It would not be advisable for anyone to start for the mines at this time, a heavy snow storm having prevailed in the mountains just before last.

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NEW GAME LAW.

The fish and game act before the legislature prohibits the capture or killing of any male deer between the first day of November and the first day of July, or of any female deer or any spotted fawn between the first day of January and the first day of August.

The killing of any elk, moose, or mountain sheep, between January and August is made a misdemeanor, or the killing of these animals at any time for the purpose of obtaining the skin, hide, horns or antlers of any animal is a misdemeanor.

The killing of wild swan, mallard duck, widgeon, butter ball, spoon-bill, gray, black, sprigtail, or canvas back between the first of April and 15th of August, unless to protect growing crops, is a misdemeanor.

Prognosis, pheasant, quail or partridge shall be killed between the first day of February and the first day of August. The catching or selling of brook trout during the months of November, December, January, February and March is prohibited, as well as the catching of mountain or brook trout by any other means than hook and line.

The possession of any of these fish or game by any person at an unlawful time, shall be prima facie evidence in any prosecution. The penalties for the violation of any of the provisions of this act range from a fine of \$10 to \$500, or imprisonment in the county jail for a term of five days to three months, or both the fine to be given to the informer.

Another act making it illegal to kill or sell any rump-necked mountain pheasant, a species recently introduced into this territory, for four years after the passage of the act, the violation of which shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$100.

Fatal Accident. Edward F. Colling, who, for some time, has been living on the Walla Walla river, met with an accident Saturday which terminated in death a few hours afterwards.

Accompanied by a friend, he mounted a horse for the purpose of taking a ride, but when a few hundred yards from the house, and as he was about to enter the water for the purpose of crossing over to the opposite side, the animal slipped, throwing Colling head foremost to the ground.

Upon regaining his feet, blood was running from a wound upon his forehead. After washing himself at the river he again mounted the horse and rode back home. He did not consider himself seriously hurt, but he told friends not to send for a doctor.

He became unconscious shortly after lying down upon his bed, and Dr. Blalock was immediately sent for, but upon his arrival the unfortunate man was found to be dead. The cause of the fatal result was found to be a rupture of the brain.

The funeral takes place to-morrow. Deceased leaves a wife and family to mourn his loss.
