

FOR JUDSON.—The democrats of Stevens county, in their convention unanimously endorsed the nomination of Judson for delegate.

THE RACES.—We understand that all the crack horses in the country will be on hand to compete for the liberal purses offered by Mr. Chas. S. Bush, the proprietor of the race track.

HEALTHY.—One of the Sound papers speaks of the flourishing trade in tomb stones at Olympia, and notes a large shipment of the article from Seattle to the former place. This speaks volumes in praise of that healthy location.

IMPORTANT.—It is always important to have good men in the county board, and with Don Keefe, D. J. Storms, and Joseph Beeson as commissioners, we have an assurance that the county finances will be ably managed.

DOMESTIC WINES.—Mr. Frank Osselli has left at this office several bottles of wine, this season's vintage, which we have submitted to several friends of approved judgment. Their verdict is, that with age it will be quite equal to the best California wine.

PERMANENT.—We are informed by Mr. Ewart, who is the leading merchant at Colfax, that during the last two months he has netted over two tons of nails for building purposes, to the new immigrants who have settled in that section of Whitman county.

WHEAT WITHIN THE LAST DAY OR TWO has gone up to 59 cents, and is in active demand at that figure. The war news from Europe has caused a general advance in breadstuffs, thus illustrating the old saying that it is "bad news that brings nobody good luck."

NEW STORE.—The corner store formerly occupied by Mr. Col, near the bridge at the head of Main street, will be opened the coming week by Mr. Frary, who of late has been clerk at the wooden mills. The "old corner" is considered by the knowing ones to be the best retail stands in the city.

SCHOOL MEETINGS.—The law of this territory gives tax-payers the right to vote in any school district where they pay taxes. Many persons suppose that the right to vote is restricted to the district in which they live. This is a mistake. In any district that a man is liable to pay taxes he is entitled to vote.

FAST HORSES.—A Portland dispatch addressed to Mr. Lave Lindsey, states that Messrs. Crab, Welsh, and other owners of fast stock, started yesterday for Walla Walla, and will begin attendance at the great races, to come off next week. Should the weather prove at all favorable, good sport may be expected.

JUDGES AND INSPECTORS.—The county board having failed to appoint judges and inspectors of elections, it will be the duty of the voters in the different precincts to elect these officers before opening the polls on the morning of the election. The oversight is unfortunate, and it will be for the voters to rectify the omission.

INDICTED FOR MURDER.—We learn that the Grand Jury in the case of Euerick, charged with the murder of a man named Gordon, in Unatulla county, have found a true bill charging the defendant with murder in the first degree. Euerick had been out on bail, the county court having held his crime to be of a lower grade.

GREAT DRUG HOUSE.—Our readers will notice the card of Messrs. Hodge, Snell & Co., the Portland druggists. The death of Mr. Calef created a vacancy in the firm, which is filled by Mr. Geo. W. Snell, who has long been connected with the house. Those of our readers who require anything in the line of drugs, oils, paints, etc., will do well to send their orders to Messrs. Hodge, Snell & Co., who will be sure to fill them satisfactorily.

SALE OF REAL ESTATE.—The lot on Main street next door to Mr. Brechtel's bakery, and formerly occupied as a drug store, has changed hands. Mr. H. E. Holmes, the druggist, is the purchaser, and the consideration \$2800. This is part of the old Shell estate, and a year or two since was in the market, but failed to find a purchaser at any price. The lot fronts 20 feet on Main street, and is 120 feet in depth. The price far which it sold indicates that property is looking up.

AN UNTRUTH.—Judge Jacobs in his speech in this town, as well as other places, denied having recommended the appointment of Beriah Brown as clerk of the Third Judicial District, and said that Judge Lewis made the appointment on his own motion and without consultation. To speak mildly, this was an untruth. Judge Jacobs urged the appointment of Beriah Brown, and went so far as to address a letter to Judge Lewis setting forth that it would please him (Judge Jacobs) to have the appointment made.

OFFICIAL VISIT.—On the 24th inst., Mr. John A. Burbank, of Rochester, Indiana, special agent for the postoffice department, paid an official visit to this place. His special business on this coast is to examine into the post routes, to alter or amend when necessary, and to have any change made that may be considered necessary. One important change is a through sack to La Grande, Oregon, saving a delay of ten or twelve hours to that place. He appears to be a gentleman of ability, and doubtless his recommendations will be carried into effect, and be of great benefit to the country.

LABOR ESTABLISHMENTS.—It is not boasting to say that Walla Walla has four of the largest business houses on the coast. A few years since we had a large number of merchants with limited capital, who divided up the business, but more lately these small dealers have been fringed out until now the business is confined to the four houses noted above. These houses carry stocks running from \$100,000 to \$200,000, and doing business on such an extensive scale are able to sell goods at lower figures than smaller dealers can buy for. It is this fact that has closed out the small traders, and practically given the control of the market to four houses.

DOMESTIC SEWING MACHINES.—Mr. C. Schumacher, the agent, has exhibited to us a sewing machine that seems to be an improvement upon all machines of the kind heretofore introduced. It is known as the "Domestic," and its striking peculiarity is in its simplicity of construction and consequently the facility to get out of order is reduced to the minimum. All sewing machines have more or less merit, but the trouble with them has been that they were adapted to special work, and when diverted to other purposes were liable to get out of order. A machine intended for use in the family should be capable of doing any and every kind of work—fine sewing to-day and coarse sewing to-morrow. This desideratum has been obtained in the "Domestic," and hence its superiority over all other machines. Instead of being adjusted to each change of work, it is self-adjusting, and from a piece of the finest linen, without any change whatever, it will sew up a piece of coarse harness. As already stated, the machinery is simple, and consisting of but few pieces, can be readily understood by any person blessed with a modicum of common sense. This very simplicity is the best assurance against the machine getting out of order, and hence its peculiar merit when applied to family use. In the "Domestic," we believe, perfection has been attained in the sewing machine, and we are confident that in families it will soon supersede all other machines.

HOLDING WHEAT BACK.—The platforms at the Railroad depot are now clear, and unless shipments of what come in more freely, the O. S. N. Company will reduce their trips to four trips a week. To keep up the present arrangement of daily trips the Railroad must take down at the rate of 140 tons a day. Shippers who are now holding off will see that if they continue this policy they will be unable to get their wheat to market before the close of navigation.

SNAKE RIVER NAVIGATION.—It is understood that with the coming week the O. S. N. Company will send a boat up the Snake River as far as Lewiston. The recent rains have swollen the river so as to make navigation practicable. We learn that large quantities of produce are now stored along the river awaiting shipment. The Company will endeavor to move this freight before the close of navigation for the season.

FANCY FAIR.—A fancy fair, for the benefit of the Catholic Church in course of erection in Frenchtown, will be held on the 7th, 8th and 9th of November, in the new building. All friends of the good cause in Walla Walla and vicinity are respectfully invited to attend. Dr. Baker will probably reduce the fair to that place and fit up a couple of cots for the comfort of visitors.

CHURCH SPIRE.—For several months the tower that fronts Mr. Egan's church presented an unfinished appearance. Monday last the spire intended to cap the tower was hoisted up to its place, the difficult job being accomplished without accident. From the base to the top of the spire is 120 feet, being several feet higher than any other church tower in town.

SHIPMENT OF WHEAT.—We learn that several of our heavy wheat shippers are endeavoring to make special terms with the O. S. N. Company in relation to the shipment of wheat to Astoria. The late advance in price has no doubt led to the movement, the object being to have the wheat at a point where it can be hurried forward at any moment.

JAMES MONAGHAN, Esq., one of the earliest settlers in Colville valley, is down at Walla Walla, buying a stock of goods for his store. We notice that Mr. Monaghan is the democratic candidate for sheriff of Stevens county. A prompt and energetic business man, with hosts of friends, he is quite sure to get away with the office.

THE DELEGATE.—We learn that in Columbia, Whitman and Stevens counties large numbers of republicans have announced their intention to vote for John P. Judson for delegate. After two years' experiment they are tired of Judge Jacobs, and now propose to try a young man of undoubted parts and ability.

DISABLED.—We regret to learn that T. J. Peabody, agent at Walla Walla for the O. S. N. Company, is compelled to resort to the use of crutches, his late illness having crippled his right leg. A clever, courteous gentleman, he has many friends who will sympathize with him in his affliction.

LOWERED.—The two-story building on Main street, formerly occupied by the late Joseph Helmutz as a brewery, has had the upper story taken off. From some fault of construction the upper story was deemed unsafe, and hence Mr. Thos. Quinn, agent for the estate, had it taken down.

STREAMBOAT TRAVEL.—T. J. Peabody, agent for the O. S. N. Company, notifies us that commencing next Monday, boats will make but two connections for passengers per week, leaving Celilo Tuesday and Saturday mornings, and leave Walla Walla Monday and Friday mornings.

OMISSION.—In our last issue by some unaccountable oversight, we omitted to notice the return of Dr. J. E. Bingham from Fort Colville. This we regret the more for the reason that very many persons who required his professional services were anxiously awaiting his return.

CHEMIST DOWN.—H. W. Stanton, former mayor of Lewiston, writes us that the credit of that town is so low down that it is "impossible to sell city scrip at any price." Considering that the town owes this office \$27 50, this is rather bad news.

WHEAT.—Notwithstanding the great rise in wheat, only about 80 tons go down to Walla Walla by each train of cars. We hear that most of our farmers who are able to hold their wheat over, will do so, for a still higher figure.

CHOICE MEATS.—Just at this time we notice that the "Pioneer Market," Dooley & Kirkman, makes an unusually fine display of meats. Epicures desiring choice cuts, will know where to go.

BIG CABBAGES.—Frank Osselli has a fine lot of cabbages, some of which weighs over thirty five pounds. They are for sale at his store, on Main street.

THE PAVILION.—During the races over Bush's Driving Park, the coming week, the grand stand will be free to visitors.

NATURALIZED CITIZENS.—Mr. Ayres, the gentlemanly clerk of the District Court, has been kept quite busy by persons who desire to become citizens of the United States. He informs us that he has filed twelve such declarations within the past week, and that the applicants are prepared to vote for reform.

CHOLERA MORBUS.—We regret to state that Miss Alexia Thomas, eldest daughter of our efficient sheriff, and a young lady of many accomplishments, had a severe attack of cholera morbus one day this week. Under the skillful treatment of Dr. Bingham we sincerely hope that Miss Thomas will soon be restored to health.

SENATOR J. H. MITCHELL will be at Walla Walla on Saturday next, and will speak at the Court House, at 7 1/2 o'clock in the evening. Our citizens without regard to party should turn out and give Senator Mitchell a glorious reception.

JUDGE GREGORY, democratic nominee for the Legislature, for a number of years represented Mariposa county in the California legislature, and in that way gained experience that will make him a valuable member.

T. P. DENNY, a former resident of this valley, but more recently of California, has returned for the purpose of settling up his business.

It is a very bad sign when men with less brains than a coconut undertake to rule and lead a political party.

There is a very warlike again, but nothing more so than it has been at intervals for the past year. It seems the fixed determination of Russia that the Servian war shall not come to an end unless upon terms that shall constitute a material advance of the Slavonic provinces toward complete independence—which would be, in fact, an advance of Russia toward the accomplishment of her hereditary policy concerning the Danube and the Bosphorus. This England is deeply opposed to, and it is her backing which causes the Porte to stand out. Thereupon, Russia continues her assistance to Servia, and allows threats to get out, through semi-official sources, of an intention to occupy the provinces unless the Porte yields.

This saying was quoted by republicans up to the election with much satisfaction. We wonder what they think about it now?

RADICAL newspapers are saying that Hayes knew nothing about the principles of the know nothing organization that nominated him for the Presidency; Everybody else understood them. If the radicals desire to place their candidate before the public as an idiot, they are welcome to lay hold of that horn of the dilemma.

THERE is no State in the Union, remarks the Detroit Free Press, in which the signs are more auspicious than they are in Michigan. From present indications the democratic candidates in six of the nine Congressional districts will be elected, while there is not one in which a radical victory is certain.

HOUSE AND FARM.

Chopped Heads. Are caused by having the hands a good deal in water, and going to the fire immediately after as in washing dishes, cooking, etc., in very cold weather; the skin being softened by the water, and dried too rapidly by the fire, contracts and cracks; sometimes the fingers become so sore that the sewing is impossible. The best plan of treatment is to wash the hands in the morning only, not to allow them to touch water the whole day after; then at bed time put half a teaspoonful of sweet oil in the palm, and work it into the skin of the hands and fingers most thoroughly; put on a pair of thread or old kid gloves at bedtime, and wear them all night; there will be a wonderful relief of the soreness in two or three days. If the hands must be in water more or less every day, then try the oil and gloves at night, using the same gloves without washing all winter, if necessary, for they become saturated with the oil, and thus set more efficiently by keeping the skin soft all the time. A great many complicated mixtures are advised, but there is nothing equal to sweet oil or glycerine, used as above. The glycerine answers a good purpose, it worked into the hands every morning, just after they are washed for the day. Honey is said to be very good in this connection, but a tidy person recoils at the idea of having honey, or anything else sticking to the hands and fingers all day. Some persons advise, "Take equal parts of unsalted, fresh butter, mutton tallow, beeswax, and stoned raisins. Simmer until the raisins are done to a crisp. Strain, pour into a cup and let it cool, and rub it into the hands and lips before going to bed or going out into the wind." The only really beneficial ingredient in the above is the unsalted butter; and oil or glycerine are much better.

Good Living and the Brain. Good living is said to cause of dyspepsia; but the most healthy people I ever knew have been among those who lived a day—the most nutritious food. By some it is said that tobacco, snuff, tea, coffee, butter and even bread cause this complaint; but whoever will make inquiries on this subject throughout the community will find that this is seldom true. In fact, dyspepsia prevails, according to my experience, altogether the most among the temperate and careful—among those who are careful as regards what they eat and drink and the labor they put into their intellectual organs, the brain. Such people often eat nothing but by the advice of the doctor, or some treatise on dyspepsia, or by weight; nor drink anything that is not certain ly harmless; they chew every mouthful until they are confident, on mature reflection, that it cannot hurt the stomach. Why, then, are they dyspeptic? Because, with all their carefulness, they pay no attention to the excitement of the brain. They continue to write two or three sermons or essays every week, besides reading a volume or two, with magazines, reviews, newspapers, etc., and attending to much other business calculated to excite the mind. To me it is not strange that such persons have nervous and stomachic affections. The constant excitement of the brain sends an excess of blood to the head, and therefore other organs are weakened, and morbid sensibility is produced, which renders the stomach liable to derangement from very slight causes.

Dr. Ferriar says that with this snuff he has twice cured himself of very violent colds, once, indeed, by taking trisnitrate of bismuth alone, which is a very powerful reme-dy for catarrh of the mucous membrane and is the most important ingredient in this snuff. Dr. Ferriar mentions two other persons who were cured of violent colds by the same snuff, and to these instances we may add that of the present writer, who, having a very violent cold coming on with the sensation of weight in the temples, and the usual disagreeable feeling in the throat, as well as ordinary catarrh, made trial of Dr. Ferriar's remedy one evening, and got upon the following morning completely free from cold, which has not since recurred. The snuff, instead of increasing the tendency to sneeze, at most immediately begins to diminish it.

Addison's Recipe for a Happy Life. Irritation on the schemes of life which offer themselves to our choice, and inconstancy in pursuing them, are the greatest and most universal causes of all our disquiet and unhappiness. When ambition plies one way, in interest another, inclination a third, and perhaps reason contrary to all, a man is likely to pass his time but ill pleasure. When the mind hovers among such a variety of ailments, one had better settle on a way of life that is not the very best we might have

chosen, than grow old without determining our choice, and go out of the world, as the greatest part of man kind do, before we have resolved how to live in it. There is but one method of setting ourselves at rest in this particular, and that is by abiding steadily to one great end, as the chief and ultimate aim of our pursuits. If we are firmly resolved to live up to the dictates of reason, without any regard to wealth, reputation, or the like considerations, any more than as they fall in with our principal design, we may go through life with steadiness and pleasure; but if we act by several broken views, and will not only be virtuous, but wealthy, popular, and everything that has a value set upon by the world, we shall live and die in misery and repentance.

Ferriar's Tomatoes. Place the tomatoes in a stone jar, and put it into a steamer. When they are tender, beat them to a pulp and put into a stew pan with a little onion (which has been minced and seasoned in butter until it is tender), a seasoning of pepper and salt, and some chopped parsley; simmer the mixture for a few minutes, and serve it very hot. It is good either alone or served in the dish with other chops, or other meat, sausages or fish of any kind. Tomatoes and sausages are capital. Fry the sausages and arrange them in the dish in front of the fire. Cut the tomatoes into slices of some onion thinly sliced; fry them, season them with pepper and salt, place them among the sausages, and serve them hot. In the same manner they are excellent with anything warmed a second time, chicken, rabbit, game or poultry, cold meat in slices, or fish of any kind.

Moths. Moths will work in carpets in rooms that are kept warm in the Winter as well as in the Summer. A sure method of removing the pests is to pour strong alum water on the floor to the distance of half a yard around the edges before laying the carpet. Then once or twice during the season sprinkle dry salt over the carpet before sweeping. Insects do not like salt, and sufficient adheres to the carpet to prevent their alighting upon it.

NOVEL USE FOR SPIDERS' THREADS.—Cobwebs have been applied to various uses. The delicate cross hairs in the telescopes of surveying instruments are the webs taken from spiders of species that are especially selected for their production of an excellent quality of this material. The spider, when caught, is made to spin his thread by tossing him from hand to hand, in case he is indisposed to furnish the article. The end is attached to a piece of wire which is doubled into parallel lines the spider's web, and proceeding from this, the web is wound upon it by turning the wire around. The coils are then gummed to the wire and kept for use as required. About a century ago, Iona of Languedoc, succeeded in making a pair of gloves and a pair of stockings from the thread of a spider. They were very strong, and of a beautiful gray color. Other attempts of the same kind have been made; but Reaumur has stated that the web of the spider was not equal to that of a silk worm, either in strength or lustre. The cocoons of the latter weigh from three to four grains, so that 2034 worms produce a pound of silk, but the bags of the spider, when cleaned, do not weigh above the third part of a grain.

Mud Spots on Varnish.—High class finishing varnishes, whether of English or American make, possess their wearing qualities from the simple fact that they retain their elasticity or oily principle to a great length of time. The surface becomes hardened sufficiently to resist dust and to admit of being washed, but the body of the varnish remains soft and sensitive, and mud allowed to dry on this varnish both stains it and extracts by capillary attraction the oil contained in the varnish. Each spot of mud, according to its size and shape, acts in the varnish immediately beneath it, but no further, from the fact that suction is created by the evaporation of water contained in the mud. Different kinds of soil act with more or less injurious effects. Sandy soil would have but a slight effect upon a varnish which would be badly stained by a more adhesive clay soil, and the filth of a large city is still more fatal to the gloss.

Trust Children.—Never accuse a child of a fault unless you are certain he committed it. Children should not be treated with suspicion. We should act toward them in this matter as we feel we ought to act toward others, only with greater tenderness—not less, as is usually done. We should always put the best construction possible upon their conduct; that is, unless you are sure a child is telling a lie and can prove it, do not show the slightest hesitation in believing what he says. Far better that you should be deceived than to run the risk of showing a truthful child that you do not trust him. Your simple trust makes a lying child truthful. Your doubt of his truthfulness makes a truthful child a liar.

A Young Lady, who recently had her beau taken away from her by another girl, told one of her bosom friends that she felt as if a great, dark cloud had settled down over her life; and when her friend suggested that there might be a silver lining to the cloud, she exclaimed, "What would be the good of that when there's a big discount on silver?"

COSTLY WINE.—A barrel of 1861 Johannisberg from the famous cellars of Prince Metternich, has just been knocked down for the highest price ever given for that wine. The purchaser is the recently disposed Sultan, who, after attempting to jump into the Bosphorus, appears determined to drown his cares in the bowl. The piece contains 1400 bottles—about 23 5s a bottle—so the Sultan Murad will have something to console him for the sword of Osman, now worn by his brother.
