EARTHQUAKE IN SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Oct. 21.—At six and a balf minutes before eight o'clock this morning San Francisco was visited with the heaviest earthquake shock it has ever known. The general direction of the shock was southeast and northwest. It lasted 42 seconds, and gathered violence as it continued until near the end. The time of the second shock was twenty-three minutes after nine o'clock; duration five seconds. The direction was the same as before. Lighter and briefer tremors occurred at intervals of half. an hour until fifteen minutes past twelve. The more prominent of these caused fresh stampeds to the street, of those who were attempting to con-

inent of these caused fresh stampedes to the street, of those who were attempting to conduct business or trying to work.

The initial shook was most severely felt along the eastern side of the city, and within the limits of made land, between Montgomery street and Water. On the solid land, on the outside of the thickly built business portion of the city, no serious damage was done to any well constructed house. In the limits of made land, at least a score of brick huild. of made land, at least a score of brick buildings were so badly strained or cracked, that business can't be resumed in them, and they may have to be pulled down. Owing to the excitement, business is generally suspended for several days.

In every case but one the fatal casualties resulted for the full part of the several days.

In every case but one the fatal casualties resulted from the falling of cornices or fire walls on the sidewalks beneath. Had the shock occurred half an hour later a larger number of persons would have been killed and wounded. The greatest damage done was to a belt extending several hundred feet wide and running about northwest and southest, commencing near the custom house and ending at the Folsom street wharf, injuring and demolishing in its course the following buildings: On Clay street, Graves' wire works; Howard building, Clay and Sansome; A. S. Rosenbaum, Clay and Battery; S. P.

The San Francisco gas works suffered severely; the chimney fell through the roof and the main walls were cracked. On Front street the destruction was still greater. A great quantity of coal was stored in the building and the pressure of the mass forced the wall out on pressure of the mass forced the wall out on the Fremont street side from the roof to the foundation and for the space of about fifty feet. The City Hall is in a bad condition, and the only people inhabiting it are the offi-cers of the Fire Department. An Act amendatory of an act approved July twenty-six, eighteen hourled and sixty six, entitled "An act to authorize the construction of certain bridges, and to establish them as post roads."

Whereas the St. Louis and Illinois Bridge Company, organized under the laws of the State of Missouri, and the Illinois and St. Louis Bridge Company, organized under an act of the general assembly of the State of Illinois, have been consolidated, in pursuance of the authority granted to the said Illinois and St. Louis Bridge Company, in their act of incorporation, and the authority granted to the St. Louis and Illinois Bridge Company, by an act of the general assembly of the State of Missouri, approved March inseteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight: Therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Reme.

nineteeath, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight: Therefore, Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the company formed by this consolidation, under the name and style of the Illinois and St. Louis Bridge Company, is hereby recognized and declared to be a corporation by that name, with full power and authority to construct a bridge across the Mississippi river opposite the city of St. Louis, in conformity to the act of which this act is amendatory, with all the rights, privileges, and powers grapt.

ity to construct a oringe across the anississippi river opposite the city of St. Louis, in conformity to the act of which this act is amendatory, with all the rights, privileges, and powers granted and conferred by the several acts of the general assembles of the States of Illinois and Missouri to the respective companies by the consolidation of which the said Illinois and St. Louis Bridge Company was formed, and not inconsistent with the provisions of the act to which this act is amendatory: And provided further, That in construction said bridge there shall be one span of at least five hundred feet clear between piers.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the said corporation may execute a mortgage and issue bonds payable, principal and interest, in gold, and their bridge across the Mississippi river and approaches thereto, when constructed, shall be a post road to carry the mails of the United States, and enjoy the rights and privileges of other post roads.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That said corporation may bold their meetings in either the State of Illinois or the State of Missouri, as the board of directors may elect, and the directors may be citizens of any of the United States; and said corporation may use and be used in any circuit court of the United States; Provided, That nothing in this act or in any previous legislation affecting the premises shall be so construed as to deprive the legislatures of the States of Illinois and Missouri of the right to regulate the toils and fares which may be charged by said company for the use of such bridges: Provided further, That the toils now fixed by the legislatures of Illinois and Missouri shall not be increased.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That whenever in the prosecution of the improvements of the Mississippi river, tion of the improvements of the Mississippi river, at either the Des Moines or Rock Island rapids therein, it becomes necessary or proper to take possession of the right of way over any lands, or to use any earth, quarries, or other material lying adjacent or near to either of said works, and needful for its prosecution, the officer in charge of said work, or his assistant, may, in the name of the United States, take possession of and use the same, after having first paid, or secured to be paid, the value thereof, which the name of the United States, take possession of and use the same, after having first paid, or secured to be paid, the value thereot, which may have been ascertained in the mode provided by the laws of the State wherein such property or materials lie[s], for adjudging the value of private property which may be needed for any public improvement: Provided, however, That when the owner of such property or material shall fix a price for the same, which, in the opinion of the said officer in charge, shall be reasonable, he may take the same at such price without further delay.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That a portion of the appropriations made or to be made for the prosecution of the improvements aforesaid, not exceeding fifty thousand dollars in amount, may be applied in payment of the property or material taken and used as aforesoid.
