THE COLORADO WAR.

A Graphic Description of the Fight on Milk Creek.

CAMP ON MILK CREEK, Colorado, October 9th, 1879.

No doubt you have heard of our engagement with the treacherous Utes. A party of them met us on Bear river and another on William's Fork. They professed friendship. Among their number was "Old Colorow."
On the morning of September 29th, about one mile for the color of the color On the morning of September 29th, about one mile from Milk creek, and within twenty miles of White river agency, we were met by the Utes secreted in the sage brush near by the Utes secreted in the sage brush near the mouth of a bad canyon. Lieut. Cherry discovered them, and was ordered by Major Thornburgh to hail them. He took fifteen men of company "E." (my company), and approached them and hailed. They replied with bullets. Major Thornburgh and Capt. Payne were riding at the head of the column company "F." Fifth cavalry in advance; my company next, company "D." Fifth cavalry, Lieut. Paddock commanding, one and a half miles to the rear, in charge of the wagon train. Captain Payne was ordered to and a nair times to the rear, in charge of the wagon train. Captain Payne was ordered to take position on the hill to our left; I to take a hill to our right. I dismounted my company, leaving every fourth man to hold horses. Here the fight became general at every point. The Indians appeared on all sides and on nearly all the bluffs, and in all the ravines. The fifteen men of my company with Lieut. Cherry, fought gallantly, and with Lieut. Cherry, fought gallantly, and every man of my company fought variantly. At this time Major Thornburgh approached me and informed me that Capt. Payne and his company would fall back on a knoll, then to fall back on him. 'I sent for Lieutenant Cherry to fall back on me, and we would cover a retreat. As Capt. Payne's company was about to start, or had started, his girth broke, and he got a fearful fall; one of his men dismounted and assisted him on his horse, the Captain's horse having gotten away. "F." company, Fifth cavalry, followed by the Captain—he being badly bruised—went to the wagon train, found the train being parked and Leutenant Paddock fighting the Indians and wounded. I fell back slowly with my company, dismounted and fought all the way, every man doing his and fought all the way, every man doing his duty. One of my men informed me that Major Thornburgh was killed, half a mile ahead of us. I tried to reach his remains. Here my horse was shot the second time under me, and also Sergeant Neurolin's horse. As all the men were up, and we had our wounded with us, we fell back to the balance of our command, but fought all the way. Our ethibour positions are still the way. way. Our stubborn resistrace gave time to form temporary breastworks, of the men's bundles, flour, corn sacks, wagons and dead horses. None of the wounded of "E" company are suffering much, except Sergeants Montgomery and Lupton and Private Mahoney. Corporal Hunter is all right, and the rest of the wounded are doing well. Mr. Davis, the citizen from Fort Steele, is going back with us; he is improving, the ball having been cut out of his foot. The weather is cold and snow on the ground.

No one can imagine the progress which these countries have been making since 1874 in agricultural and pastoral products, with the limited immigration they have had, nor the great future in store for this country.

Traveling from Pendleton in Oregon, on to Lewiston in Idaho, a tract of country 133 miles long, you see the stubble of continuous wheat fields which have yealded on an average thirty bushels of wheat per acre. Yet along this route not one thirtieth portion of the land fit for raising wheat has been placed in cultivation. COLUMBIA RIVER BAR IMPROVEMENTS. The New York Sun opposes the appropria-tion of twenty millions of dollars, which, it alleges will be surely demanded of the next congress for the improvement of Columbia River Bar. It admits the dangerous charac-River Bar. It admits the dangerous character of the bar, but contends that if the national treasury could be empticed into the mouth of the Columbia, the only engineering result would be the useless removal of the bar a little further seaward. The financial result of successive appropriations, practically, without limit, would be a total waste of money and the enrichment of a ring of sheived and bankrupt Oregon politicians, who mean to repair their fortunes through this job.

We like a journal of positive and pronounced opinions when those opinions are based upon sound common sense, but in the case under consideration, the Sun is altogether at sea; its propositions are unsound, and its deductions are not only incorrect, but absolutely unjust. In the first place, its estimate largely exceeds the amount which the incoming congress will be asked to appropriate. The assertion that the bar would be

removed farther seaward if the national treasury were emptied into the mouth of the Columbia river is too devoid of logic or grammar to entitle it to serious consideration. It is especially surprising that a New York paper should doubt the ability of science to overcome a minor obstacle in the Columbia river, when it has recently witnessed such a splendid triumph of engineering as that involved in the destruction of the obstacles in Hell Gate at the entrance to its own harbor. Nature has placed a barrier in our main artery of commerce for science to overcome, and when eastern papers say that successive appropriations for its removal is a total waste of money, it looks like a piece of contemptible sectional jealousy toward this great Western Empire, whose rapid development they are impotent to hinder. We leave the Oregon press to deal with the tissue of misrepresentations about its "shelved and bankrupt ring of politicians who mean to repair their broken fortunes through this job.' If the people of the Eastern States were less selfish in their endeavors to secure appropriations for improving little inland creeks in their own section, which run nowhere, and are an outlet for nothing in particular, there would be some consistency in opposing a scheme of this magnitude, which proposes to make navigable for vessels of deep draught, one of the mightiest rivers on the continent. 




