Our Eastern Empire.

WALLA WALLA, W. T., Oct. 29, 1879.

If the citizens of Portland wish to ascertain what is to be the future of their fair city, let them come up here and make a tour of this eastern country.

Traveling from Portland to Oregon, on to Lewiston in Idaho, a tract of country 133 miles long, you see the stubble of continuous wheat fields which have yielded on an average thirty bushels of wheat per acre.

If we remember rightly, the fraudulent president promised to remove Gov. Brayman and to appoint, as his successor in the executive chair, the individual nominated by the territorial legislature; Hon. E. J. Curtis was unanimously endorsed for the position, and petitions signed by nearly every voter in all sections of the territory favoring his nomination, were forwarded to Washington, and backed by the entire congressional delegation from the Pacific coast, only to be contemptuously disregarded by the civil service reform fraud who draws another man's salary.

As there is but a slight show for the admission of this territory as a state, its citizens are naturally interested in knowing how much longer they are to be deprived of their rights; in spite of radical teachings and constitutional amendments we believe that a white man is just as good as a negro, and we fail to see the justice of depriving a white man residing in a territory of the rights and privileges which are exercised by a negro living in a state.

The people of Idaho are peculiarly unfortunate in possessing a governor who is not merely out of all harmony with the overwhelming democratic majority, but is entirely unsuited by early habits and associations from appreciating the wants of the country or the wishes of its inhabitants.

THE ANNUAL FARE.—The usual commission to investigate the causes of the Ute outbreak has been appointed; the usual picketing tour will be had in some fashionable resort, where the fortunate members can have a good time and leisure to study the nature of the noble red men by interviewing the wooden Indians outside the cigar stores.

TERMINAL UNIVERSITY.—The bill to appropriate \$2000 for the support of this institution of learning, caused a lively debate in the legislature. THE ORIENT AWAKE.—Intelligence comes from China indicating great activity among the merchants and capitalists of the Celestial Empire. The City of Peking, which arrived yesterday, brought advices that the Chinese merchants' Steamship Company were about to place steamers on the route from China to the Sandwich Islands, to be followed by others to ply between the Islands and San Francisco.

THE arbor for military renown, which prompted so many departures from Colorado two weeks ago, is abating. The Denver Tribune says: "The number of colonels and captains ready to draw their sword—we mean their pay—for the endangered settlers is decreasing. The military market was so dull at the governor's office yesterday that not even a paltry brigadier-general turned up."

THE net debt of California, as appears from the report of the state comptroller, is \$3,306,714. This is not a great burden; but a number of the counties are in a bad condition. The aggregate of the several county debts for the year ending June 30, 1878, is \$11,655,524 as against \$11,880,919 for the year ending June 30, 1879. The funded debt of San Francisco was \$4,322,500 a year ago. It is estimated, however, that the county owns very nearly \$10,000,000 more than she owes.

This bridge has been long needed, as the travel on that road is constantly increasing, and we hear that from forty to eighty teams pass that point daily. The bridge has just been completed, and accepted by the County Commissioners. It is a double truss, seventy-seven feet long, sixteen feet wide, and fourteen feet above low water, cost, under \$1000, and was built by that prince of builders, W. P. Horton. From what we learn this bridge is very substantial, and a credit to the architect.

ATTEMPTED ESCAPE OF INDIANS.—Through the courtesy of A. Reeves Ayers, Esq., of this city, in presenting us with a private letter written by J. W. Masters, we are enabled to present an account of an attack made by the Indians convicted of the Perkins murders upon the jailer of Yakima city.

About 9:30 A. M. on the last inst., York, the jailer, had occasion to enter the cell where these fiends were confined, when he was struck on the head with a stone, wrapped in a buckskin sling in the hands of Kipe. York staggered out into the front office to get his revolver, and the Indians left the cell to secure a loaded needle gun in the office, when they were fired upon by the jailer through the window, and all of them wounded. They retreated to the cell and a crowd having collected they were disarmed. Kipe was shot in the right chest, the ball ranging through his shoulder blade, breaking his arm all to pieces, also a slight skin wound on his face. Salaskin was shot through the left elbow, tearing his arm all to fragments. Two-ow-na received a flesh wound in the hip, another ball hit him in the back, passing through upper part of scapula, and lodging in or about the lungs. Kipe and Salaskin will probably recover, or live long enough to be hanged, but Two-ow-na is liable to die at any time. We congratulate York on his miraculous escape, and trust that he will have the pleasure of witnessing these demons dancing in mid air.

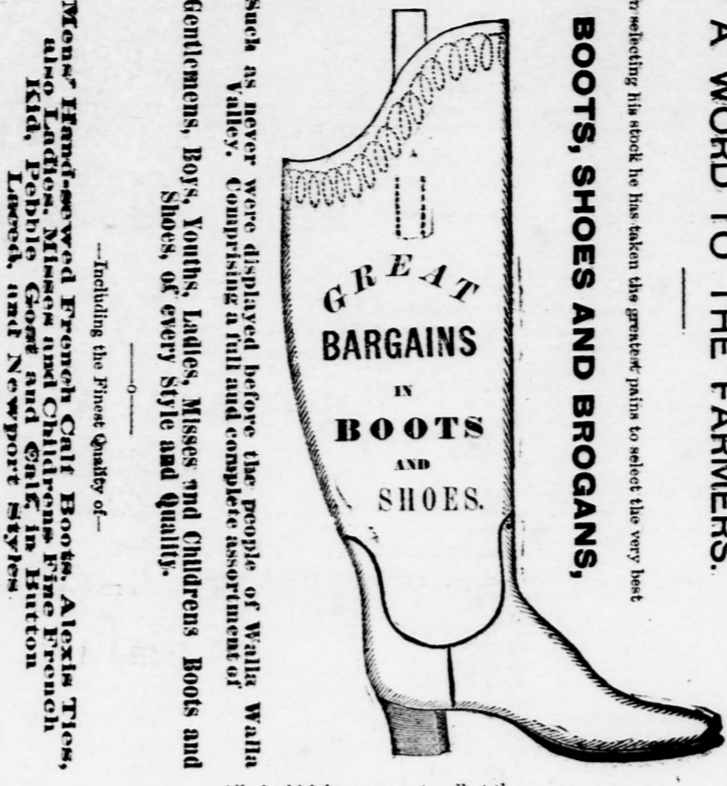

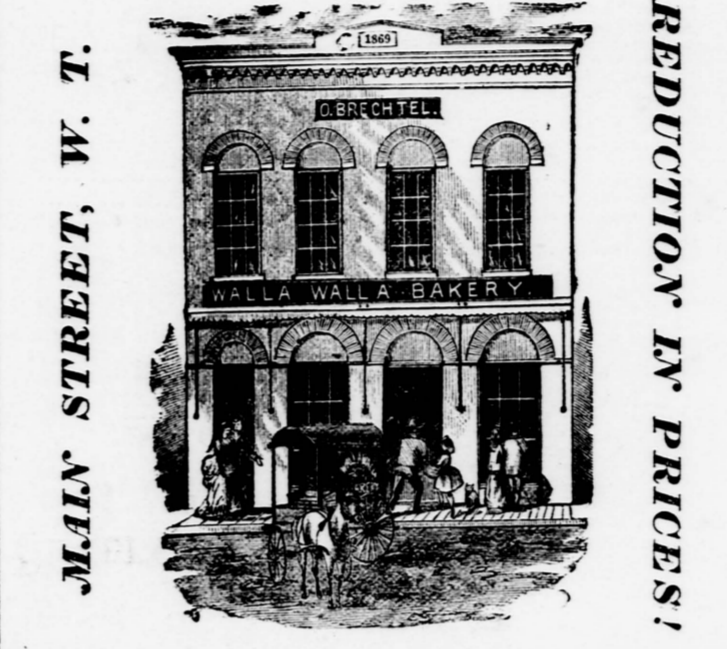

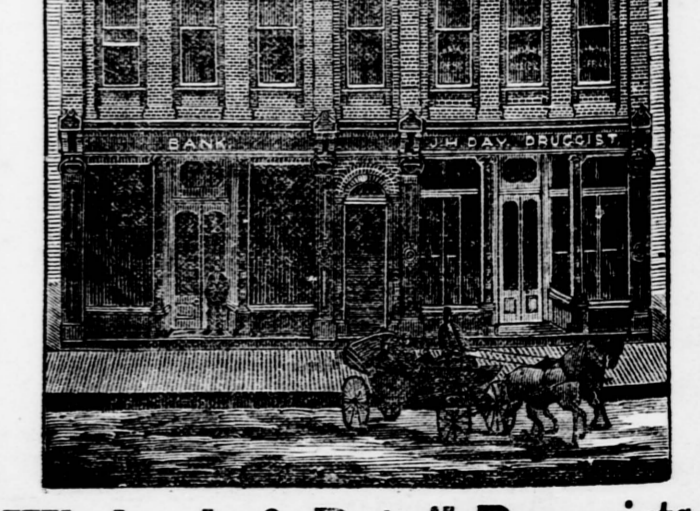
