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Montana Correspondence.

BOULDER VALLEY, Montana, Nov. 1st, '67. EDITOR STATESMAN:—I deem it not less a duty than a pleasure to announce to you, that your valuable and ever welcome journal has found an uninterrupted and regular passage over the snow-covered mountains, into this valley.

The thermometer, for the last fourteen days, could hardly raise steam enough to place the mercury up even to freezing point. The earth just now, is clothed with drifting snow, while cold and severe North winds howl over it during the bright moonlight nights with a dismal sound.

Mineral in Montana, during the past season, has been more successful than any previous year, since its first discovery. In my opinion, Montana has established an authentic fact, and that is that its mineral resources grow richer in wealth as they grow older, and I am proud to assert that its numerous mines, both placer and quartz, support almost double the number of inhabitants that they did eighteen months ago.

It is an astonishing fact, that the main thoroughfare leading from the Columbia river into the large and flourishing agricultural valley of Walla Walla, has been so long suffered to take care of itself. In fact, I may say to this day, this main artery of trade, is but little better improved than when first opened up by government teams, at the establishing of Fort Walla Walla by Col. Stepien.

The Vigilantes in Montana are fearfully quiet. Their work, if they work at all—and I have every reason to believe they do—is performed with the strictest secrecy, and the only information by which we know of such an organization, is gleaned from the public press.

ELECTION RETURNS.—We take from the Oregonian the following returns of the late Eastern elections: Massachusetts elects the republican State ticket by 20,000 to 30,000. Two-thirds of the Legislature favor the liquor license law.

BLOODY TIMES.—At the late term of the District Court in Deer Lodge Valley, Montana, three young men were arraigned on the charge of wilful murder. One of the accused had murdered a man in a quarrel about a courtesan. The other two had each killed his man in the course of bar-room quarrels.

Walla Walla Correspondence.

WALLULA, November 12, 1867.

EDITOR STATESMAN.—The weather in this precinct has been anything but pleasant for some time past; high winds, with considerable rain. The whole thing may be summed up in a few words: COLD, RAW WEATHER.

Large amounts of freight are coming in from below. Pack trains are loading here for Montana. From thirty-five to forty teams arrive every day loaded with flour and grain from the Walla Walla Valley.

Speaking of the number of teams engaged on the Walla Walla and Walla Wagon road, reminds me that something should be done to the road immediately. Near sixteen miles of this road, at this end, is just as nature made it, and in fact the whole road is a disgrace to the country.

Report and bill of James Stanfield, Supervisor of Roads, allowed, and Auditor directed to balance his account. It was ordered, that the change of the Boise Road be made at or near J. W. Atchison's residence.

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W. O. Painter was the purchaser thereof, for the sum named in said confirmation of sale; it is ordered that a deed be executed upon the said W. O. Painter, by the Board of County Commissioners, for said land, to-wit: The West half of the Northwest quarter of section thirty six in Township seven North of Range No. thirty-two East.

Ordered, that the County Treasurer be cited to appear before the Board, at the Court House, in the city of Walla Walla, on Wednesday, the 20th day of November, 1867, at the hour of 1 o'clock, P. M., to make an exhibit of the Books and Funds, in his hands belonging to the office of County Treasurer.

Ordered, that the sum of (300 00) dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the Road Fund to be used in the repairing roads and the bridges in Road District No. 3, and that an order issue therefor in favor of the Supervisor of said District. On motion, the Board adjourned.
