Civil Service Reform. The following is the letter of Grover Cleveland, recently elected governor by the Democrats of New York, by 196,000, setting forth his views of Civil Service Reform: BUFFALO, Oct. 28. Hon. George William Curtis and others, Committee, etc.—GENTLEMEN—In answer to your letter of inquiry, dated Oct. 20, 1882, in relation to Civil Service Reform, I beg to refer you to my recent letter, accepting the nomination for Governor, in which many of the matters referred to in your letter are touched upon, and I assure you that the sentiments therein expressed are sincerely and honestly entertained, and are stated without any mental reservation.

I have no hesitation in saying that I fully approve of the principles embodied in the Pendleton bill relating to this subject, and that I should be glad to aid in any practical legislation which would give them a place in the management of the affairs of the State and of municipalities so far as they can be made applicable thereto.

I believe that the interests of the people demand that a reform in the national and State administrative service should speedily become an accomplished fact, and that the public should receive honest and faithful service at the hands of well-fitted and competent servants.

When contests between parties are waged for the purpose of securing places for professional politicians of high or low degree, whose only recommendation for appointment is their supposed ability to do partisan service, the people are apt to be defrauded by the displacement of tried and faithful servants, well able to perform the duties upon which they are paid with the people's money, and the substitution of those who are unfit and incompetent.

This pernicious system gives rise to an office-holding class, who, in their particular regard to the interests of the people, are not only indifferent, but are actively hostile to the interests of the people in political action; this breeds the use of dishonest and reprehensible methods, which frequently result in the servants of the people dictating to their masters.

If placed in the public service are worth anything, they should be the reward of merit and well doing, and the opportunity to secure them on that basis should be open to all. Those holding these places should be assured that their tenure depends upon their efficiency and fidelity to their trust, and they should not be allowed to use them for partisan purposes.

It seems to me that very much or all of what we desire in the direction of Civil Service Reform, is included in the doctrine that the concerns of the State and nation should be conducted on a business principle, and as nearly as possible in the same manner as a prudent citizen conducts his private affairs.

The Presbyterians have selected sites both in Walla Walla and Dayton for a college. A meeting will soon be held to take the preliminary steps for founding such an institution in one or the other of these cities probably.—State Journal.

The Dayton Tattler is now off. At the western terminus of the Canadian Pacific recently, a half mile of track was laid in thirty-five minutes—the quickest time on record. The shipments of cattle are now so great over the Northern Pacific that stock trains take precedence over passenger trains. So says the Kismat Tribune.

On the 8th the Herald said: "Well, the people have spoken. Yesterday they gave their opinion about the river and harbor and other jobs; about the Hubbell assessments; about the oppressive and needless taxation; and about Federal interference—dictation in politics.
