The suicide of young Dovan, whom many in this city, personally knew, was of that phenomenal character, which piques our curiosity, fully as much as it shocks us. Why should he commit suicide? We venture to suggest, as a rational hypothesis for which we have no other basis, than a reflection on certain facts as disclosed by comments here and there, that the act was in great degree the result of a morbid brooding on the subject of suicide. We may be partially satisfied by the explanation of hereditary insanity, for the transmitted tendency to self-destruction is an intelligent theory as far as it goes, but it does not

John P. Clum, until recently the editor f the Tombstone, A. T., Epitaph, is in fare ban diting a paper in the uncivil gerous ... undertaking as can be engaged in. He went to New Mexico in 1871 and in 1874 was appointed Indian Agent for the Apache tribes at San Carlos, A. T. In May, 1880 Mr. Clum established the Tombatone Epitaph as a weekly. It is now a flourishing daily. He was first made postmaster and then mayor. As a postmaster he had a hard time of it, but as the chief magistrate of the village, brought, as he was, into almost daily con tact with the rougher and most despe elements, he grew accustomed to write his editorials in sight of his trusty Colt's sixshooter. In attempting to preserve orde he made enemies of the cowboys. This warfare which lasted off and on for mor than six months. First there cocurr Clum's Chief of Police and three officers and four cowboys. Three of the officer were badly injured, and three cowboys were killed ontright. The fourth who happened not to be armed rang away and tee was formed and paraded thattroets day and night, armed swith cix-shooters needle-gans and Henry rifles. 




