NORTH PACIFIC RAILROAD LANDS.

Northern Pacific Railroad Company. PACIFIC AND PEN'OREILLE DIVISIONS. LETTER FROM GEN. SPRAGUE.

In accordance with requests from numerous settlers on the land grant of the Northern Pacific railroad company we addressed a letter to the superintendent, Gen. Sprague, asking the questions embodied below.

OFFICE OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT, WALLA WALLA, W. T., Nov. 24, 1879.

1. Can the Northern Pacific Railroad Company give good and sufficient titles to the lands they now own or hold?

2. What if congress shall declare their grant forfeited?

3. Will the railroad company refund to those who pay purchase money now?

4. Which will the lands of this grant in this immediate vicinity be in the market?

5. All railroad lands are understood to be mortgaged—does the signature of the Trustee make a valid deed?

To your first question, I reply: This company has not yet acquired full title to the lands granted by the government to aid in construction of the Pen'oreille division, that part of the company's road now being constructed, and when completed, the company will have as good a title as the United States government can give.

Answer to second question: If congress shall declare the grant to this company forfeited before the completion of the road now under construction, then, probably, the company would fail to acquire a title to the lands referred to.

Answer to third question: All lands granted to aid in the construction of all railroads in the United States are usually mortgaged. Trustees are appointed who have full power to unite in conveyances of titles to such lands, and when they are paid for the lands are entirely free and clear of all incumbrances on account of such mortgage.

Answer to fourth question: The railroad lands in the immediate vicinity of Walla Walla will most likely be offered for sale soon after the exact limits of the grants have been officially announced by the Hon. commissioners of the general land office of the United States.

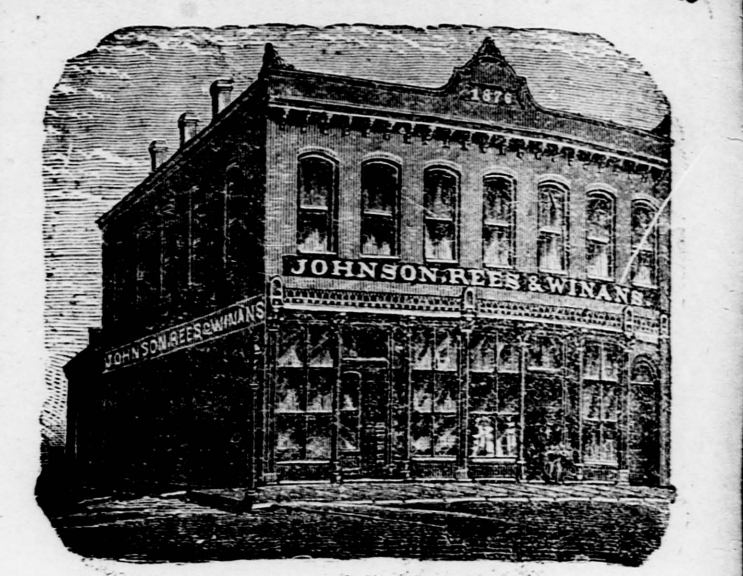

ENTERTAINING MEN.—There are no more entertaining citizens of Walla Walla than our salmon keepers. Every dollar of money they make they spend here at home, and are ever glad to be around in all enterprises, no matter whether it is for the benefit of our city and country at large or for charitable purposes, they are ever in the lead. In this connection we would counsel that any benefit can possibly be done to the city by the city ordinance ordering them to close their saloons every night at 12 o'clock.

DIAMOND FRUIT PAPER.—Our sanctum table literally bends beneath the weight of a gigantic apple which was deposited there, on Monday last, by Hon. Senator Ford, of the Diamond fruit farm, located a few miles below town. The senator's home is a favorite resort of picnicking parties from this city, and is very appropriately named, for in addition to the fact that its products are the "best" both in size and quality, it possesses the added peculiarity of having concealed in its fertile bosom a diamond, lost from a finger ring by a lady of this city last summer.

FIVE PERCENT.—Purchases for Thanksgiving are very scarce the first portion of the week, and we began to imagine that we should not hear the governor of Idaho's proclamation in a becoming manner. We wanted a turkey that would do us out any other gold in town, and after seeing all the turkey pens in the city we came to the conclusion that we were not to be blessed this year; but on going to the office on Monday morning we saw lying on the floor what at first looked like a young ostrich, but on closer inspection we found it to be a fine specimen of what ought to be a national bird, with the compliments of our energetic friend Mr. W. G. Kirkman. Thanks from Kirkman, may you live long, and prosper as you and your enterprise deserves.

OUR EXPORTS.—The Walla Walla county have this year shipped about 75,000 tons of wheat. All this vast amount, before it reaches salt water will be carried 21 miles out of the port, and must necessarily be handled eight or nine times before it can be placed on board ship. The Portland papers are continually harping on the string that Portland is a port for all vessels drawing 18 feet of water. Recently a Portland ship had to unload 500 tons of wheat, which cost a Walla Walla shipper about \$500 for the unnecessary handling. This wheat was then placed on barges to be towed to Astoria, where the Portland vessel again received it. With direct communication to Astoria our farmers would gain from 25 to 50 cents more per cental than they do in the present state of affairs.

THE GAITY THEATRE.—The patrons of this fine theatre have the past week been treated to some of the best plays that were ever placed on the boards. It is the intention of Mr. Maguire to make periodical trips to this country with different troupes and the latest novelties. Mr. Maguire's abilities are such that he will please his audience no matter what he places before them. We understand that during the coming winter he will endeavor to bring Mr. May's latest, "The East and West" as well as the "Crown and the Cross" and is very popular. The thanks of our citizens are due to Mr. Maguire for his energy and enterprise in erecting this theatre. It fills a long felt want, and is quite an addition to the attractions of the town. Our people have long required such a place of amusement, and this fills the bill perfectly.

SEAMING EXHIBITION.—Mr. Davis, of Portland, Prof. of the Noble Art of Self Defense, gave an exhibition of his skill to a crowded house on Tuesday evening last. THE EARLY BIRD, ETC.—Mr. Phillip Ritz, of this city, has taken up some 5500 acres in government and railroad land on the survey of the Northern Pacific railroad. He purposes breaking a large amount of it this fall with the view of raising feed for man and beast next year. This is foresight; the North Pacific will have employed the next season, in the construction of the line from the mouth of Snake river to Spokane, from five hundred to a thousand men. It has been found almost impossible to keep down the increase of these poisonous animals by means of poison or trapping; their cunning prevents them from "putting their foot in the trap, and the nature of the beast is such that they will eat no bait but will kill themselves. So in order to destroy them the farmers are raising live foxgloves, who outrun them; by this means the above fox was captured.

THAT WHEAT.—Last week we mentioned a fine variety of wheat that was shipped to Portland from a ranch in this county. Since then we have discovered that it was raised on the ranch of Mitt Aldrich on Dry creek; the seed originally came from France and was sent to Oregon through the Agricultural Department. Jesse Day obtained a lot and distributed it around amongst his friends. It makes a very white flour but is not so hard as that of our favorite millers owing to its cracking open too readily; some farmers also object to it, as it must be harvested directly it is ripe.

WELL SPOKEN OF.—Mr. James West, who recently commenced business in this city, next to the red store, as a practical gunsmith, is well spoken of by the Napa Reporter, and recommended by that sterling newspaper as "a good citizen, an upright business man and a thorough gunsmith; while his wife, Mrs. West, is one of those unassuming, kind and benevolent ladies whose departure is always regretted by the community in which they have lived."
