As an evidence of the former, we now have before us the jaw-bone—anatomically termed the inferior maxillary—of a biped which is almost double the size of an ordinary human jaw-bone. From point to point of the con-dyles—the upper projections, where junction is made with the corresponding parts above— this fossil measures fully five inches. Its in a perfect state of preservation—so perfect that had it been of ordinary size, one would that had it been of ordinary size, one would have supposed that the owner had not made his (or her) exit from his "vale of ters" over fifteen or twenty years ago. The crown of the tooth is marked by numerous transverse ridges, thickly ennmeled. The ename is bright, and in many places, as well preserved as if on the tooth of a living animal. These are not deep, and are rounding on the top, indicating alaptability to bruising in mastication, rather than cutting, on the carniverous or flesheating order. The tooth is partially petrified and has indications of having been a long while buried. Upon exposure to the air, a fragment crumbled off, and fully half of it is a state of petrification. Had it not been for the ename!—the most indestructible of substances—and this petrifying process, it is doubtful that its form would have been so long preserved.

What mighty convulsion of nature caused their extinction? and how far did its influences extend? Did not the great upheaving break asunder a land connection that once existed between the two connection that once existed between the two hearispheres? One Artic explorer reports having found fossil tropical plants, species of the palm, buried beneath the perrental snows of Kamskatka. This, as well as the Siberian fossils, points to a complete and permanent climatical revolution. May not these, facts bear upon the theory of our Indian tribes conting from the Eastern hemisphere. Was there not a time when, with even open canoes—such as the northern coast Indians uow use—they could have crossed?

We leave the subject for the speculation of the antiquarian and the curious. The mammoth jaw-hone and tooth described may be seen, for a few days, in the Counting-room of the Post.—Montana Post.

EXTERPRISE .- The Oregon Steam Navigation Company certainly keeps pace with the times. In addition to their main stem, which includes the navigation of the Columbia between Portland and Wallula, they have now in the course of construction three new steamers which are designed to act as feeders to their main trunk. The first of these boats will navigate the Snake River from Olds Ferry to possibly the mouth of Jordan Creek. This enterprise accomplished, the land travel from Salt Lake to the navigable waters of the Columbia Kiver will be reduced to less than three hundred miles. When this feat is accomplished we may confidently expect the Mormon trade and travel to abandon the deserts of Southern California and follow the Columbia River route. At Colville, following erable commercial importance, out the same spirit of enterprise, the Company has already launched a steamer which is intended to penetrate to the sources of the Columbia, thus opening to the prospector and miner a vast region which is known to be rich in treasure. Again, on Pen d'Oreille Lake the keels of a boat are already laid, the object being to attract the Montana-trade. It is rare indeed that a single combination is able to contribute so much toward the development of a country, and fortunate has it been that the navigation of the Columbia has been controled by enterprising men.

> FEEDING BEEF CATTLE .- We know that much of the practice in relation to the rearing and feeding of animals in the Atlantic States is inapplicable to this country; but still we believe something can be learned from that quarter. A writer who lately passed through Illinois thus describes the ode generally pursued in feeding beef cattle in that State: " A little corn is fed before taking to the

pasture, that is, in October, commencing with one eighth of a bushel, and gradually, going up to one half of a bushel a day, the corn is fed on the stalk and years back always was thrown on the ground; many do still.

In July I rode in a buggy through a series of feed lots, some twenty acres in all, where the corn had come up as thick as wheat, and was as high as the horse. The cattle are turned into it in August. But those who seek the most profit build mangers, called bios, which are fixed or movable; the latter are best. These are four and as half feet wide, two feet high, and have a tight bottom so as to held shock, jerked or wasked corn.
A bin long enough to feed one hundred cat. A bin long enough to feed one hundred cat-tle will cost about \$50, and the cost will be saved in thirty days, for the cattle est all the corn. Meanwhile hogs are turned in to eat the litter. In this way hogs do better than when they are put into the feed lots after the cattle are changed, particularly in-freezing weather.
