OLYMPIA, November 28, 1869. DEAR STATESMAN : Since the date of my last letter a large amount of business has been transacted in both Houses, and a disposition exhibited to make up for the idleness that characterized the earlier weeks of the session. The legislature has been mainly confined to a revision of the "code," and laws that are to regulate the life, liberty and property of the citizen have been run through with indecent haste. In many instances the most important bills were never read, except by title, and members were compelled to vote upon them without the slightest knowledge of their provisions. This style of legislation has disgusted all honest men, and as a result Gov. ernor Flanders has felt it his duty to veto all the bills relating to the "code." The veto was sent in on Saturday morning, and has caused quite a flatter in the radical camp, The democrats in caucus have agreed to stand by the Governor in his war against corruption, and in the House have votes enough to sustain the veto. In the Council, owing to Vansyckle's defection, the radicals have a two-third vote, and are consequently able to carry anything, it matters not how outrageous. Vansyckle now votes with the radicals on every question, and is considered in full communion with that party. Just now his position gives him importance, but with the expiration of his term of office he will sink into oblivion, or if remembered at all, it will only be for his treachery.

The fee for recording deeds and other papers is placed at 20 cents per folio, instead of 25 cents as heretofore.

The copper is first melted, then the magnesia. eal-ammoniac, lime, and tartar in powder are added little by little. briskly stirring for about half an hour, so as to mix thoroughly; after which zine is thrown on the surface in small grains, stirring it until en-tirely fused. The crucible is then covered, and the fusion maintained about thirty-five minutes, when the dross is skimmed off and the alloy is ready for use. It can be cast, rolled drawn, stamped, chased, beaten into powder, or leaves; and none but ex-cellent judges can distinguish it from gold.
