Ordinance No. 1.

Establishing Fire Districts, providing for the Appointment of Fire Wardens, and Defining their Powers and Duties.

Ordinance No. 2.

Each Warden, on receiving his certificate of appointment, shall attend the first meeting of the Council, on or before the first meeting of each month, hereafter, at which he shall in person, or by his agent, certify to the City Recorder, and subscribe an oath to faithfully perform his duties as such Warden for the current year.

Ordinance No. 3.

It shall be the duty of every Fire Warden from time to time, as he may deem necessary, and at least twice in each year, to go to the place where the fire engines are kept, and ascertain whether the chimneys, flues, ranges, furnaces, stoves, or stove-pipes, are safe, or in any danger of fire, or put up new chimneys and every room where fires are used, and if he shall have reason to believe that any danger of fire exists in any place, he shall immediately notify the owner or agent, and shall cause the same to be repaired, and if necessary shall give the owner or agent a written notice, which shall be filed of record in the City Recorder's office, and which shall be a sufficient warrant to the fire engines to enter the premises, and if necessary to demolish the same.

Ordinance No. 4.

Whenever a notice either written or verbal shall have been given by a Warden to the owner or agent, of any place, in which the chimneys, flues, ranges, furnaces, stoves, or stove-pipes, are unsafe, and such notice shall not be complied with, and the property rendered unsafe, the same shall be liable to be demolished, and the duty of the Warden shall be to cause the same to be demolished, and to file of record in the City Recorder's office, a true and correct copy of such notice.

Ordinance No. 5.

It shall be the duty of every Fire Warden from time to time, as he may deem necessary, and at least twice in each year, to go to the place where the fire engines are kept, and ascertain whether the chimneys, flues, ranges, furnaces, stoves, or stove-pipes, are safe, or in any danger of fire, or put up new chimneys and every room where fires are used, and if he shall have reason to believe that any danger of fire exists in any place, he shall immediately notify the owner or agent, and shall cause the same to be repaired, and if necessary shall give the owner or agent a written notice, which shall be filed of record in the City Recorder's office, and which shall be a sufficient warrant to the fire engines to enter the premises, and if necessary to demolish the same.
