FATERIES.

IN LIGHT JACOB BRIZ Proposor.

ALL BACK BRIZ PROPOSOR.

ALL reference to the committee on railroads and explaining its salient features, he said it was not a bill either making a new grant of lands or creating a government guarantee of interest. It was not what is known as a government subsidy, but simply an extension and readjustment of a former grant upon a new basis, more for the benefit of settlers, more in the interest of a former grant and creating super cafer

sidy, but simply an extension and readjustment of a former grant upon a new basis, more for the benefit of settlets, more in the interest of national development, and creating surer, safer and more perfect credit for the company. So far from increasing the original land grant, it actually diminishes it some five million acres. Congress has herefore granted a total of over eighteen million acres of land in aid of different railroads. This also ming inroad on the public donalia, but more especially the mismanagement of some of the companies to the injury of the settler and obstruction of settlement, had created a deep-seated public sentiment against new legislation on the old policy, so that since March 1871, no new grants of land had been made by congress in aid of the construction of any railroad. There has been, however, numerous extensions, modifications and readjustments of grants formerly made, in order to render them available in construction of national development; but the experience of settlers and mismanagement on the part of powerful corporations had shown that in the interest of the people, and of sound policy, justice and true statesmanship, these grants should no longer be under the unlimited direction and control of these was corporations, but rather should remain under the control of the government and be at all times, or at least for a number of years, open to settlers at moderate and staded prices. This policy could be inaugurated with perfect justice to the corporations which, by failure to complete their roads, had forfeited all their rights and were compelled to seek extensions from congress. Such in the main were the purposes and policy sought to be established and enforced by this bill. It was a measure, therefore, in the true interest not only of settlers and of national development, but of the Northern Pacific corporation itself, in securing to it credit among the bankers of the world, whose money must finally construct this great national work.



WASHING MADE Easy. -Some time ago we learned that a new system of washing had been introduced in some of the Ger man towns, which did away with the de-structive use of the washboard and pound-ing barrel, as likewise the ruinous washing fluid, crystals and sodas heretofore used. 


