HEAVY LOSS OF STOCK.—Mr. Hersper-

Heavy Loss of Stock.—Mr. Hersperger, who lives on the Sacramento river, in Sutter county, Cal., has experienced very severe losses in stock on account of the late freshet. He had six thousand head of sheep and 400 head of cattle on his ranch, and the sudden rise of the waters made it impossible for them to remove them. He has consequently been compelled to keep them all on about 200 acres of land, that being all the dry land in his neighborhood. He has fed all the hay or grain he had or could purchase, and as a last resort was obliged to charter the steamer "Vasalia," to transport them to this place, where he can get access to the hill lands. Over 100 head of his cattle have already died from cold and get access to the hill lands. Over 100 head of his cattle have already died from cold and want of water, and the loss of sheep will be still greater in proportion. Three barge loads have already landed here, to the number of 5000, and it is distressing to see them—about 200 having died here and on the trip down. The road to the foot-hills, where he is driving, is lined with the poor animals, which, exhausted, lie down and die on the route. The loss in stock from these freshets cannot be estimated. At a third of the stock of the least one-third of the stock of the State must have perished—this being only one of the instances of loss and of the mildest type.—Knight's Landing News.
