Louisville, March 20.—The rebels, 500 strong, under Hughes and Ferguson, attacked one of Gen. Hobson's catips on the morning of the 16th near Bennet's Ferry on this side of the Cumberland, but were repulsed with a loss of four killed and several wounded. Next day Hobson's cavalry attacked the rebels under Col. Hamilton, killing six and wounding several. Hobson has nearly broken up the guerrilla bands along the Cumberland; many of them are daily surrendering themselves.

A caucus of Republican members was held at the Capitol last night. In reply to your first question, I answer that Mr. Parker is not in any sense, an Agent for the Land Office here, or the United States. This being the case, your second interrogatory needs no answer.

In reply to your third question, I answer, that Mr. Parker, as any other citizen, has the right to receive money for the purchase of lands, in which case he alone is liable to the parties from whom he receives it. His of links, in which case he and is linked to the parties from whom he receives it. His receipts are good against himself only, and I cannot think he has claimed anything

I cannot think he has claimed anything more.

I reply as follows to your fourth interrogatory, and to such points of the newspaper paragraph signed "F. P. D." which you enclosed, and to which you call my attention, as I deem it necessary or proper to notice.

The price of Government land is \$125 per acre, and there are no fees or charges at this office, in addition to that, for entry—How much a "Land Agent" may have charged a "gentleman," or how much "F. P. D." Att'y at law, might charge for attending to the business of entering 40 acres, is a matter exclusively between the parties, and over which this office has no control. I trust, however, I will be pardoned for suggesting in this connection, that if parties desiring to enter lands, would forward their own money, and their applications properly filled up and signed, (which it is very easy to do), they might no doubt profitably dispense with the services of either of the gentiemen alluded to. The duties of the Register and Receiver are in some things entirely distinct. The legal liabilities and responsibilities, as to the receip of money, rest on the Receiver. I have no authority to demand coin of Mr. Parker or any one else, on account of Government lands, nor do 1. There are, however, certain fees, very trifling to each one who may have to pay them. on account of Government lands, nor do 1. There are, however, certain fees, x-rey trifling to each one who may have to pay them, but of some consequence to us in the aggregate, and which, as such, belong to the
Register & Receiver, and not to the Government. These, though we do not demand it,
