The New Sugar Canes.
It should be borne in mind that the sugar canes, cultivated in the Northern States are the Chinese (Sorghum) and the African (Imphee.) Those are the only sugar canes which can be grown in the Northern States. We have once seen it inti-mated in an Eastern newspaper, that the Chinese sugar cane may be the same as the Ottahelte, or Ribbon cane, cultivated is We have, however, strong doubts of the correctness of this sugges-tion. As we have said, the Chinese sugar cane tillers much. In the western States it is a mooted question whether these tillers or suckers, should be removed. They The African sugar cane does not tiller .-The plant does not grow taller than its Chinese cousin, but is much stouter-less liable to, be prostrated by wind-equally rich in saccharine, and some suppose richer. These canes would throw up shoots the

second year from their stungs if cold freezing weather should not kill them. In any region morth of 35° north latitude Che cold weather of winter will kill their roots, unless they are protected by earth so much that frost will not reach them

The first wills made in the States for crushing these canes were rude inventions -in form like the old cider mill-two up right cylinders, maving together-propel ed by horse power, in the usual manner of These cylinders were made of hard wood, usually about 16 inches in diameter, and two and a haif feet long. The juice when expressed was put immediately into large kettles, placed over temporary furnaces, heated gradually until most of the seum had risen, and then boiled as rapidly as possible, skimming all the time, un-til the juice was sufficiently condensed for syrup ... This process makes a tolerable ar-ticle; but as the experiments proved sucbut as the experiments proved suc cossful, cast from mills and copper and other boilers, and improved furnaces were in-vented, and are now used to a great extent. There is no question that in the States west of the Allegheny mountains the Chinese and African sugar canes have become staple crops-the production of

which is rapidly increasing.

So far as our knowledge extends, the greatest yield of syrup to the acre has been in Ohio, reaching to 350 gallons per acre. Here it may reach 150 and possibly 200 gallons. But the fact of production here can only be guessed at. That the canes will will mature here-will yield rich juices here-may be regarded as cer-

From all the information we can glean on the matter which forms the subject of this article, we have arrived at the conviction that a fair experiment in the cultivation of the Sorphum and Imphee in this valley, and the condensation of their juices into the cultivator and of great advantage to the country.

COUNTERFEIT GOLD DUST .- Mr. Jus Fruit exhibited us, this week several ounces of counterfeit gold dust, which he found in a purse near Klamath lake. The dust is a compound of copper and some other metal, and is nearly as heavy as gold. It is in appearance like coarse, shot gold and has a dark color. It has evidently been manufactured something on the pri-ciple of shot—by means of a tower, and person unaccustomed to handling gold dust could readily be deceived by it. By rub-bing it after taking it out of the purse it becomes bright and no rly the color of ge uine gold. By mixing it with the Salmon and Warren dust it would be hard to detect. Mr. F. states that the Indians nea where he found the purse informed him that two men had wintered in the moun-tains near the point where he found the dust, and it is probable they are the manufacturers of the article.
