A SURVEYING PARTY FOR THE PACIFIC A SUNVEYING PARTY FOR THE PACIFIC SLOPE.—A party are about leaving here for the Pacific coast for the purpose of making an exploration of the mining regions of the auriferous and argentierous States and territories of that slope. The party consists of Daniel G. Major, Professor Hesse, Col. A. H. Jones, and P. Hanny. Their enterprise is purely a private one, taxing no governmental aid further than the Major has a contract from the General Land Office to run the line of the 46th parallel, which forms a portion of the boundary between Washing on Territory and Oregon. The party propose to leave St. Louic about the 1st of May by the Fort Benton route, thence travel down the coast
