LETTER FROM THE MINES.

## Eleventh Letter.

MOUNTAIN HOUSE, W. T., June 14, 1862.

When the emigration from below first began to arrive this spring, a goodly number of persons established ranches, on the plains below, in the mountain canyons, or wherever they could find good grass and water.

Many of those persons—most of them probably—had no other intention than to act honestly; but there were enough left of the rascally kind to justify me in the accusation that the rancheros of this vicinity had the largest proportion of rogues among them of any other class extant.

This remark is called forth by the departure of several cabaleros of horses for Cariboo which confiding miners had entrusted to fellows because "they understand the business."

After seeing a great number of rancheros, I lay down the following rules of action in ranching horses: To judge the ranchero's honesty, by the length of his spurs—the longer the spurs the less his honesty.

Secondly—never trust a man who always wears, in addition to long spurs, his leggings and a flourishing silk handkerchief about his shoulders—that kind of a ranchero is always ready to leave on short notice.

Thirdly—When you ranch a horse, if the ranchero treats you to more than his fees in liquor, consider your horse as bound to Cariboo on once. Fourthly—avoid leaving your horse with a man who carries more than one large six-shooter and a bowie-knife, for they are most dangerous of all.

In addition to wholesale stealing, the number of small horse-thieves, who nip single horses, is alarming to horse owners.

A couple of this kind were caught the other day, and I can truly say of them that they were the meanest looking pair I ever laid eyes on.

It is no doubt a very fine thing to be dashing off on a stolen horse, but when caught, the romance of the adventure vanishes, and while the culprit is being conveyed back to the scene of his misdeeds, the whipping-post or the gallows must obtrude themselves on the mental vision.

The two mentioned above are now in limbo at Florence, and will probably get a job in the penitentiary. They plead drunkenness, and one of them has a respectable family near Portland.

## A GENERAL STAMPEDE.

The remainder of excited prospectors up Salmon is swelled by daily accessions, and good claims have been sacrificed to get off among the first. The apprehension that one may be in the rear by a day or two, induces many to let the proverbial bird in the hand go for two in the bush.

It is quite certain that many who are acting on what they consider reliable information from friends, but by far the largest portion "follow forerunners and their noses," knowing little and caring less as to what may become of them.

Many will doubtless leave their bones at the foot of some high precipice, others take a trip down Salmon face upwards, while the rite of the Bannock, or gaunt famine will claim a hecatomb. But what is the use of remonstrance—from Gold Lake to Cariboo the bones of the countless gold-hunters lie scattered, and still other thousands push on to new fields of adventure, and to new dangers.

Dangers that would appal embattled armies are overcome by the gold-hunter, and hardships which would bring the thirder for riches could fortify men to withstand, are looked on by them as trifles.

When I view the exertions of men in search of the precious metal, I adopt the view of my friend, Mr. Arrington—"the great American spondoolix is the incentive to all exertion."

Crooked River is exciting much attention at this time. I am informed that it is a tributary of the South Clearwater. Its exact location is not generally known—most of those who are hunting for it don't know—some say there are two Crooked rivers—the other emptying into Salmon, and some say that Crooked river is bounded by the "broad and crooked road" that leads to—you know where. So, that is the condition of the Crooked river excitement at this time.

Of the thousand and one minor excitements, founded on news confidentially confided to—by, who was one of a small party of seven, who went through wonderful adventures by land, and water, and turned up, right side up in an out-of-the-way place in a totally unlooked for direction, and discovered rich diggings in an unaccountable manner, I can no more keep the thread, than I could detect "the turn of the wrist" in "three card monte." It is enough to know that the general

of miners are much excited about mining reports, which are not traceable to any reliable source.

## ADVANCE IN FLOUR—THE MARKET.

The supply of flour for Florence district has never been great enough to keep the miners two weeks, in my opinion, since the first of March.

After an apparent glut of a day or two, caused by forced sales by homesick Willameters, there has invariably been a scarcity, and now flour is up to over \$40 a hundred again, and not much arriving.

Dacon is a drug at 40 cents, caused by large arrivals of beef cattle and sheep, which go off readily at 30 cents and upwards.

Of groceries, there is not an over-fair supply, and they are sore of getting a fair demand.

Liquors are selling better than good articles can be sold, and too dear for the vile decoctions which pass as A. 1. hereabouts.

From present appearances there should be no timidity in sending forward supplies, based on the calculation that a population—able to pay—of 4,000 is here to consume them. H. M.

## Letter from Oro Fino.

Oro Fino, June 12, 1862.

EDS. STATESMAN—Having promised to write occasionally for your paper, I must crave your indulgence for my negligence hitherto.

I arrived in this vicinity three weeks ago, and was, indeed, much surprised to find everything dull and prices very much advanced from what they were a year ago; however, as the Salmon river excitement took off nearly all the original inhabitants, and things looking so gloomy during winter, it is not strange that a change was apparent in nearly all the necessities of life and luxury.

The towns of Oro Fino and Pierce City, looked like the abandoned ruins of Palmyra, with this only difference, that the stone columns of Palmyra are more lasting than the fallen logs of this region.

Pierce City suffered more than this town by the fall of snow—three of the best looking houses in town fell to the ground, being crushed down by the snow.

"But a change has come over the spirit of our dream," and now the miners, sick of Salmon, are fast returning to their old love. In my opinion, and after a long and difficult search for a claim in the Salmon country, I am persuaded that either in this section or in the neighborhood of Elk City, superior mining claims, more extensive, and far more profitable are to be found.

No! they are already open to occupation; and partly ready to the miner's hand. Hundreds are flocking constantly in this direction, and things begin to assume a new aspect; the dull towns are waking up to life and industry; the abandoned claims are being worked, and pack trains are fast coming into the mines.

On Rhodod's creek every claim that was worked last year are now being worked, or parties are preparing to do so.

The main Oro Fino creek is fast filling up with miners, and several gulches hitherto scarcely prospected, are alive with the sound of the pick and shovel.

A few days ago a fresher took place in Oro Fino creek, filling up a large number of claims and causing a great amount of damage; but the water was suddenly subsided, and now the gold begins to make its appearance in every manner, and in no small quantities, times begin to assume their old appearance, and I will venture the assertion, that this section will produce more gold this summer than the far-famed Salmon mines.

In justice to a gentleman of your city, Mr. Haas, I would say that rumor has been very busy with his reputation in connection with the death of Mr. Harris, near this town.

I have paid some attention to the matter, and find Mr. Haas entirely blameless, or at least innocent of any trouble to bring his friend, Mr. Harris, to trouble or danger.

The citizens here, with a few exceptions, and those neither friends nor admirers of Mr. Haas, entirely expunge him from any blame in the matter. In fact, the details are so long and uninteresting to your readers that I will merely mention that Mr. Haas has done more for Mr. Harris than the world would give him credit for.

So much is due in justice to the fame of Mr. Haas.

Locally and politically, we are a progressive people; a virtuous province and a fast country. Yes! indeed; a year ago a few unknown individuals happened to be placed in office, and they now imagine that the county of Shoshone, (lately organized by the legislature of this Territory), belongs to them—their finances, its welfare, and its future fame is theirs.

Verily, the oldest inhabitant may blush at the present state of things in this neighborhood. And now, not satisfied with having held on, (though ridiculously unfit), they assume to dictate to us what must be. Was ever impudence so brazen before? Perhaps I may give a biography of their lives one of these days. It will not be classical. For the entire oligarchy, perhaps, with a single exception, are singularly common-places. Their test is, "are you willing to do as I want you?" If the answer is "No," then negative, out you go—you cannot hope for anything at their hands.

The fact of the matter is, that they have a few miserable tools or dupes, who possess no mind or soul or personal independence, and who will, if successful, do the bidding of their masters.

Such, Mr. Editor, are the gentlemen aspiring to political preferment in this neighborhood. But alas! their hopes are likely to be nipped in the bud—their little schemes are "weighed and found wanting."

In connection with this matter, it is rumored by many that the finances of this county require investigation.

This is caused by the fact that the gentlemen having control in the matter, doing a large business in the sporting line and other nameless luxuries, all of which gives a coloring to speculation.

True it is, in my humble opinion, that the county finances are being disposed of in a very loose and improper manner. I give it as I understand it, that a change become absolutely necessary. I

have been requested to call the attention of the citizens of this county to this matter, and find this means the only available way of so doing. Will it abate the evil?

Society in this section appears to be not exactly elegant or refined, though the influence of quite a number of ladies living here has a tendency to soften the roughness of an abrupt mode of expression and manner among miners.

The dear creatures! how admired, how flattered, and Oh! how vain. Their little heads seem turned by the attention paid them.

Even the little children of the feminine gender, ten years old; have indignantly given over books and dolls—no girlhood, no pretty playthings, no simple or rational enjoyment, no May festivals for them; poor things!

But hoops and engagements, routs and serenades, moonbeams and lovers! Alack a day, they are as ardently aspiring to be madame as though their teens had passed over them in triumph.

Thus and such is the education of our children in this locality. More anon. "SPHYNX."

## Letter from the Dalles.

Dalles, June 16th, 1862.

EDS. STATESMAN—The reckless waters of the Columbia river are still making most cruel encroachments upon our city, and have already compelled some of us to take up our traps a second time and seek an increased elevation in which to pitch our tents.

The water is six or eight feet deep in the lower part of the city and is still rising. Main street is entirely inundated, and also a part of Second street.

Two or three inferior but buildings have been carried away; but the stone stores about which your correspondent of the 20th of May was so solicitous, are still standing, and so far as I can see there is but little danger to be apprehended as to their safety.

Your correspondent was evidently a disheartened Webfoot, and probably one of those unfortunate individuals who were taken from the treacherous Willamette bottoms by boats last fall, since which time he has had a constant dread of water, and now seeks a home on the summit of some towering mountain where the sweeping floods can never reach him

PREVENTION OF FIRES.—Since the fire of last week our people have become somewhat solicitous as to providing means for preventing fires in our city.

NEW ROUTE FROM CALIFORNIA TO POWDER RIVER.—We learn from Mr. Barnitt, who arrived a few days since from Powder river, that Capt. J. P. Walker, with a company of forty-four men, all in good health and fine spirits, arrived in Powder river valley, making the journey from Sonoma county, California, in fifty-five days.

RISE IN PRICES.—In consequence of the recent increased demand for flour and bread, and the delay in the transportation of goods from the lower country, some of the staple articles are becoming scarce, and have risen to a high figure.

POWDER RIVER DUST.—The Oregon Times says that a package of Powder river dust was recently assayed at the office in Portland, and netted "about sixteen dollars per ounce."

GRAND RONDE RIVER.—We are informed by Mr. Charles E. Fox, who came over the trail from Grand Ronde valley last week, that the country along the Grand Ronde river and on the south side of the mountains along the trail, is in every respect as much a gold bearing region in appearance as any of the country south in the direction of Powder river.

BAKER COUNTY, OREGON.—The miners in the Powder river district, have taken steps for the organization of a new county, and elected county officers. It is anticipated that the next session of the Oregon Legislature will endorse and legalize their action, as they are clearly entitled to a county organization.

THE CASCADE PORTAGE.—We learn from the Mountaineer that the high water has seriously damaged the railroad at the Cascade, carrying away the upper portion of it. Col. Ruel's house, situated at the middle landing, has been swept away, together with the adjoining buildings and much valuable property.

"BUSINESS."—The Mountaineer has the following in regard to the high water at the Dalles: The high stage of water has caused a suspension of every description of business. Our merchants are literally doing nothing, and as a result, those depending upon them are condemned to idleness.
