PREVENTION OF FIRES.—Since the fire of dast week, our people have become somewhat solicitous as to providing means for preventing fires in our city. The present is a good time to make a movement in this direction. We understand a proposition is about to be submitted to the City Council by responsible parties, to supply the city with water by iron pipes leading down Main street from Mill creek, provided a charter for this purpose is obtained. A hydraulic pressure sufficient to throw water over the highest bouldings may be had by extending the nipe about four hundred yards up Mill Creek, which in case of a fire could be effectively used by supplying hose at different points. The City Council should devise some means for resisting fires, and the sooner the better; for under the present state of things, should a fire break out on Main street, all the efforts that might be made to prevent a general conflagration would be impotent. It was a most fortunate circumstance that the building which burned the other evening was detached from the main portion of the city. Had it been anywhere in the midst of Main street, the flaines varising from it would have swpet the town, and no fire appliances that we possess at present could have prevented it. Let a movement of some kind be made to supply this deficiency.

New Route from Mr. Barnett, who arrived a few days since from Mr. Barnett, who arrived a few days since from Powder river, that Capt, J. P. Walker, with a company of forty-four men, all in good-fiealth and fine spirits, arrived in Powder river valley, making the journey from Sonoma county, California, in fifty-five days.—The route is a very practicable one for wagons. The country through which they passed is well adapted to stock-raising and farming. They also found some of the richest mining sections in the upper country on the head of John Day and Malheur rivers. They estimate the distance by this trail from Sonoma-county to Powder River to be about 800 miles.—

RISE IN PROVISIONS.—In consequence of the recent increased demand-for flour and bacon, and the delay in the transportation of goods from the lower country, some of the staple articles are becoming searce, and have risen to a high figure. Flour is held at from \$10 to \$20 per hundred, and there is but little in market; bacon 30 ets.; beans 18 ets., firm; Sugar 25 ets.; coffee 40 ets. During the past week there have been several trains in town from the upper country, all of them for the purpose of loading with flour. We suppose it will be several days at least before the damage done to the railroad at the portage can be repaired; in the meantime a limited supply of goods will be brought around the Cascades by teams.

POWDER RIVER DUST.—The Oregon Times says that a package of Powder river dust was re-ently assayed at the effice in Portland, and netted "about sixteen dollars per ounce." Mr. J. C. Franklin, of Mossman & Co's. Express, writes us that the dust referred to by the Times, contained more or less quartz and other impurities, and says that if properly cleaned it will assay as high as eighteen dollars per ounce.

GRAND RONDE RIVER.—We are informed by Mr. Charles E. Fox, who came over the new trail from Grand Ronde valley last week, that the country along the Grand Ronde river and on the south side of the mountains along the trail, is in every respect as much a gold bearing region in appearance as any of the country south in the direction of Powder river. Mr. Fox is an experienced miner, and predicts that good mines will yet be found in the locality mentioned.

BAKER COUNTY, OREGON .- The miners in the BARER COUNTY, OREGON.—The miners in the Powder river district, have taken steps for the organization of a new county, and elected county officers. It is anticipated that the next session of the Oregon Legislature will endorse and legalize their action, as they are clearly entitled to a county organization. Mr. J. M. Kirkpatrick, an'enterprising miner, is their representative elect.

THE CASCADE PORTAGE.—We learn from the Mountaineer that the high water has seriously damaged the railroad at the Cascades, carrying away the upper partion of it. Col. Ruckle's house, situated at the middle landing, has been swept away, together with the adjoining buildings and much valuable property. The railroad on the opposite side was entirely submerged, and it was feared would be a total loss.

" Business."-The Mountaineer has the folng in regard to the high water at the Dalles : The high stage of water has caused a suspension of every description of business. Our merchants are literally doing nothing, and as result, those depending upon them are condemned to idleness. The stores on the north side of Main street are submerged to the second story, and parties who had piled their goods on the top shelves are heavy losers. The total damage sustained thus far is certainly not less than one hundred thousand dollars, and the "end is not yet."

RECEIFT OF POWDER RIVER DUST.—The merchants of this city are daily receiving gold dust from Powder river in exchange for supplies. We are informed by Mr. E. L. Jancs, of Wells, Fargo & Co. Express, that he has received seventy-two ounces within the past few days. The majority of what comes in, however, is disposed of at the stores. A few days ago, Messra. Kyger & Resea received \$640 of this dust in one day's trade.

Hunter's Proclamation.—It is a notable fact that the only paper either in Washington or Oregon that has endorsed this ridiculus proclamation is the Standard, published at Olympia. The President repudiates the thing, and is supported by all reasonable men in the country. If the Dector don't look out he will forfeit his claim to being the "bosom friend of the President."

SALMON RIVER DUST.—Wells, Fargo & Co's ress brought out three hundred and mry mds of dust from Florence last week, under a nut of ten men. Those having the dust in urge report that there was much more ready come down, but they had not the facilities for bringing it.

New GOLD DISCOVERY.—On Wednesday last a company of men came to this city to purchase supplies, and reported that they had discovered diggings on the head-waters of either John Day or Crooked river—they were not certain which—and found prospects as high as \$1,50 to the pan. They were abundantly satisfied with the prospects, and returned immediately.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY.—We are requested by the Auditor to state that the office of District At-torney for the First Judicial District is to be filled at the election in July. It was omitted in the notices of the election.

A Fine Specimen.—Mr. Wilson, the discoverer of Wilson's gulch, Powder river, recently took out of his claim a beautiful solid specimen worth \$32. This is the largest piece that has been found in these mines.

LIMITED.—It is said there is but one wharf in Portland at the present time at which steamers and sailing crafts are enabled to discharge and re-ceive freight, all the others being submerged by the high water.

NEWS TO THE THI.—The steamer Sierra Nevada arrived at Portland on the 19th instant, but brought no later news than that given in this issue, in consequence of the telegraph wires not being in working order.

REMOVAL.—The Indian Superintendent's office has been removed from Portland to Salem.
