On Friday last, 19th instant, Lucion Gas nier, in accordance with a sentence which had been pronounced by the people's court was executed at Auburn, in the Powder tails of the trial, published in this issue, he was arraigned and tried without the regular formula of law, and executed without the authority of a judicial court. In the ab sence of these regulations, it seems the people of Auburn felt called upon to take the matter in hand, and make a final disposition of it. Accordingly the prisoner wa arraigned, the case investigated and passed upon by a jury of twelve men, the prisoner being allowed the assistance of counsel.— After the verdict of guilty was rendered by the jury, we are informed the question wa taken by the mass of the people, and the verdict was unanimously affirmed. It was an aggravated case of murder; and we are in no wise disposed to censure the people of Auburn for their prompt and decisive action in the matter. Although the eviction in the matter. dence of the prisoner's guilt was altogether circumstantial, it was of that character which did not admit even the possibility of a doubt in his favor. He has expiated his crime upon the gallows—a crime the enor-mity of which rarely finds a parallel among civilized people. It is well-both because nerited the punishment, and because it will leave a most salutary influence in the community of Auburn. It will be a warning to desperadors more potent than bars and cells, and will drive from their minds the satisfying reflection that prisons in a new town like Auburn are but the criminal's shield, and the long journey nee essary to be taken for a trial by the courts but a gratuitous and agreeable passport to perhaps a better field for the exercise of their villainous propensities.

It is the most universally applied of all principles, that a man must have his trade before he can use it; but in our army, improvised for the occasion from the masses of peaceful citizens, we have gone too much upon the principle of influence, and not sufficiently upon that of merit. The error has tumbled disaster upon disaster upon our heads. We must awake and correct it.

Napoleon would not have been a Napoleon without his Marshals; and his Marshals were not the pampered sons of wealth; they did not step from the parlor, nor from the Senate Chamber, nor from civil offices into commissions in the army. We have had eighteen months of war; our common soldiers have seen service in the field; they have had their abilities tested, and they should be encouraged by promotion, and the hope of promotion. On Saturday morning we were told by an intelligent Captain of one of our transports that the carelessens and inactivity of some of our officers were painful. Those men receive their pay, have an easy time, and forget the responsibilities upon them. We can only correct this by recognizing merit, by advancing soldiers from the ranks, by making the officers of the army, and giving the star of decoration to those who have proved themselves worthy of wearing its laster.
