Danton and Robespierre now quarreled—Robespierre again conquered in the death-struggle, and Danton was doomed to die.

As he entered his prison, in the vaults of Luxembourg, he said, sadly: "At length I perceive that in revolutions the supreme power ultimately rests with the most abandoned."

Robespierre was now the undisturbed victor. Day after day he punished his foes, and the guillotine ran red with blood.

If we do not, they denounce us as immoral and desperately wicked.
