The gate that leads to the burial lot is open, as if it were often visited and the morning sunlight flickers in checkered play upon the grass and tombatones as it filter temblingly through the leaves—everything quiet and serene, like the closing years and calm death and gentle soul of him who left his Sunnyside sottage home for this Sunnyside grave."
