#### A FAMOUS CASE DECIDED.

The supreme court of the United States

The supreme court of the United States has reversed the territorial supreme court in the case of the Territory of Washington ex. rel. Hiram Dustin vs. The Northern Pacific Railroad Co., commonly known as the Old Yakima Mandamue case.

The case is one of general public interest, because of the legal principles in controversy, and also on account of the bitter feeling aroused against the railroad company for the destruction of Yakima City. It became a public question throughout It became a public question throughout the territory and figured in several elections, being one of the main arguments used for the defeat of the republican can

torial courts to a successful conclusion, Mr. Snively also appearing in the latter court for the plaintiff. The railroad company was represented by James Mc-Naught, Governor Ferry, Senator Allen, Edward Whitson and M. Gilliam.

The territorial supreme court decision is reported in the 3d Wash., Ter. Reports, page 303. The main question involved was whether the courts, in the absence of any express legislation, could compel the railroad company to establish and maintain a station where required for public convenience. A majority of the supreme court of the United States holds that such power does not readled in the courts, while power does not reside in the courts, while a minority, consisting of Field, Brewer and Harlan, dissents from this opinion

The decision is of little interest here further than as it affects all people, as the cause for the bringing of the suit has disappeared in the voluntary promise of the




