The Albany convention has settled that beyon all question in introducing him as the representative of the New York democracy for that office. Senator Hill has a wonderful following and an equally wonderful control over the voters of the Empire state. The reasons for this have never been satisfactorily explained. While no charge of corruption has ever been brought against him, and he is looked upon as personally clean as regards habits and morals, the explanation is not there, for thrice elected governor, he has in each instance strongly led the ticket on which were men fully his equal racy for that office. Senator Hill has a ne has in each instance strongly led the ticket on which were men fully his equal in honor and ability. He is lacking in that personal magnetism which is consid-ered so important for leaders to possess, and which has made Blaine the idol of and which has made Blaine the idol of the ruling wing of the republican party. His nature has more the likeness of that of Senator Sherman, who is cold and for-bidding, and although acknowledged a man of great mental powers, his name is never canvassed when the party is look-ing for a presidential candidate. Both are hard workers, and their methods of work are very similar, but neither, in all probability, will ever become the chief probability, will ever become the chief executive of these United States.

The action of the Albany convention indicates that for the first tim the democrats in nominating their standard bearer will choose from some state other than New York. While Cleveland other than New York. While Cleveland is acceptable to the south and west, there is no assurance that he could carry his own state, and the opposite seems to be a fact in respect to Hill. Away from home the latter is looked upon more as a machine politician than a statesman and could neither control the confidence nor the voting strength of his party. If he does not realize this fact, it certainly detracts from his reputation as a great gen does not realize this fact, it certainly detracts from his reputation as a great general, and shows a shortness of vision that should disqualify him from rising above the grade of brigade commander. His methods of side-tracking those whose ambitions conflict with his own have proved a success in his own state, but when he goes abroad in the great field of national politics they are bound to operate to his discomfiture and his downfall. "The canal is indeed a great work, and will do for Yakima county, and the state at large, all that the Ledger has predicted and, in my opinion, a great deal more. We saw several young orchards of prunes, peaches, apples, cherries and all smaller fruits, and some trees that have borne fruit for years, all looking healthy and as promising as any Califorhealthy and as promising as any California orchards can possibly be. Our party was shown by Mr. Bicknell through his orchard, some forty or fifty acres, and no man ever saw prettier trees. And Mr. Bicknell informed us that he had trees there that had borne fruit for the pas seven years without missing a single season. By inquiring we found that where the farmers had gotten water upon ch, or uplands, the fruit crop was more certain than on the low of river lands, the uplands being entirely exempt from the late spring frosts, which sometimes destroy the fruit crops in the
