Hundreds of Strange Heirs After a Dead Man's Fortune.

San Francisco, March 1 .- Nine month SAN FRANCISCO, MARCH I.—Nine months ago the great Blythe case began in the probate court here. Day after day the case has continued and is still on trial. It is the most remarkable legal coatest of the century. A dead man's millions are at stake and there is an army of alleged heirs, fighting with the aid of a regiment of lawyers. to secure at least a portion of of lawyers, to secure at least a portion o the estate, valued at \$4,000,000

Thomas Henry Blythe, died on the evening of April 4, 1883, in his apartments at 27 Geary street, where up to the time of his death he had been living with pMiss Alice Edith Dickason," a young painter who had secured a divorce from her first husband, an artist named Peters. Blythe was about 60 years of see and her hirst husband, an artist named Peters. Blythe was about 60 years of age and very obese. Ten days prior to his death he had written a letter to his illegitimate to daughter, Florence Blythe, then in Eng-land, saying that he had just returned from Monterey feeling much better. Thomas Blythe came to California in Thomas Hythe came to California in 1840, made \$400 and loaned it on the Market-Geary-Dupoint street gore. The borrowers could not pay. In due time Blythe foreclosed, but thought so little of the sand lot that he offered it to James Lick for the amount of the mortzage, \$200. Blythe was disgusted and went back to England, of which he swore he was a native when getting out naturalization papers. 
