

BUTTER MAKING.
The principles involved in making good butter may be classed among the exact sciences. The actual making of good butter is a fine art. It is wonderful how few the people are who know how to make butter of the first-class. "Many are called, but few are chosen." Almost every farmer's wife flatters herself that her butter is as good as can be made. She would feel insulted if anyone should doubt the correctness of her opinions. But that her butter is not as good as it might be is not always her fault. A part of the difficulty is often chargeable to the "head of the family" for not providing proper appliances.

The fact stands boldly forth, however, that tons of butter are made in every county in the United States that no one ought to feel proud of. "It is an oblation unto the Lord." "The beauty of an old man is his gray hairs and the glory of a young man is his strength," but neither hairs nor strength add any to the value of butter. The farmer's wife is often a thing of beauty and a joy forever; but she can have few charms superior to the faculty of making good, clean butter. In wooling and winning her it was a pleasure to her young lover to stroke her golden hair; but now that he has her for his wife he doesn't like to strike those same golden hairs in his butter. To stroke is one thing and to strike is another. The lack of many other accomplishments may be excused if the farmer's wife is perfect in this.

She may not Wagner's music play,
She may not French and German stut,
If will she know the end from when
And makes good yellow butter.

The most common fault in butter is its flavor. There are a great many butter dealers as well as butter eaters who have never learned the difference between good and bad butter. Grocersmen often show their customers butter with a great flourish and speak of it in the highest praise, when it is really a fair rascal. And yet, here and there, a dealer is found who knows a good article of butter and is never heard praising the inferior. And many people buy and eat butter the year around and never think of smelling or tasting it beforehand. With them butter is butter and all butter is alike. These fellows are enemies to society. They make it possible for poor butter to hold a place in the market, and as long as the makers of such butter can find a sale for their product they will never get down to the serious business of studying the science of butter making as they should before offering any of the article for sale.

Those engaged in making butter, even for their own use, would do well to procure some good books upon the subject and study into all of the details as carefully and thoroughly as a physician studies into the science of medicine before practicing. Having thus acquired the theoretical ground work or first principles, the next step should be to find out what persons in the neighborhood have established reputations as butter makers.

Visits should be made to such persons and careful observation should be made as to every step from the cow to the neatly printed roll on the road to the market. In addition to this the subject of butter making should be discussed in farmers' clubs and in the country papers. Each good butter maker should be requested to give his views and a statement of his practice. And this he need not be afraid to give. The raising of the general standard of quality will not detract from prices. There will always be a strong demand and good prices for first-class butter. Fortunately, Yakima has some butter makers whose product is scarcely excelled by the famous "Philadelphia Print" and there are hosts of others who would do well to study this subject from away back.

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

It is very important that Yakima should make a well considered and determined effort to secure the state agricultural college. Whitman county is endeavoring to gain this prize, but it should not be located in a country given up almost exclusively to wheat raising. There is little to learn about wheat raising, and that little can as well be learned in the Yakima country, where the soil and climatical conditions are equally favorable to the growth of cereals, tobacco, sorghum, hops, peanuts, fruits and vegetables, as it can in a section devoted almost wholly to that industry. There is only one district of this state that approaches Yakima in diversity of products, and that is Walla Walla, but over that fertile valley Yakima should have the preference on account of her central location and accessibility. The institution is a very important one, and the commissioners should make no mistake in locating it. The branches to be taught are agriculture and the sciences, including civil engineering. Congress appropriated 100,000 acres to be used for the endowment of the agricultural college and 50,000 acres for its branches, and this vast heritage should not be frittered away through a haphazard location.

GEORGE FRANCIS TRAIN is now on his way back to Tacoma, and is expected to finish his journey to-morrow. He is traveling via the Union Pacific, and will not pass through Yakima as he had originally planned. He will have consumed sixty-six days in his trip, or six days more than he had scheduled, but still six days ahead of Nellie Fly's time.

Hon. John G. Carlisle has been elected by the democrats of Kentucky to succeed the late Senator Beck.

JOHN L. WILSON will be home in a short time to fix up his fences for a re-nomination, and the prospects are that he will get there. While there is an immense amount of disgust among leaders of the republican party, there has been no concerted action or endeavor to concentrate the opposition, and Wilson's friends claim that he will have a walkover. Why not? He has been very active. He has jumped up and down. He has grumbled and cut up monkey-shines until he has been noticed by one of his fellow members and called "sonny." Yes, he has been very nimble; and so well has he stood with the Associated Press reporter that his every move is reported and his antics emblazoned before his constituents. He has caused the removal of a poor widow from the postoffice at Montezuma because she was appointed by a democratic administration; and he has—well, we can think of nothing else of importance at the present time, but there is no question but what he has been very active and should be re-nominated.

It is reported from Washington that President Harrison has said, in a way for it to get to the ears of the republicans in congress, that he will not sign any bill for the free coinage of silver, nor any bill passed by the aid of democratic votes. If this is true it will confirm a very general belief throughout the country that President Harrison is a man of very small caliber and a man of exceedingly narrow views. He, of course, has a right to withhold his signature from a free coinage measure passed by congress, but to withhold his signature from a measure merely because some democrats voted in its favor would be exceedingly foolish and extremely partisan. It has never been the understanding that Benjamin Harrison was a good representative of the broad-viewed American, and the opinion is now growing that he is as nearly an opposite of that type as could well be found within the republican party.

COUNTY warrants are down to 90 cents. It was but a short time ago when they were eagerly sought after at 75 and 90 cents. What is the cause of this depression? A year and a half ago the county indebtedness amounted to a trifle over one hundred thousand dollars. At that time the county was bonded for \$100,000, or a trifle less than four per cent. of its property assessment. Since then, among other improvements, three bridges have been built at a cost of about twenty-eight thousand dollars, property valuations have been largely augmented, and the debt has been reduced somewhat; and still the warrants command less in the market than at that time. Where does the trouble lie? Yakima county warrants are not only a safe but a highly remunerative investment at par, and the commissioners should see that they are not thus depreciated by speculators.

The Democratic Central club of Tacoma has taken in hand the organization of a state association of democratic societies and clubs to co-operate with the national association, and a meeting to be held at Tacoma will be called some time during the coming autumn. There is a promise that Hon. Henry Waterson, of the *Courier-Journal* of Louisville, Ky., Ex-Governor Chauncey F. Black, of York, Penn., and Lieutenant Governor Stephen M. White, of Los Angeles, Cal., will be present. Communication is now being held with the various democratic organizations throughout the state, and a vigorous campaign is to be made.

A strenuous petition will go before the county commissioners at the coming session urging immediate action in repairing the bridge leading to the Moxee. In this matter the wishes of Mr. Ker and the Moxee company should be the leading factors in guiding the commissioners in their action. Mr. Ker himself is a large taxpayer, and, as the representative of the Moxee company, which has and is doing so much for the development of our latent resources, his desires should carry much weight, and, in fact, be the main power in directing the commissioners in their action.

The Seattle *Jour.* claims that Judge Calkins, of Tacoma, John F. Govey, of Olympia, and John L. Wilson, of Spokane Falls, will contest with Senator Squire for the next senatorial seat. The *Journal*, which is democratic, sees no chance for one of its party, owing to the number of hold-over republicans in the legislature, and so it rather champions the claims of Calkins. Certainly, he is head and shoulders the bigger man in every way of any of those named.

Morris Harris bought a cynose from an Indian Monday that wasn't much bigger than a pint of peanuts. He got him for a little Ellensburg nephew and only paid five dollars for him. One would think you could aim to take him up between your fingers and hide him away in your vest pocket, but when Mr. Harris attempted to lead him across the street, and the brute showed a disposition to go in the other direction, his size very materially increased in his owner's estimation. Cynoses are very contrary creatures, and it will never do to bet on them.

CHEATING THE DYNAMO.

Possible Means by Which Condemned Murderers May Insulate Themselves.

Henceforth when, by suicide or otherwise, says the *Electrical Review*, a condemned murderer succeeds in preventing the carrying out of his death sentence, paragraphers must abandon the well worn headline, "Cheating the Gallows," in favor of one which describes with greater scientific accuracy the act of one who escapes the legal electric death. Who will be the first one to cheat the dynamo? Can the dynamo be cheated, and if so, how? These are the questions interesting alike to the sheriff and his victim. A deputy can tie a hangman's knot, but can he make an electrical connection? The hangman can readily inspect the strands of his rope, but can he see the volts in the death current?

It would be well for any unfortunate about to be interpolated in the circuit of the shivral dynamo to consult an electrical expert. He will get some information which may save his life. A good electrician would recommend a coat of invisible varnish applied to the body. A person thus protected would be as invulnerable as Achilles. Hair-oil being a good insulator, if freely applied to the head, would go far toward keeping the current out of the brain.

The general use of hair-oil does not receive aesthetic sanction, but as part of an ante-mortem, or rather anti-mortem toilet, it would certainly be in good form. An inventor of this city has devised an apparatus to be worn under the clothing by means of which the most powerful currents are rendered harmless. A close fitting undershirt of tinsel would protect the wearer against any current which might attack the body. The thick, tough skinned palms of the horny fisted sons of toil are proof against almost any current short of a stroke of lightning, and a barefooted street Arab could safely walk on electric wires which would paralyze less calloused souls. An incident has recently been reported which is of the deepest significance. A lad who was apparently dead from contact with an electric wire was restored to consciousness by being touched with the wire again in the excitement attending his removal. This would be, if true, a remarkable instance of like curing like, and also show a possible way of defeating the ends of justice.

It is clearly apparent that the conditions necessary for electrical killing are affected by obscure and unthought-of causes, and while it is not likely that a criminal could completely protect himself against electric currents he may present himself for the death chair, either accidentally or otherwise, in such an electrical condition that electrical execution will become electrical torture. No one can say what will be the effect of an electric current on a subject worked up to the highest degree of nervous excitement. What physician has not given with safety to a patient suffering with intense pain a dose of morphia which would be sure death under normal conditions.

Turn Out a Congar's Tongue.

Union City Tribune: Peter J. Olsen lives a few miles up Swedenman's creek, on west side of Hood's canal. He resides alone, some distance from any neighbor. Returning from the creek last Sunday evening to his house with a pair of water he encountered in the trail a large mountain lion coming towards him. He supposed the lion would turn aside, but instead of that his majesty kept on towards him, and suddenly made a spring at his throat. Mr. Olsen, with great presence of mind, dashed the pail of water in its face, and pushing his hand into the lion's mouth seized its tongue, whilst with the other hand he grasped the lion by the throat. A fierce struggle ensued, and in this Mr. Olsen's clothes were torn from his body, and deep wounds made on his head, breast and arms, but after a desperate effort the animal tore himself away, leaving a part of his tongue in Mr. Olsen's hand, and then fled to the recesses of the forest. Mr. Olsen managed to get to a neighbor's house, where his wounds were dressed with dog-fish oil, and he is now in a fair way of recovery.

Saw the Birth of a Cyclone.

The inhabitants of Connelly Springs, a small hamlet in Missouri, says the *St. Louis Globe-Democrat*, were thrown into a terrible fright yesterday afternoon by the formation of a cyclone directly over their town. That section was devastated by a cyclone two years ago, and the people knew by experience what to expect. As described by an eye-witness, it resembled the lower half of a big balloon. From the sack-like lower end a white, ribbon-like streamer was suspended. This white streamer had a serpentine motion, and appeared in great commotion. It swung off nearly horizontally to the south for some distance from the main cloud, when it curved and took a perpendicular course. About three miles east of Connelly Springs a long piece of this whirling ribbon seemed to break loose and dart to the earth, from which soon appeared a great cloud of dust and debris. The cloud, with its trailing streamer, moved off in an easterly and northerly direction over St. Clair county, appearing to get nearer the earth.

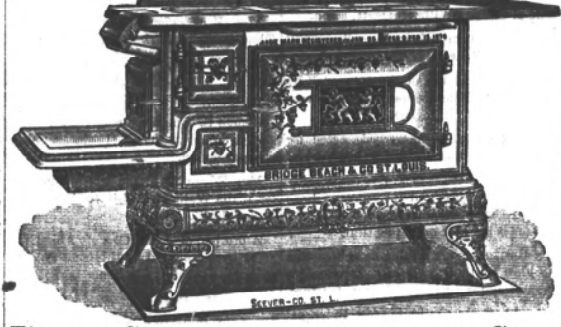
