ARTESIAN IRRIGATION.

Scientific American: Cansus bulletin No. 193, the ninth of the series devoted to irrigation in the arid and sub-humic states and territories, has been prepared by F. H. Newell, special agent of the cen-aus office for the collection of statistics of irrigation, under direction of Mr. John Hyde, special agent in charge of statis-tics in all branches of agriculture, and re-lease to articip, wells on forms, appearlates to artesian wells on farms, especially as used for irrigation. The total number of artesian wells on farms in June, 1890, in the states and territories forming the western half of the United forming the western half of the United States, was 8,097, representing an estimated aggregate investment of \$1,988,461.26. Complete statistics, concerning the depth, cost, discharge and other features of 2,971 of such wells, fairly distributed throughout the various states and counties from which they are reperted, have been obtained from the owners, and from the average derived from such statistics the number derived from such statistics the number of the such statistics. derived from such statistics the number of artesian wells used for irrigation is of artesian wells used for irrigation is computed at 3,63°, the average depth per well 210.41 feet, the average cost per well 2245.58, the total discharce of water per minute 443.719.81 gallons, or 54.53 gal-lons per well per minute, the average area irrigated per well 13.21 acres, and the average cost of water per area irrigated \$18.55. Over one-half of these wells are in the state of California, where 28.375 acres of agricultural lands were irrigated acres of agricu'tural lands were irrigated by artesian water. Utah stands second by arcesian water. Utan stance second in the number of artesian wells used for irrigation purposes and Colorado in the area of land thus irrigated, followed, at a long distance, by Texas and other states, as set forth in the bulletin.
